

WHOLESALE MURDER PLOT IS SUSPECTED BY BAYONNE POLICE

Death of School Teacher Leads
to Suspicion That Nearly
Entire Family Is Killed.

Bayonne, N. J., Aug. 30.—(U. N. S.)—Suspicion that they may be facing a wholesale murder, the wiping out of an entire family by poison (save a daughter) has aroused the authorities of Hudson County, New Jersey, to action today. It probably will result in the exhuming of the bodies of Amos Wilkins, of Bayonne, his wife, Elizabeth, their son, Alfred J. Wilkins, and his wife, Nellie. The aged Wilkins died in 1916, his wife in April, 1918, while Alfred Wilkins and his wife died on the same day, July 17, 1918.

The inquiry began as the result of a request from District Attorney Henry G. Wells, of Lawrence, Mass., who has had exhumed the body of Miss Florence M. Gay, who was a teacher in the Abbott academy for girls at Andover, Mass.

A chemical analysis of parts of the body has been completed by Professor Whitney of Harvard, and while the result is not officially announced, it is said that traces of poison were found. In connection with the death of Miss Gay, District Attorney Wells caused the arrest of Mrs. Bessie May Steele, only surviving member of the Wilkins family of Bayonne. No charge is made of her having caused the school teacher's death. She was arrested on an accusation of grand larceny of jewelry belonging to Miss Gay.

Mrs. Steele nursed the teacher in her last illness. She was also the nurse for her parents, her brother and her sister-in-law.

There is the further coincidence that in this period when all the other deaths were occurring around her, her husband also died.

**Jackson County Has
Forest Fire Problem**

Salem, Or., Aug. 30.—The recent rains, which practically removed the forest fire menace in most of Western Oregon, did not reach Jackson county, which has several forest fires to contend with, according to State Forester Elliott, who returned Tuesday from a trip of inspection to that county. He said the fires in Jackson county are now under control, but a few days of hot, dry weather will make the situation more serious. Electrical storms are the greatest source of danger for forest fires in that county.

Total About 975**

The total number registered in the state, with the exception of Harney and Curry counties, is 974.
