

GREAT IRRIGATED EMPIRE PROSPECT FOR CENTRAL OR.

Desert Land Board Joins Irrigation District in Petition to Government for Investigation.

WILL INVESTIGATE SEEPAGE

Construction of Benham Falls Reservoir Said to Make Possible Coordination of Projects.

Salem, Or., Aug. 31.—The state desert land board today voted to join the North Unit Irrigation district of Central Oregon in petitioning the federal government to investigate the feasibility of constructing a great reservoir on the Benham Falls site, as part of the government reconstruction program. If this reservoir is feasible, it will give promise of coordination of a number of struggling projects into a great 200,000 acre irrigation project.

In connection with the petition to the government for assistance, the desert land board pledges the state to make an investigation of seepage losses on the Central Oregon Irrigation project, and of the proposed readjustment of the Tumalo project, which was built by the state, by bringing the north half into the west side unit of the Deschutes project.

At the instance of State Treasurer Kay, the board went on record to the effect that its action is no way binding on the state to give financial aid to the scheme, either by guaranteeing bonds for the north unit of the district, or in any other way committing the state to extend financial support.

Harry Gard, president of the North Unit district, and A. D. Anderson, secretary, and two other directors appeared before the board. Mr. Gard declared that if the Benham Falls reservoir is constructed it will supply water for all of the 200,000 acres included in the Central Oregon section, and that he was enthusiastic in his belief that it will be possible to bring government and state and settlers together on a plan that will result in the reclamation of an empire in itself.

The north unit district has taken an option on the Central Oregon Irrigation company's project, and the consummation of that deal will depend on the results of the investigation it is hoped the government will make as requested.

Would Eliminate Salaries
Discussing the report of the Central Oregon Irrigation company that it is running behind \$245 a month in its maintenance cost, Mr. Anderson, said his district figured it could reduce that expense by eliminating high salaries of officials, who, he said, are now being paid from maintenance. He said the general manager was receiving \$450 a month and the secretary and attorney \$150 a month, with but little work to do. Another attorney receives \$100 a month as a retainer, in addition to a good fat salary for all the cases he handles, and court costs amount to a minimum of \$300 a month.

State Treasurer Kay questioned whether all these salaries were being paid from the maintenance funds.

When Mr. Gard was eloquent on the production of the north unit lands if they could be irrigated, showing that the lands would provide value for supporting a heavy bond issue to build the project, State Treasurer Kay said it was the same old story he had heard ever since he has been on the board, and that he has yet to see an irrigation project that is a success.

"Would you advise us settlers to leave?" asked Gard.
"Yes, I would, for your own benefit," replied Kay. "Pick up and leave. You will have to, sooner or later, anyway."

Lloyd George Sees Hope in Victory of End of Militarism

Wife Comes to Aid Of Spouse in Fight

Trenton lives on the Coffin farm, two miles east of town. As he left his home for this city he was attacked with guns and knives by the pair, who were finally driven off by Mrs. Trenton. As the two made off, Trenton's father-in-law, C. B. Miller, coming to the rescue, picked up one of their guns, which remains in his possession. No arrests have been made.

Alva Simpson of Wamic Dies
The Dalles, Or., Aug. 31.—Alva Simpson, a well known rancher of Wamic, died Friday at The Dalles hospital following several months' illness. He was 53 years old. He leaves two sons, Lloyd and Gail Simpson, who are in wireless service in France. Mr. Simpson lived in The Dalles for about 10 years. The body was sent to Albany, Or., for burial.

GERMANS SET DEATH TRAPS FOR ENEMIES

LONDON, Aug. 31.—Before the fall of Noyes the Germans used camouflaged explosives, detected by clockwork, in a vain attempt to stop the allied advance, according to a dispatch from Paris to the Daily Express.

Rebreathing over the terrain before the city they left these "vanity boxes" timed to go off with the arrival of the on-rushing British troops. They also set man traps to imprison soldiers. These traps were in direct line with their machine guns. Companions of the entrapped men coming to their rescue, therefore, were direct targets for the machine gun bullets north of Roye.

The French are still chasing the Germans, peppering them with the latter's own mustard shells. A number of prisoners were taken.

OREGON GUARDS HELP PUT OUT BRUSH FIRE IN TIGARD DISTRICT

Rose City Fire Starts From Burning Stumps; Long Line of Hose Is Laid.

While city firemen and police were fighting a great brush fire that burned over many acres of young timber along the Sandy boulevard east of Rose City park Friday afternoon, detachments of Oregon State Guards were conducting just as vigorous a battle near Tigard, joining with farmers who were almost in danger of losing their homes and crops.

Three calls came in from Tigard, one saying the school house was threatened. Another that homes were menaced. Lieutenant Frank and Captain Sawyer loaded their automobiles with men and speeded over rough roads to the fire. Frank put 18 men and their fire-fighting tools into his seven-passenger car. Sawyer piled 14 men into his. When they finished their work, about daybreak, the farmers whose homes had been saved gave them such hearty thanks that they felt amply repaid for their night of labor.

Multnomah guards and state guards also helped in the Sandy boulevard fire. Lieutenant F. H. Norman, Lieutenant Albert Breddlove and Lieutenant William Montgomery remained with the night at the fire until the danger apparently had subsided.

One home was destroyed in the Rose City Park fire, that of Philip Lechner of Seventy-seventh and Prescott, employed at the Foundation shipyards. Lechner had been burning stumps and slashings at his place for several days that the flames spread into the brush, fanned by a stiff breeze, to Sixty-ninth street and Skidmore and north into the thick slashings.

Long Hose Line Laid
Fire Chief Dowell had almost the entire fire department at the scene, but the firemen worked under the handicap of a lack of water. A line of hose estimated at 8500 feet long was laid from the nearest hydrant.

Mayor Baker and Chief of Police Johnson were at the fire and worked as diligently as any of the firemen or guardsmen. The mayor got himself befuddled with smoke and ashes from head to foot, but the efforts of all resulted in finally getting the flames under control, though not until far into the night. Inquiry is being made into Lechner's act in firing the brush without a burning permit. Investigation today being directed toward his possession of such a permit.

Four state police were slightly injured Friday evening in an accident at East Twenty-eighth and Broadway while returning from the brush fire in Rose City Park. The four men were riding on the police motorcycle and side car and collided with the truck of Henry Rehberg of 891 East Morrison street. Private Arthur Van of 271 Third street sustained a dislocated left arm near the elbow, and Private George M. Dye of 285 Jefferson street sustained a sprained wrist and ankle. Privates Hewett and Horton were also bruised slightly. It is reported that all four men were thrown in a sand bank. This coincidence is said to have averted a more serious accident. Private Van was removed to Good Samaritan hospital.

American Soldiers Help Patrol London

London, Aug. 31.—(I. N. S.)—A few American military police helped to patrol London last night. The strike of the metropolitan police is spreading to all sections of the city. Robberies are increasing. Five hundred of the striking "bobbies" paraded in the Whitehall district today. Armed sentries have been posted about all the government buildings.

Suspected German Spy Slain by Guard

Ocean City, N. J., Aug. 31.—Caught signalling to sea with a colored flashlight, a suspected German spy was challenged by a coast guard here early Friday, and, after a brief struggle, was shot and killed by the officer. A letter found in the man's pocket was addressed to Thomas Ellis, Trenton, N. J.

Golf Ball in Mouth, Strangles to Death

Chicago, Aug. 31.—(U. P.)—Cecil Warren, 26, playfully pushed a golf ball into his mouth. It lodged in his throat and he strangled to death.

CROSSED PLAINS TO OREGON BY OX TEAM FIFTY-SIX YEARS AGO

Mrs. Higley Jennie Nickum, Member of Pioneer Family, Passes Away at Buell.

Mrs. Higley Jennie Nickum, widow of the late J. M. Nickum, senior member of the firm of Nickum & Kelly, died Tuesday of apoplexy at Cloverdale, Or. Mrs. Nickum was one of Oregon's pioneers, having crossed the plains from Iowa 56 years ago, when she was only 6 years old. She removed to her ranch near Buell, Or., from Portland a few years ago.

Two sons and six daughters survive: J. C. and Ralph Nickum of Portland, Mrs. Elizabeth Middlebrooks, Mrs. G. N. Hansen, Mrs. Alfred Granstrom, Mrs. F. C. McDougall and Miss Myrtle Nickum of Portland and Mrs. J. B. Wilson of Berkeley, Cal.

The funeral was held Friday from the parlors of J. P. Finley & Son. Interment was in Mount Scott cemetery.

Telephone Lines in U. S. Earn Millions In Months of 1918

Washington, Aug. 31.—(I. N. S.)—Uncle Sam has been investigating the earnings of the telephone companies and found that they have gathered in a net revenue for March, 1918, of \$9,532,332. The gross revenue was \$27,921,462 for that month, while the expenses were \$18,389,130. It was announced today that this is an increase of net revenue over that for March, 1917, when the gross revenue was \$25,952,078, the expenses \$17,462,689, and the net revenue \$8,489,377.

For the three months ending March, 1918, the gross revenue was \$25,070,706, the expenses \$16,667,776 and the net revenue \$25,412,930, while for the same period in 1917 the gross revenue was \$23,342,939, the expenses \$16,549,218, and the net revenue was \$25,793,621.

\$50,000 Paid for Ridgefield Farm

Ridgefield, Wash., Aug. 31.—One of the largest real estate deals in this part of the country was made Thursday when J. W. Davis purchased the island farm, on Bachelor island, of the W. W. Cotton estate. The farm consists of 700 acres and the deal involved more than \$50,000. Judge H. B. Apperson handled the deal for Davis.

New Revenue Bill Expected to Yield Over Eight Billions

Washington, Aug. 31.—(U. P.)—The new revenue bill, providing \$8,000,000,000 the next year to help to finance the war, has been completed by the house ways and means committee and will be reported early next week.

Treasury experts believe that the bill will provide between \$100,000,000 and \$200,000,000 in excess of the \$8,000,000,000 sought.

Salient features are:
Flat 12 per cent rate on normal incomes over \$4000 and a 6 per cent rate on taxable incomes less than \$4000.
Surtaxes on individual incomes, ranging to 65 per cent on those of more than \$50,000.

Earned and unearned incomes to be treated on the same basis, with no differentiation in favor of the earned character, which was sought by Secretary McAdoo.

Flat 80 per cent tax on war profits after providing for specified exemptions.
Excess profit tax, ranging from 35 to 70 per cent.
Luxury taxes ranging from 10 to 20 per cent. Changes may be made before its enactment into law, as there is opposition to some features in both house and senate.

RAILROAD COMPANY'S OFFER OF \$5200 FOR DEATHS IS ACCEPTED

Settlements Allowed by Court in Estates of Persons Killed at Cascade Locks.

Permission to accept offers aggregating \$5200, made by the O-W. R. & N. company for the death of three members of the Nunn family, and an injury to a fourth, was granted by County Judge Tazewell this morning to Mary B. Love, administratrix of the estates of Earl Nunn, Margaret Nunn and Frank Nunn, and guardian of the estate of Ruth Nunn, minor, and to sign a receipt relieving the railroad company from any further responsibilities in the matter.

The Nunnas were driving in an automobile across the company's tracks at Cascade Locks, July 14, when they were crashed into by a train. Mrs. Margaret Nunn, the mother, Earl and Frank Nunn, sons, and Wallace Price of Eugene being killed.

An offer of \$1500 for the death of Price was accepted by W. R. Price, administrator of the estate, by permission of the court.

250,000 to March in Chicago Labor Day

WEALTHY CHICAGOAN IS MURDERED; FATHER OF GIRL IS ACCUSED

Death of William E. Bradway Is Surrounded by Mystery; Police Reticent.

Chicago, Aug. 31.—(I. N. S.)—Mystery today surrounds the death of William E. Bradway, wealthy clubman and president of the Municipal Supply company, divorced husband of Charlotte May Smith Bradway, daughter of J. W. Smith, famous as the discoverer of Goldfield and its gold mines in 1903. He died Friday night at Michael Reese hospital from stab wounds received Thursday night while going to his home at 2918 Indiana avenue.

Police and relatives refuse to discuss circumstances of his death, and only from official police records could any information be obtained. The record read: "William E. Bradway was taken to the hospital at midnight, Thursday, stabbed over the heart by J. Norman Cook, 27 Halsted street."

Girl's Father Is Accused
A detective assigned to the case said that Bradway had regained consciousness for only a brief interval, during which he made this statement: "J. Norman Cook, father of a 19-year-old girl I met in Kansas City two years ago, stabbed me as I started to enter my home. I think he is a traveling man. You may find him at 27 South Halsted street."

No. 27 Halsted street appears to be a rooming house of the poor class. The name of J. N. Cook appears over the bell of the second floor slot. The police refused to state early today whether or not they had Cook in custody. It is believed he escaped.

Bradway lost consciousness before the police could question him concerning the motive for the killing or his relations with the Kansas City girl.

Financial Family Blamed
An additional element of mystery entered the case when W. R. Durgin, Bradway's nephew, said: "I know nothing about the girl in the case. I do not believe this murder has anything to do with any woman. I believe it was prompted by financial enmity."

Bradway was manager of the Kennedy Valve company and president of the Municipal Supply company. As head of the latter company he had just perfected a chlorinating device for the purification of water supplies. The process undoubtedly would have made him a millionaire.

Ex-Wife Gives Information and Arrest Follows

Archie Dines, a shipyard worker in one of the Astoria yards, is being detained in the county jail by Assistant United States Attorney Goldstein for failing to register for the draft.

Dines' arrest followed a report made by his divorced wife that he, although within the draft age, refused to register. The marriage certificate produced shows Dines' age as 26 years, while he claims to be 32 years old.

When asked if he wanted to go into the service Dines stated that he was not physically fit, because he had a leakage of the heart. He said he had never been examined by a physician but that a fortune teller told him of the physical disability.

No Circus Parade; Only Shows Monday

A representative of the Barnum & Bailey circus announced today that there would be no street parade of the circus on Monday morning. After a meeting with members of the Labor Council it was decided that there would be no time to give the free street pageant before or after the labor demonstration. However, Portland will have plenty of circus time Monday. The big show will make ready on the lot at Twenty-fifth and Eighth and will have the entrances open at 1:30 o'clock. The afternoon performance will be given at 2:30. In the evening the entrances will be open at 7 o'clock and the performance will be given at 8 o'clock.

Gen. Beebe Reviews U. O. Training Corps

Eugene, Or., Aug. 31.—The 250 men of the second summer training camp of the University of Oregon, who came to the campus a month ago as rookies, today passed in perfect review before Adjutant General Charles A.
