Evangelical Denominations Join to Put Sunday Schools

TEACHER TRAINING #Tinneapolis Pastor JEWISH SOLDIERS

Effort Is to Be Made to Put High Educational Basis.

LEAFLETS EXPLAIN THE PLAN

Committee Adds to Literature Setting Forth Intentions.

HE Evangelical denominations of the United States and Canada have arranged for a 30-day simultaneous drive, beginning about September 15, to establish teacher training classes in the Sunday schools of North America.

The day when any person can be a Sunday school teacher, when anything goes as teaching in a Sunday school, when anything, so long as it is religious, will do for a Sunday school lesson, is past. All denominations are convinced that the work of the Sunday school should be on a high educational basis, and be true to the best educational principles. For this reason the denominations are working together for the promotion of teacher training as part of the Sunday school program.

The Sunday school Council of Evangelical denominations is directing the drive and the International Sunday School asmociation has approved it.

To advance the drive in North America, a full series of explanatory leaflets has been prepared by the committee in charge, to be used in conjunction with literature prepared by church boards. This general literature is as follows: (1) An outline of method, (2) The Sun-

day school must help win the war, (3) Teacher training Sunday, (4) Workers' conference program, (5) Teacher training a national necessity, (6) Why the teacher training drive? (7) The value and need of teacher training in the local Sunday school, (8) Program for the conservation conferences and (9) Training for leadership.


