The following heavy precipitation is reported: Sacramento, Cal., 3.02; Boston, Mass., 2.14; San Francisco, Cal., 1:40. The weather is much warmer in the Northern Plains states and is much cooler in the Lower Lakes region and Upper Ohio valley. The temperature is generally above normal in the West and below normal in the East.
