Former Employee Writes From France Expressing Satisfaction Over Work Being Done.

SOLDIERS' FAMILIES AIDED

American Soldier Said to Be Best Provided for of Allied Armies; Fall of Kaiser Seen.

A letter from one of the boys in France formerly in the employ of the O-W. R. & N. company in Portland tells of his happiness in knowing of the work the O-W. R. & N. war auxiliary is doing for the folks at home.

"I received a letter from mother a few days ago and she was telling me of your visit while in Walla Walla. Mother is very pleased and I am sure very much relieved to know there is someone whom she might rely upon for a bit of any kind. To us on this side it doesn't matter very much. We are contented to live according to Uncle Sam and at the present time I frankly say that the American soldier is the best provided for soldier in the allied army. It is the folks at home which cause the most worries, and knowing that my old fellow employees have taken some interest in the folks at home, it is very hard for me to express my gratitude in writing.

"Our company has been back from the lines for more than two months, so we were not fortunate enough to be in on the big drive. The boys are doing wonderful work and such progress continues the kaiser will be only too glad to accept any kind of peace proposal.

"I want to thank you very kindly for the kindness shown to me, and when the opportunity affords me, will do my best to register the O-W. R. & N. on more than one Boche's helmet."

Salesmen Are Told Some Are and Some Are Not Essential

Wasco County Cloud Bursts Play Havoc The Dalles, Sept. 16.—Cloud bursts caused the heaviest precipitation of the year in this vicinity Friday night. Heavy rains tore boulders weighing hundreds of pounds from the canyon near Eight Mile creek and rolled them into farm yards. Some ranch homes were sunk in several feet of water. Trains were held up by washouts between Lule and Grand Dalles and at Fallbridge. A cloud burst was also reported at Wasco. The bridge at Eight Mile creek is nearly submerged.
