Order Numbers of New Registrants to Be Made Out Soon
Indications that drawing will soon take place of order numbers for the new registrants is contained in a wire received Friday by Captain J. E. Cullison, state selective service, from Washington.

The telegram urged a speeding up of assigning serial numbers to all registrants up until September 21. All registrations received after September 21 will be late and they are probably assigned their serial numbers, but since in Multnomah county one of the precincts is 180 miles from the local board and it takes an aside until further inland the distance, and since there is no method of communication except by mail, reports are necessarily slow.

Will Give Liberty Bonds for American Institute of Baking
One million dollars in Liberty bonds are to be purchased by the bakers in the United States and donated as an endowment fund for an American Institute of Baking, which is being established probably at Chicago.

Thirty Oregon bakers are expected to purchase \$250 each of Liberty bonds and donate them to the institute. H. H. Haynes, president of the Haynes-Foster Baking company, and John A. Wright of the Log Cabin bakery are members of the general committee handling the preliminaries of the movement.

The institution, when established, will teach the technique of baking, handling and selling, bakery architecture, allied sciences and the commercial methods of the bakery trade.

The endowment will later be increased to a total of \$5,000,000.

Multnomah Club to Entertain Tonight
Several swimming races and diving contests, billiard and pool exhibitions, bowling, chess, checkers, handball, cards and games will be staged at the Multnomah club tonight at the entertainment for members and prospective members.

The doors will be open at 8 o'clock and members will be guests over the big clubhouse from top to bottom.

Epidemic Hits Gloucester
Gloucester, Mass., Sept. 21.—(I. N. S.)—An appeal to outside towns for doctors and nurses to assist in caring for the thousands of sufferers from the grip epidemic here was sent out today by the health authorities. Of the city's 23 physicians six are ill with the malady.

PREPARATIONS MADE TO COMBAT SPANISH INFLUENZA EPIDEMIC

Disease Prevalent in Parts of East and Midwest Has Not Yet Appeared Here.

Spanish influenza, the communicable disease which is spreading rapidly in some portions of the east and middle west, will get a chilly reception in Portland, if safeguards set out by City Health Officer Parrish become necessary here.

According to reports, the Spanish influenza is now headed toward the Pacific coast and the vanguard of the germs has already reached the middle west.

The disease, says the city physician, closely resembles an aggravated case of grip, the symptoms being much alike. The Spanish influenza is said to be far more serious than the ordinary case of influenza, which raged in this section some 15 years ago.

The modern form of the malady has a most depressing effect upon its victims and extreme suffering, such as aching bones, accompanies the disease. Out of the first 1000 cases recently reported in the east there were 30 deaths, the proportion being being greater than that of the common influenza.

Dr. Parrish has instructed all physicians to report promptly any cases which make their appearance in Portland.

To guard against the malady Dr. Parrish advises everyone to observe rules of health and to keep the body in good condition. He advises that proper ventilation of sleeping apartments be observed.

The disease attacks its victims suddenly, often without warning, and is apt to be fatal, especially when the streptococci are at their work. It is usually accompanied by a high fever. Victims are advised to go home at once, call a physician, and go to bed, stay there until they are completely cured.

Chicago Is Invaded
Chicago, Sept. 21.—(I. N. S.)—Spanish influenza has invaded Chicago and army training students at Lewis institute, in the city, are now under quarantine. It is believed the epidemic here was started by the mingling of some of the men at social functions which Great Lakes jacks attended. The entire great lakes personnel, totaling 50,000 jacks, is now under quarantine.

At Lake Forest college and Northwestern university more than 100 victims are reported. There are 200 cases reported at Fort Sheridan and Wilmette, a north shore suburb, reports 60.

California Not Yet Hit
San Francisco, Sept. 21.—(U. P.)—Spanish influenza has not reached the Pacific coast yet, said Dr. George E. Wright, president of the state board of health, today. But he "knocked wood" when he said it.

"Epidemics of this nature usually follow the line of railroad travel. It may appear here within two weeks. If it does arrive the health authorities will be interested in observing outbreaks and taking measures to keep it in check. Laboratory studies to try to find the bacillus which causes the disease will be made, Dr. E. Wright added.

Pastor Returns With Bride
Freewater, Sept. 21.—Rev. Paul Green, pastor of the Sunnyside M. E. church, who was recently married at Bellingham, Wash. to Miss Charlotte Ruth Ferringer of that city, returned this week with his bride. Rev. Green will take up his duties in the church while his bride, on account of the scarcity of teachers, has accepted a position as teacher in the Ferndale high school.

Liberty Loan Drive Opened at Dallas by Parade of Mothers

Dallas, Sept. 21.—The campaign for the fourth Liberty loan started off here today with a patriotic parade headed by the Polk County Home Guard band and participated in only by mothers, sisters, wives and daughters of men in the service. More than 100 women and children were in the parade.

Friday nearly 1500 people viewed the captured German war relics when the special train carrying them stopped here for half an hour. Business houses closed to give proprietors and clerks a chance to view the exhibit and listen to the address by Attorney George W. Caldwell of Portland, who accompanied the train.

Prune Dryer Burns
Dallas, Sept. 21.—The prune dryer of A. M. Fanning, near Ballston, was totally destroyed by fire a few nights ago, together with 1000 boxes of prunes of the year's crop. Considerable household goods stored in the building were also destroyed. There was no insurance on building or contents.

Boys Arrive Overseas
Dallas, Sept. 21.—Word was received here today that the 694th United States engineers, of which First Lieutenant Edward J. Himes, Sergeant W. P. Miller and Cook R. A. Pierce of this city are members, had arrived safely overseas. One battalion of this regiment was organized at Vancouver barracks a few months ago, and the others at Camp Glenburnie, Md.

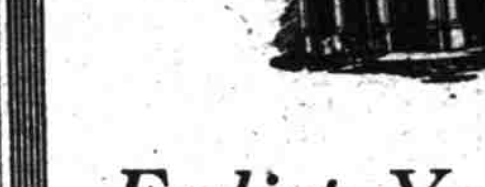
