

# TUBERCULOSIS TO BE DISCUSSED AT SPOKANE MEETING

Oregon to Be Represented at Northwest Conference to Be Held September 27 and 28.

## ARMY ASPECTS CONSIDERED

Portland Woman to Speak on "The Use and Value of Surveys."

After serving less than three months in the army and navy, 133 men have been rejected and returned to their home state on account of tuberculosis, and their names and addresses have been sent to the Oregon association for the prevention of tuberculosis.

On account of the short service the government assumes that these men had the disease in a latent form before admission to the cantonment and hence holds itself in no way responsible and the burden of caring for these rejected men becomes a civil duty.

It is to discuss such problems as this that the Northwestern Tuberculosis conference will meet September 27 and 28, in Spokane, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Nevada and Utah are included in the northwestern district.

Oregon will be well represented on the program. Major Ralph Matson, well known tuberculosis specialist, now stationed at Camp Lewis, will speak on "The Diagnosis of Tuberculosis for Admission to the Army." Mrs. Sadie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon association for the prevention of tuberculosis, will speak on the "Use and Value of Surveys."

Dr. Marr Bisalton, associate director of the tuberculosis clinic of the Portland Free Dispensary, will speak on "The Value of Free Clinics." Miss Emma E. Gritting, former superintendent of the Visiting Nurse association of Portland, will conduct the round table on public health nursing.

Other Oregonians who will attend are: Dr. R. H. Cliff, county health officer; Miss Marion Crowe, Portland Tuberculosis nurse; Miss Mary Campbell, superintendent Portland Open Air sanitarium; Mrs. Blanche Maitland, tuberculosis nurse of the Visiting Nurse association; Miss Jane Allen, Oregon Field nurse; Mrs. W. F. Boynton, director of Oregon association for Lane county and Dr. Robert L. Holt, secretary of the State Board of Health.

Delegates to the conference are being appointed by Mayors and Boards of County Commissioners and by other organizations interested in public welfare. For further information, write or call the offices of the Oregon Association for Prevention of Tuberculosis, 508 Corbett building, Portland.
