

CAMPUS OF U. OF O. HAS APPEARANCE OF MILITARY POST

Nearly 1500 Students to Enroll at State University This Week; Many Girls Entering College.

S. A. T. C. BRINGS STUDENTS

Barracks to Cost \$75,000 to Be Built Soon; Civilians' Training Camp to Open Saturday.

Eugene, Sept. 28.—Nearly 1500 students, the largest enrollment of resident students in the history of the institution, are expected to register at the University of Oregon this week.

Physical examinations and assignment of men to their barracks were begun today and nearly 200 men were passed upon by the examining board.

If no other quarters can be found for the overflow from the fraternity houses and the dormitory the Young Men's Christian Association building downtown will be converted to that use until the new barracks are completed.

Men registered in the S. A. T. C. will be called upon to perform a large part of the unskilled labor in connection with the construction work on the building, according to a telegram received from the Dining Hall Cafeteria.

Final instructions regarding the S. A. T. C. reveal that there will be very little variance in the work from the regular college courses leading to essential occupations except that 11 hours each week will be given over to military drill and that the men will be uniformed and under military discipline.

Time is being allowed to get the S. A. T. C. and the regular college courses well under way before the third civilian training day is opened, the registration day for which has been set for October 5.

Prominent Men Enrolled Among them are Judge C. H. Marsh, of Pendleton, county judge of Umatilla county; Julian Hurley, of Vale, state senator from Malheur county; Ralph C. Jennings, of Jackson, state sheriff of Jackson county; Frederick M. Dempsey, deputy district attorney of Multnomah county.

The list also includes many athletes of wide reputation, including Plowden Scott, of Portland, graduate of Stanford university; for several years star of Multnomah Athletic club football team; H. Chandler Egan, of Medford, former national amateur open golf champion; Paul Blanchard, of Gigamis Pass, another Stanford University athlete star; Edgar Shockley, physical training director at Fort Stevens and former athletic instructor at the university.

No special students, those having less than the required number of high school credits for regular entrance into the university, are to be accepted this year, Registrar A. R. Tiffany has announced. But this small loss in numbers will be far overbalanced by the large number of girls who are expected to enroll, both in the regular university department and in the special training and other special war courses for women being offered this year.

War Ends Templar Class; Rooms to Be Used for Soldiers

The templar class of young men in the First Methodist church has broken up.

Eighty-three members of the class have answered their country's call to arms and have gone "over there" or are on their way, and none are left to attend religious instruction.

It was announced Saturday at the Oregon conference of the church which is in session here that it had been decided to equip the two classrooms in the basement of the church building for soldiers sojourning in Portland. This has been done through the agency of the Red Cross auxiliary of the church, of which Mrs. J. D. Ogden is president and Mrs. E. A. Baker is secretary.
