Are to Be Sunk in

were able to graze 600 head of stock on a range formerly not used because of lack of water, according to E. N. Kav-

anaugh, in charge of the grazing de-partment of the district forest service. The well was sunk for a ranger station, and was fixed for stock by digging it deeper and equipping it with a gasoline pu

The plan worked so well that grazing experts at the recent meeting at Bend decided to put down more wells at six mile intervals, leaving the stock to graze three miles from each side of a well. It is expected the scheme will provide graz-

ing for 3000 head more stock in that particular range. According to tentative plans the government will dig the wells and the stock associations will cooper-

ate in maintaining them. A new corporation plans to maintain more than 15,000 stands of bees in California and make it the leading honey producing state.



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
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
