

INFLUENZA SPREAD WORRIES CHICAGO

Virtual Quarantine of Every Case in Effect; Hospital and Home Are Seized.

Chicago, Oct. 1.—(I. N. S.)—Virtual quarantine of every case of influenza in Chicago today, following drastic orders issued by Health Commissioner Robertson Monday. The order followed the quarantine measure adopted at Cook county hospital, where there are 260 cases.

With the spread of the disease, more than 75 nurses have been reported ill with it, of whom three have died. It is believed that, in order to prevent a city wide epidemic, federal experts will be sent to the city. Toward this end, Dr. Robertson took a flying trip to Washington.

Surrounding towns are in the thick of the fight against the malady. At Lake Forest a private hospital was taken over by the city in the effort to care for the rapidly increasing cases. Here, too, federal authorities seized the home of John A. Nelson, former president of Lake Forest college, as a base hospital. Great Lakes naval training station reports the war on the plague progressing satisfactorily. The report for Monday was 54 new cases, a decrease of 34 from the day previous.

Precaution Taken at Barracks
A precautionary step to prevent the appearance of Spanish influenza at Vancouver barracks has been taken by Major J. D. Cope of the spruce production division, who has prepared a bulletin to be read to all air service detachments.

The recommendations include gargling twice each day and brushing the teeth with salt water or tooth paste after each meal. Upon the appearance of the first symptoms of fever, chill, severe headache or backache, sore throat or marked prostration or weakness, the individual is ordered to report immediately to a medical officer.

William R. Smith to Have Full Military Honors at Funeral

News of the death of William R. Smith, formerly a member of the first battalion of the Oregon naval militia, has been received by Lieutenant Harold C. Jones of the militia. Mr. Smith died September 27 in the naval hospital in Brooklyn. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Smith, 4320 Forty-seventh street southeast.

Smith entered the navy at Bremerton, April 6, 1917, under Lieutenant Commander Blair, as landsman for electrician. He was detailed to the U. S. S. South Dakota, and at the time of his death was electrician, first class. The cause of his death is not known.

Funeral arrangements will be made upon the arrival of the body. The Oregon naval militia will have charge and a full military funeral will be given.

Germans Lose 1500 Men in Fight With Ukrainian Mobs

Washington, Oct. 1.—(I. N. S.)—The Germans have lost more than 1500 men in fighting with the Ukrainian revolutionists near Kivertse, according to advices from Swedish sources received by the state department this afternoon.

The Ukrainians are declared to be robbing and burning Baku, where they have fired the oil reserves.

Conditions in the Ukraine are generally described as bad, and the Germans have been forced by the revolutionaries to evacuate Briegeld and Peko.

Huns to Try Yanks Bearing Propaganda

Germans Drop Gas Bombs on Hospital Near Verdun Front

With the American Army Northwest of Verdun, Sept. 30.—(Night)—(Delayed)—(I. N. S.)—The Germans dropped several air bombs containing gas near an American hospital some distance from the front, causing a number of casualties, according to an unconfirmed report in circulation.

Several of the men when moved to a gas hospital agreed they did not hear the whistle of a shell, but declared they are positive they heard a German airplane overhead.

County of Clatsop Exceeds Loan Quota

Clatsop county went over the top yesterday in the Liberty loan drive with \$1000 to spare, according to a report received last night by John L. Etheridge, state director of organization for the Liberty Loan committee. Clatsop county's quota is \$1,127,000 and its subscriptions up to the time of filing the report were slightly in excess of \$1,128,000, with still further subscriptions in sight. Oregon, outside Portland, still lacked \$300,000 of reaching its quota last night.

Reappointment of Murdock Is Held Up

Washington, Oct. 1.—(U. P.)—The senate today again failed to confirm President Wilson's reappointment of Victor Murdock as a member of the federal trade commission. Murdock has been assailed by some Republican senators, who, it is understood, have so far failed to agree to his appointment.

DRAFT DRAWING FINISHED AT 8 A. M.

Last of the 17,000 Capsules to Be Drawn From Bowl Is Number 12,734.

Washington, Oct. 1.—(I. N. S.)—All through last night Provost Marshal General Crowder and his corps of assistants toiled methodically drawing out and recording the 17,000 key numbers needed to completely compile the lists of the latest classes eligible for military service. There was not a stop throughout the entire night, and at 8 o'clock this morning the great glass bowl was empty. The force worked in relays like a well-oiled machine.

The last capsule to be drawn from the great glass bowl contained the number 12,734. As fast as a number was drawn and verified it was telephoned to the government printing office, where experts prepared it for printing on the master list that will be in the mails on the way to the various draft boards within a few hours.

There were comparatively few spectators watching the drawing and they were mostly military men.

Victoria's Firemen Go Out on Strike

Victoria, B. C., Oct. 1.—(I. N. S.)—Victoria is without fire fighters today. The men walked out as the result of the dismissal of Fire Chief Davis. The firemen recently asked for the quinine platoon system and higher wages.

Back From Front To Assist in Drive For Liberty Loan

To assist in the Liberty loan drive here, Private C. J. Knudsen arrived this morning from the U. S. naval base hospital at Norfolk, Va., where he had been recuperating from wounds received last June when he was struck by a shell from a trench mortar.

Knudsen's home is at Brooklyn, N. Y. He enlisted in June, 1917, in the 77th company machine gun battalion, U. S. marines. He saw service the following March in France in the trenches near Verdun. He took part in repulsing German raids at Chateau-Thierry when the Germans were at the height of their most rapid advances and the French line retreating as much as 25 miles in two days.

American Editors Arrive in Paris

Paris, Oct. 1.—(I. N. S.)—American editors who visited the British battle front as the guests of Great Britain arrived here today and were entertained at luncheon with a number of English editors. The party leaves tomorrow for the French battle front.

Buffalo Herd to Be Reduced
Removal of seven of the herd of 11 buffalo from the city zoo to government reserves in South Dakota is being planned. Dr. Field of the United States biological survey, who is now in Portland, has been in conference with city authorities, including Park Superintendent Kogger, and it is expected that the necessary arrangements will be made soon.

TIMBER IN MINAM AND WALLOWA FORESTS IS SOLD BY GOVERNMENT

Minam Lumber Company Buys Large Tract of Western Yellow Pine, Fir, Larch.

A timber sale has been awarded by the district forest service to the Minam Lumber company for 25,000,000 feet of timber situated along the Minam river in the Wallowa and Minam national forests. The lumber company has a sawmill in operation and is dependent upon this timber to continue its operations. Preference is given going concerns at this time by the forest service, it being contrary to its policy to encourage the opening of new operations. The timber consists mainly of western yellow pine, with some Douglas fir and larch. Prices paid are \$3.50 per 1000 board feet for western yellow pine in

first unit, and \$3 for second; 50 cents for larch and Douglas fir. The timber will be floated down the Minam river to the mill, as it extends along a strip 20 miles or more on both sides of the river.

About 12,000,000 feet of the timber is western yellow pine, while slightly over 7,000,000 feet consist of the other varieties. The contract requires that the removal must begin by July 1, 1919, and must all be removed by December 1, 1920. It also provides for the readjustment of the stumpage price December 1, 1921, and December 1, 1922.
