

M'ADOO SELLS BIG AMOUNT OF BONDS IN CAPITAL DRIVE

Signs Father-in-Law, President Wilson, for \$20,000; in addition to \$10,000 Purchased.

TOTAL SOLD 'IS \$1,800,000

San Francisco District Passes \$100,000,000 Mark; Washington 37 Per Cent Subscribed.

Washington, Oct. 7.—It is not often that a wholesaler goes back to retailing and makes good at it, but W. G. McAdoo, for some time the world's greatest jobber in government securities, Sunday turned up his coat collar and trudged through the rain, ringing door bells, to sell the "fighting fourth" Liberty bonds. And he sold them. After three hours of solicitation he showed a total of \$1,800,000. His smallest sale was \$50 to a colored cook, and his largest was \$10,000 to Bernard Baruch, chairman of the war industry board. In the meantime he had sold \$20,000 to President Wilson, who already had \$10,000, and had to take his additional subscription on the installment plan, because of inability to meet the full payment at once.

He also sold Eugene Mayer of the War Finance corporation, \$500,000, and J. I. Replogle of the war industries board \$100,000 worth of bonds.

President is First Victim
Things looked blue when Mr. McAdoo began his canvass. He started with the White House, giving his father-in-law a stiff canvass. The president had not expected him, but had been considering additional purchases, and after being assured that he could make his payments in installments took out his pen, and, as the movie operators, who trailed the McAdoo party, ground the cranks of their machines, the president wrote his check for \$20,000.

But he was careful to understand the method of installment buying, and to know just when his payments were to come due, and how much they were to be. He was not sure that he could afford the purchase, but was so impressed with the government needs for every cent every citizen could afford that he determined to make the necessary sacrifice.

On the way the McAdoo party passed the car of Ray Baker of California, director of the mint, and McAdoo hailed Mr. Baker. Mr. McAdoo gave the warner an agreement that brought a \$1000 purchase.

Near Seventeenth and O streets the

secretary of the treasury left his automobile and began ringing doorbells. Mr. Seppian, an Armenian shopkeeper, who has taken out his first papers, was an early purchaser in this part of the tour. He already had purchased bonds but when the secretary, with little rivalets of water running from his hat and coat, got his attention and began his story Mr. Seppian decided to take more and stood in the rain signing his name to a subscription blank against a brick while Mr. McAdoo looked on with a smile and the movies ground the cranks. A score of girls surrounded the secretary at a nearby war workers' home and clamored to be the first to subscribe, but finally all yielded to the colored cook, Marietta Thomson, who took a \$50 bond and paid her first \$5 in pennies, nickels and dimes. The movies caught the heap of "chicken feed" in Mr. McAdoo's hand and the smile on Marietta's face.

R. P. Jones, of the local committee, was just leaving the home of Mrs. Elinor Patterson of Chicago and Washington with a \$10,000 subscription when the McAdoo party showed up. Mrs. Patterson also had made a subscription in Chicago, but Mr. McAdoo signed her for \$400 additional.

Secretary Enjoyed Experience
"It was great," said the secretary afterwards. "We've got the kaiser on the run now and everyone should join in and buy a bond to give him another push."

Reports to the treasury show that both Cleveland and San Francisco districts have passed \$100,000,000.

No Peace With Hun Invader

Representative E. T. Taylor of Colorado—Such peace propositions should not be considered for a minute. The German armies and ideas must be completely conquered before any peace discussion.

Representative Nicholas J. Sinnott of Oregon—We'll smite them hip and thigh till they come in sackcloth and ashes, according to an unconditional surrender.

Representative J. F. Miller of Washington—I should never talk peace until the Germans have evacuated France and Belgium.

Representative A. C. Shellenbeger of Nebraska—It is no time to talk peace now. First, the Germans must be driven from Belgium and France.

Representative John E. Raker of California—My attitude is that of the president's. We can't have an armistice or conference until they have surrendered.

Representative Edward Keating of Colorado—President Wilson has stated the proposition clearly. The two big things to be done by his action are the overthrow of militarism and autocracy and the freeing of the little peoples. The minute there is a sincere ring

of sincerity in their offers, President Wilson will be listening.

Roosevelt Makes Comment

Minneapolis, Minn., Oct. 7.—(U. P.)—The German peace drive, declared former President Theodore Roosevelt here today, "is only a part of the German war drive. I hope that under no circumstances will we consent to a suspension of hostilities until Germany surrenders unconditionally."

Colonel Roosevelt addressed a mass meeting at noon today, urging fullest support of the fourth Liberty loan.

200 MORE WOOD SHIP CONTRACTS PROBABLE

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of the great timbers available on the coast, which make building easier and ships stancher. Accordingly, the shipbuilders of the district, with Assistant Supervisor J. W. Hall of wood ship construction, designed what is known as the Columbia river type.

This was sent east by Mr. Hubbard and C. L. Reed, head draughtsman of the Emergency Fleet corporation, who were refused in New York by the American Bureau of Shipping and re-drafted. The hold was deepened and the new plans are for a flush deck ship instead of the well deck type, as at first planned. The plans in no way alter the use of big timbers of the general design.

New Plans Readily Approved
The new plans were readily approved and were taken to Lloyd's, where they were accepted. Mr. Hall then went in to see Mr. Reed, and with Mr. Hubbard and Reed, laid the design before the technical department of the Emergency Fleet corporation, where it was fully approved.

Mr. Hall was given assurance that upon the passage of the Appropriation bill by the shipping board, contracts would be given for the new ships in this district. According to Mr. Hubbard, there is no question that they will be of the new design, and while Emergency Fleet corporation officials here do not hold quite such a rosy view, it is considered entirely probable that the new ships will be in the next contracts awarded wood yards in Portland.

Columbia Design Held Best
"Eight designs for 5000-ton ships were submitted by various interests," said Mr. Hubbard. "Two of these were from the Columbia river, the Ballin type and ours. I was personally assured by the chief surveyor of the American bureau of shipping that ours is far superior to any other submitted for classification."

"The Columbia river type was designed with a view to the utilization of the present yards, and no changes will be necessary in the ways of the shipyards here that have been building Ferris and Hough types."

Mr. Hall remained in Washington in conference with Emergency Fleet corporation officials and probably will stay there until the fate of the appropriations bill has been decided. Should it pass, as is considered certain, Mr. Hall likely will return with new contracts for shipyards of this district.

INFLUENZA TAKES FOUR AT SEATTLE

All University and School Classes Closed; Public Warned to Avoid Crowds.

Seattle, Oct. 7.—(U. P.)—Four deaths at the university naval training camp marked the toll of Spanish influenza in Seattle Sunday.

Schools, including university classrooms, were closed today in compliance with the health department orders Saturday that also closed theatres, movie houses, churches and all places of public assembly.

Parents were urged by Superintendent of Schools Cooper and by Mayor Hanson to keep children out of the streets.

Efforts to convert the old county courthouse into an emergency hospital were in progress today, and it was announced that accommodations for 100 emergency cases would be ready this afternoon.

City health department physicians answered 33 calls Sunday, all of which bore symptoms of Spanish influenza.

Chief of Police Warren is confined to his home with the malady.

Business Places Closed
Pottsville, Pa., Oct. 7.—The sweep of the malignant type of influenza which caused the drastic orders Saturday closing all business places, reached its height here Sunday when hundreds of ad-

ditional cases were reported. The town of Minersville, 4 miles away, which is surrounded by several mining villages, has a total of 1500 cases and 36 persons are dead there from the disease. Half a dozen emergency hospitals are being established at Minersville, Frakerville and Pottsville, and units of New York doctors and nurses are being sent here by the Red Cross to aid local physicians who are overwhelmed with work.

Wisconsin University Closed

Columbia, Mo., Oct. 7.—(U. P.)—The Missouri university was closed today to prevent the spread of Spanish influenza. No classes will be held until further notice. While there have been no deaths and there are only about 50 cases the disease has developed rapidly in the last few days and the quarantine was fixed to stop the spread as quickly as possible.

21 Die at Camp Dodge
Camp Dodge, Ia., Oct. 7.—(U. P.)—Twenty-one deaths were reported from Spanish influenza by the division surgeon general this morning. He also announced that out of 6000 cases under observation, 4623 were diagnosed as Spanish influenza.

Congress Talks to Empty Chairs
Washington, Oct. 7.—(U. P.)—Congress talked to the empty air today, the galleries in both the house and senate having been ordered closed because of the influenza epidemic.

Investigation Is Urged
Washington, Oct. 7.—(U. P.)—Representative Sully of South Amboy today introduced a resolution for creating a commission of five representatives to investigate and report on the munitions explosions at Morgan, N. J., wrecking that town and South Amboy.

RETRIAL OF \$7800 SUIT FOR DAMAGES IN CIRCUIT COURT

Lad Injured in Motorcycle Collision With Auto Sticks to Case.

Retrial of the case of Charles Morrison, a minor against J. Canby Morgan for \$7800 damages was begun before a jury in Circuit Judge Gatens' court this morning.

Morrison is seeking damages for personal injuries alleged to have been received July 19, 1917, in a collision at Russell street and Vancouver avenue. Morrison was riding a motorcycle, he stated, when he was run into and knocked down by an automobile driven by Morgan. He was seriously injured, Morrison alleges, and his motorcycle badly smashed. Morgan was cutting corners when the accident occurred, Morrison avers.

Morrison was awarded a verdict of \$3800 by a jury last April. The verdict was set aside and a new trial granted by Judge Gatens in May. Retrial was allowed on the ground of newly discovered evidence.

Verdict, for \$6385 in Damage Suit
F. C. Antonsen, who brought suit

against the W. P. Fuller company for \$55,000 for personal injuries in an automobile collision, was awarded \$6285 by the jury, which tried the case in Judge Bean's court. The jury returned its verdict Saturday.

Robert was flagging a Southern Pacific train to come to Portland. Whether he was too close to the track or whether he was drawn beneath the wheels by suction is not known.

To organize Multnomah county into local units and requiring each unit to secure at least 50 enrollees is the aim of the committee. Necessary enrollment blanks will be on hand Tuesday night and the committee will endeavor to form a number of local units.

Faulty Lights Lead To Fines for Many

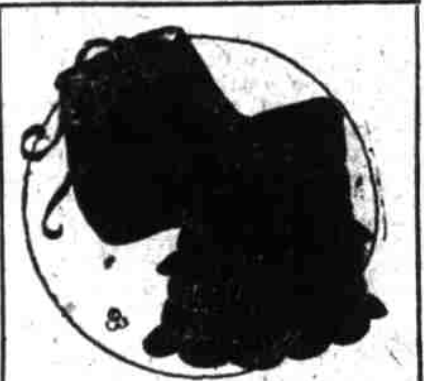
