

CIGAR DEALERS ARE CRITICIZED FOR NOT OBEYING REQUESTS

Chairman of Defense Council Scores Owners Who Refuse to Close Sundays.

William F. Woodward, chairman of the State Council of Defense, caustically criticized the cigar dealers who insist on disregarding the State Defense Council's request for 6 p. m. and Sunday closing in an address before the members of the council of the Chamber of Commerce Monday noon.

Holding in his hand the telegram just received from Franklin K. Lane, secretary of the interior, asking that Oregon respond promptly with her quota of men to meet the emergency in shell manufacture, Mr. Woodward cried, "Can the selling of cigars or the vending of pills stand in the face of such an emergency? Our request for this Sunday and evening closing was to save manpower. We asked that women replace men wherever possible. These people choose to disregard that request. They will understand before we are through why it should be granted."

Major Robert A. Ross, commander of the training department, Benson, and Major Herbert A. Brundage, invader home after service in France, were the speakers of the day. Former Governor Oswald West told the business men that his recent government mission to Europe provided him with the greatest experience of his life and was immediately asked by Chairman Thompson to be the speaker at the members' council next Monday, which he agreed to do.

Alleged Member of Red Guard Is Held Under Arrest Here

Elmer Kumpula, a Finn, supposed to be a Red Guard and an I. W. W., was arrested by the United States marshal Monday on a warrant issued on complaint of Assistant United States Attorney Goldstein, alleging violation of the espionage and sabotage acts in making remarks against the United States and the Liberty bonds. These remarks, it is alleged, were made to other Finns, employed in the Grant Smith-Porter shipyard.

Kumpula has been in this country five years and has made no attempt to obtain his first papers. In his room were found Finnish books and radical literature. I. W. W. books were also found.

Captain F. S. Sever Wounded; Degree Is Not Yet Known

Captain Frank Sinclair Sever has been wounded in France, according to a cablegram received by his wife, who resides at 561 Davenport street. No particulars were given but it is not thought the wound was serious.

Captain Sever is the son of Mrs. Mattie S. Sever, 936 Couch street. He attended the first officers training camp at the Presidio, where he received his commission, and was assigned to the 363d Infantry, Ninety-first division. He has been abroad for some time. He was formerly a member of the firm of Sever & Cooke.

German Alien Held Upon Three Charges

Assistant United States Attorney Goldstein will file complaint against Ernest Cronki, who was arrested by Ensign G. C. Spaulding as he was attempting to ship as a boatswain on the steamer Bancroft, on three charges, alleging non-registration as a German alien entering the barred zone without a permit and trying to leave the United States without securing permission from Washington. Cronki declared he had taken out his citizenship papers in Portland, but this was found to be untrue. His internment will be recommended.

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MOTHERS, WIVES AND SISTERS TO COLLECT ARTICLES FOR BOYS

Many Women's Organizations to Help Gather Linen for Soldiers Saturday.

Mother, wives and sisters of Portland boys who have gone into the nation's fighting forces, the 3000 of them who marched in the notable mothers' parade, are to join in the collection of the 37,000 "linen" articles needed by the hospitals that care for those boys who encounter illness or injuries.

Mrs. Sarah Evans, who had charge of the mothers' parade, conferred with Mrs. Ferdinand Reed, chairman of the drive, and pledged the assistance of this body of women and girls.

The Council of Jewish Women has responded to the call, and will help collect the sheets, towels and handkerchiefs under direction of Mrs. Julius Louison. One third woman edged into the collecting station in room 406, Oregonian building, and handed over two handkerchiefs, apologizing for the insignificance of the donation. Those who witnessed the incident were more touched by the sacrifice than by the costly donations brought directly from the shelves of a store.

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Well Known Local Girl Arrives Safe In France, Report

A. H. Aldrich of Canby has received advice that his daughter, Miss Elisabeth Aldrich, well known Portland girl, has arrived in France, where she will work as stenographer in the engineers' division of the war department.

She had previously been attached to the same department at Washington, D. C., and was transferred to duty overseas. Miss Aldrich's brother is E. B. Aldrich, editor of the East Oregonian at Pendleton. Another brother died last spring at Fort Sill, Okla.

Must Stop Wearing Special Police Star

All boys wearing special police stars and special United States mail stars have been ordered arrested by Chief of Police Johnson. Only those carrying proper credentials in addition to the star will be permitted to keep their badges worn by the police. Reports have come in that the boys are "flashing" their stars unscrupulously, even to using them as a cover for riding on sidewalks.

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
