

PRISON SCANDAL INVESTIGATION IS ON IN FULL SWING

District Attorneys Evans, Gehlhar and Hill and Attorney General Brown at Penitentiary.

WARM TRAILS ARE FOUND

Legal Officials Are Said to Have Become Intensely Interested by Developments.

Spokane, Oct. 11.—Assisted by District Attorneys Walter H. Evans of Multnomah, Max Gehlhar of Marion and Gale S. Hill of Linn, Attorney General Brown today has his investigation of the penitentiary parole scandal in full swing. All four officials are at prison interviewing convicts and it is known that they are on such warm trails that all have become intensely interested. When results of their investigation finally become public it is predicted that convictions which will shock the people of Oregon will be revealed. Evidence is said to be accumulating that convicts have been preyed upon by persons placed in authority over them and that tomorrow night he would attend the Columbus day celebration in the Metropolitan opera house. Bernstorff Tried To Buy Munitions Plant in America

Washington, Oct. 11.—(U. P.)—Further proof of Germany's pernicious work in this country was made public today by revelation of the alien property custodian that the Bridgeport Projectile Company, Bridgeport, Conn., had been taken over because of German control. Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador, and other leaders in this country, it was shown, had arranged to set the company so as to hamper munitions output for the allies. The company was to corner the market on munitions supplies, and, while ostensibly taking contracts for allied orders, was never to deliver them. The backers, who had also endeavored efforts to create a munitions embargo, stood ready to spend \$10,000,000 in their attempt to cripple the munitions trade.

President Goes to New York to Attend Liberty Celebration

Washington, Oct. 11.—(I. N. S.)—President Wilson left for New York today, where he will attend the Liberty day celebration tomorrow. He was scheduled to arrive in New York late this afternoon, and will remain until Sunday afternoon. Although his program was not to be arranged until he had consulted with Colonel E. M. House, it was said that he would attend the theater this evening, and that tomorrow night he would attend the Columbus day celebration in the Metropolitan opera house. PORTLAND MINISTER FLOODED AND GASSED BUT LIQUOR CAPTURED

Rev. Boudinot Seeley Stands by Booty Despite Tactics of Porters; Two Held.

Withstanding gas attacks and floods, Rev. Boudinot Seeley uncovered an alleged bootlegging plot, caused the arrest of a Pullman porter and captured the liquor. The minister laid his evidence before the United States attorney's office and presented one of the porters, as evidence. Mr. Seeley left Cottage Grove on an early morning train Thursday. Passing through a tourist sleeper he discovered the porter examining a cache of liquor. He determined to stand guard until an opportunity came to turn it over to the authorities. The porter flooded the car floor with water an inch deep in an effort to oust the minister, but without success. Another porter was called on for help. The two emptied a bottle of formaldehyde under the minister's nose, but did not succeed in driving him from his post. "I was in a serious predicament, with water running on the floor and the gas fumes so strong that they drove the negro out," said Mr. Seeley, "but I climbed up on the baseboards of the passageway and held my nose, determined to stand guard. The minister persuaded the conductor to telegraph ahead and one porter was taken off the train at Eugene with 30 pints of liquor. The other was taken in charge here, but later was released. Mr. Seeley is assistant superintendent of home missions for Oregon for the Presbyterial church. Major General Sir C. H. Powell, K. C. B., head of the Red Cross in England, has arrived at Washington.

Constitution for Mid-Europe Union Is Being Drafted

Washington, Oct. 11.—(U. P.)—Drafting of a constitution for the mid-European union, recently organized by leaders of subject peoples in central Europe, is under way today. Dr. Thomas Masaryk of the Czechoslovak national council, chairman of the union, is working on the document which will be submitted to leaders of seven nationalities comprising the organization. Each national group will be given one vote in determining all important questions, according to the present plan. Specific applications of President Wilson's principles of self-determination will be made in the plans of the mid-European union for breaking up Austria.

Serb Army Within 10 Miles of Nish; Capture 3000 Huns

London, Oct. 11.—(I. N. S.)—(11:30 a. m.)—Serbian troops, advancing on Nish, former capital of Serbia, have progressed 10 miles north of Leskovatz, capturing 3000 prisoners and a number of heavy guns. The Serbs are now about 10 miles from Nish. Leskovatz is 20 miles south-east of Nish.
