

Dr. Crockett Seeks Women For War Duty

DR. MARQUERITE CROCKETT addressed about 200 of Portland's representative men and women at a luncheon given Thursday at the University club. Dr. Crockett came to Portland for the purpose of recruiting women for overseas duty for the Y. M. C. A. She presented her cause in an interesting way, giving the history of the canteen service in which she was actively engaged until recently. To be acceptable for this service, women do not necessarily need to have had special training, she said, but must be in good health, with good dispositions, as the work is trying and great endurance is one of the requisite features of a successful canteen worker. Mrs. Helen Ladd Corbett was in charge of arrangements for the meeting.

Game for Children

Women Cow Testers

New Twine Crochet

KNITTING bags we have had made in every conceivable shape and from every conceivable material, but by some strange paradox the very newest bags consist of twine crocheted work. They really aren't as crude as they sound—in fact they aren't crude at all. The twine is carefully prepared for the purpose by being thoroughly waxed, so that it slips over the crochet hook readily, and when finished the bag has very considerable "body."

The crochet stitch used is extremely loose and open making a very wide mesh. The work proceeds in the shape of a large rectangle to the desired size, then the two ends are placed together and the side seams closed. A lining of brightly colored silk or cretonne is made so that it fits neatly inside.

But the way the tops of these novel bags are finished is quite as clever as their materials. Instead of being gathered in in the usual way, or ended off on a pointed brace, the lining and the crocheted are tacked loosely together and then bound over with a bias strip of felt. Brightly contrasting flat flowers made of felt finish off the ends, covering the ends of the narrow felt bands which form the handles.

Can't you just picture a knitting bag like this, made of white cord waxed to a high polish and lined with old gold silk? The felt binding and loops are dark African brown and stunning flat blue and yellow flowers and futuristic fruit decorations. And the best part of it is you can make one for yourself on your own individual color scheme, which will suit you much better than the one described. All you need is a ball of twine, a few pieces of oddly shaped felt and a little ingenuity.
