

McADOO APPEALS TO AMERICANS TO BUY MORE BONDS

Governors of States Asked to Urge Importance Upon Their People in Proclamations.

FARMERS ARE URGED TO BUY

More Than Half of New Issue Remains to Be Subscribed, With but Week Left.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—(U. P.)—William G. McAdoo, secretary of the treasury, today sent the following telegram to the governors of all states:

"One week of the fourth Liberty loan campaign remains and three and one half billion dollars have yet to be raised. The American people can provide this money if they are fully aroused to the imperative necessity of doing so. Without the \$6,000,000,000 registered for the fourth Liberty loan the great victories of our soldiers in France will be nullified. The home army must not turn the victories of the field army into defeats. The home army must not render valueless the bloody sacrifices of our heroes. The home army must, on the other hand, transform the victories of the field army into the final and mighty blows which will forever destroy despotism and its menace to the liberties of the world.

Make Appeal to Public
"Will you not issue a proclamation to the people of your state, appealing to them to subscribe immediately to the limit of their ability to the fourth Liberty loan—ask the rich and poor alike to buy Liberty bonds and stamps. Urge them when they cannot pay cash for them, and urge the banks and bankers of your state to carry purchasers of bonds on the installment plan at the same rate of interest that the bonds bear, namely, four and one quarter per cent."

"The banks must help the people by lending them money to buy Liberty bonds and the people must help the banks by subscribing for them as promptly as possible. We must help each other if our army is to make certain that the great victory now in sight is clinched.

Secretary McAdoo spoke tonight before a crowd which jammed the Auditorium theatre. The city had prepared for a "Liberty Bond revival" during the day, with a big Columbus day parade. Tightly packed crowds had cheered for hours a procession of 150,000 sailors, soldiers and civilians inspired to marching by 90 bands.

"It takes American locomotives to keep up with the fleeing Germans," said the secretary. "Let us see that the locomotives are furnished for the chase."

"Use your credit," urged McAdoo. The president has said, but not felt, "measured by purchasing bonds on the installment plan."

McAdoo's suggestions included the purchase of bonds and Savings Stamps for Christmas presents, the purchase of more bonds on the installment plan and the conversion of sinking and trust funds into bonds.

The secretary said:
"The fact that only one week remains to subscribe the fourth Liberty loan and that we are still short about \$2,500,000,000, makes it necessary to consider some of the specific things that must be done to win success. Many families, for instance, think they have done their full duty when the head of the family subscribes for bonds, but the head of the family has not done his full duty unless he has bought all the bonds he can pay for immediately and in the near future.

Farmers Can Buy More
"If the wife is able to buy bonds and has not done so, she should buy them immediately; if the children are able to buy bonds and have not done so, they should buy immediately. In every family the question should be immediately reviewed and additional subscriptions made as soon as it is possible to do so."

"A word particularly to farmers: They did splendid work in the third Liberty loan, but they must do more for the fourth Liberty loan. Farmers have not yet sold their crops and may not have the ready money to pay for the bonds immediately. But they are selling their crops right along and will soon have the money to invest in Liberty bonds. Each and every farmer in the United States should subscribe for Liberty bonds now

FIRST LENTS MAN TO DIE IN U. S. SERVICE

Thomas K. Anderson died at Camp McHenry near Baltimore, Md., September 30. He was born in Corvallis 21 years ago, and reared in Lents. He enlisted last June at Vancouver and was assigned to the quartermaster's department. Salem, Oct. 12.—Governor Withycombe tonight received a telegram from Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo requesting him to issue a proclamation calling upon the citizens of Oregon to increase their subscriptions to the fourth Liberty loan, and to aid in the final push which is necessary to put the loan over in another week.

Governor Withycombe said he did not deem it necessary to issue a proclamation, but he felt justified in appealing to the patriotism of Oregon and urging all citizens not to hesitate in helping out the government at this critical time.

"We must not hold back because other states have been lagging," he said, "but should display the true spirit of Oregon's patriotism by continuing to contribute, regardless of quota, until the last dollar that our people can subscribe has been secured."

NORMAL SCHOOL FOR EASTERN OREGON GETS LABOR COUNCIL VOTE

Walter Lynn Indorsed as Successor to C. P. Olsen in the State Senate.

The Central Labor council Thursday night, in addition to endorsing the initiative measure to notify delinquent taxpayers by mail instead of by public advertising, indorsed the measure providing for a normal school in eastern Oregon.

Walter Lynn was indorsed for state senator to succeed C. P. Olsen. The legislative committee was authorized to expend \$500 for the promotion of the campaign of labor candidates, with the understanding that as the different unions contributed more would be furnished if necessary. Oscar Horne, candidate for city commissioner, spoke on the needs of the campaign for all labor candidates. C. P. Howard, former president of the Central Labor council, who has been speaking to labor organizations on behalf of war issues, addressed the council on the industrial shortage existing. Otto E. Hartwig, president of the State Federation of Labor, reported nearly \$25,000 collected for the Labor temple, with over \$40,000 more subscribed and shortly to be collected.

LIBERTY LOAN IS MORE THAN HALF SUBSCRIBED IN U. S.

President Wilson and Secretary McAdoo Speak on Gospel of Lending to Government.

CELEBRATIONS MARK DAY

New York's Subscriptions for District Reach \$652,275,150; Chicago District \$404,454,000

Washington, Oct. 12.—(U. P.)—The nation's celebration of Liberty day appears to have pushed the fourth Liberty loan over the \$3,000,000,000 mark. Everywhere, reports received here tonight indicated, loan workers were under an avalanche of subscriptions, an accurate count of which probably will not be complete before Monday.

Only two districts, New York and Chicago, reported official figures tonight, all federal reserve banks being closed on the holiday. New York's subscription at noon aggregated more than \$60,000,000, and Chicago's \$27,000,000. These additional subscriptions brought the New York district total to \$652,275,150, and Chicago's total to \$404,454,000.

Reports from other districts told of intense interest in the Liberty day celebration. In addition to parades and other displays of unusually patriotic celebrations, some campaigning was done in every federal reserve district. Almost everywhere in the nation remained open until late tonight to take subscriptions of late comers.

Led by President Wilson and Secretary McAdoo, the gospel of lending money to the government was propounded by hundreds of speakers tonight. The president spoke in New York and McAdoo in Chicago.

Two Are Divorced And Third Would Be at Oregon City

Oregon City, Oct. 12.—Carl S. Williams brought today for divorce from Viola Williams, alleging desertion. The couple were married in Dallas, Or., April 13, 1918.

Helen G. Henkel was granted a decree of divorce from the circuit court and given custody and control of the minor child and awarded \$75 a month for the support of herself and child.

Tullie Phillips also was awarded a decree of divorce from Frank Phillips.

Auto Is Abandoned
Oregon City, Oct. 12.—A Ford automobile bearing Oregon license No. 9922, stolen at Salem some time Friday night by two boys who escaped from the state training school, was abandoned on the Oregon City-Park Place paved road at the approach to the Southern Pacific railroad crossing when it ran out of gasoline. The automobile was brought to Oregon City today by Deputy Sheriff Christofferson, who was going through the city on a hunting trip and, having been advised of the stolen automobile's number, knew where it belonged. The boys are still at large.

Road Contract With Government Upheld

Salem, Oct. 12.—The state highway commission has ample authority to enter into a contract with the United States Forestry department for grading and surfacing a forest road in Tillamook county, according to an opinion given by the attorney general to State Highway Engineer Nunn. The highway commission may contract with the government, which puts up a share of the funds, and do the work by force account.

Thrown 20 Feet—Unhurt
Mantowoc, Oct. 12.—(I. N. S.)—Although the automobile in which they were riding hurtled down a 20-foot embankment on the Lake Shore driveway, Matt Schweinert, an employee in the ship yards, and four companions, escaped injury.

FUNERAL SERVICES TO BE HELD MONDAY

Earl Samuel Cobb, an enlisted soldier in the Eighteenth observation battery, U. S. A., died in Louisville, Ky., October 7. He was the son of Mr. and Mrs. S. B. Cobb and the husband of Mrs. Ada Kendall Cobb of this city, and was 27 years of age. Funeral services will be held from the Holman chapel, Third and Salmon streets, Monday at 2 p. m., and interment will be in Riverview cemetery.

MRS. MIANDA SMITH DIES AT CHEHALEM AT OLD HOME PLACE

Passing of Widow of Sidney W. Smith Recalls Interesting Incidents in Early Oregon History.

McMinnville, Oct. 12.—The death of Mrs. Mianda Baveley Smith, who died at Chehalum valley on October 4, recalls an incident in the early history of the Oregon country in which this territory remained loyal to the United States. Her husband, Sidney Smith, came to Oregon in 1839 and was among the 102 men who met at Champoux in 1843 to decide whether Oregon should become American or British territory, and when Joe Meek drew the line and called for volunteers for the Union, Smith was the first man to cross the line. The late F. X. Matthaei was the last, and cast the deciding vote.

Mrs. Smith was nearly 90 years old. The funeral services were in the Evangelical church at LaFayette and burial took place in the Odd Fellows' cemetery at that place. Rev. Mr. Erskine of Dayton officiating. One daughter, Mrs. J. F. Calbreath of Portland, and a son, John U. Smith, who still lives on the old homestead in the Chehalum valley, survive her.

Mrs. Smith was married to Sidney Smith in 1846, and a pleasing romance is still recounted of their courtship when they planned an acorn upon the grave of Ewing Young, the earliest settler in the Chehalum valley, and where now stands a large oak tree to mark the last resting place of the pioneer.

The history of the settlement of the Chehalum valley is an interesting story in which Mr. and Mrs. Smith were important factors. After a perilous journey across the plains with 18 other young men, Mr. Smith left Peoria, Ill., in the spring of 1839. They were the first to come west with the intention of making permanent settlement. After working for the Hudson Bay company Mr. Smith entered the employ of Ewing Young, who had brought to this section a large band of Mexican cattle from California. When Mr. Young died Mr. Smith was his only companion. He left a large herd of cattle, and having no known heirs, this led to the organization of the provincial government for the purpose of disposing of his estate. Mr. Young had often said that when he died he wanted Mr. Smith to have his property, but the latter refused to accept.

WEATHER BUREAU PLANS NEW CABLE ACROSS COLUMBIA

Present Connection With Fort Canby Entirely Out of Commission; Using Telephone.

LINE TO REACH NORTH HEAD

New Cable Will Be Shorter and Not at Point Liable to Be Snagged by Steamer Anchors.

Repeated failure of the weather bureau cable across the Columbia river at the mouth, and expensive repairs already engendered by its misbehavior, have led the weather bureau to decide upon the laying of a new cable across the river to gain weather, wind and sea data for shipping and government forecasts.

The cable is now completely out of commission, and the bureau for the past month has been using the telephone cable across the stream. The bureau's cable, which is just outside the mouth, from Fort Stevens to Fort Canby, is snarled by all the tides, and occasionally some ship fouls her anchor in it. The telephone cable crosses from Fort Stevens to Fort Columbia, then across the bay to Fort Canby. From the last point there is a wire to North Head, Wash., where the weather bureau has a station.

The proposed cable will cross from Astoria to Megler, and if possible keep the telegraph poles all the way into Ilwaco, where a line will be run to North Head. On the side of the river, the bureau uses, by an exchange, the wires of the Western Union.

Three of Juvenile Court Men Resign; To Do Other Work

Chief Probation Officer Will F. Spencer and Probation Officers John Murphy and Jesse F. Harrington tendered their resignations to County Judge Tazewell Saturday. Spencer's resignation will take effect October 31, and those of the others immediately. The resignations have been accepted by Judge Tazewell. A. A. Bailey, probate clerk, has been appointed chief probation officer, his place in turn being filled by Oliver C. Thornton. The places made vacant by the resignation of Harrington and Murphy have not yet been filled.

Mr. Spencer said his retirement was actuated by prospect of a better position which he will take up about the first of the year. Harrington and Murphy, he said, have more lucrative positions in other lines.

Voluntary Induction Halted by Epidemic

Major Robert A. Roos, commanding the instruction corps at Benson Polytechnic school, announced Saturday that, on account of influenza, voluntary inductions into the corps had been postponed, although prospective inductees should report at the school Monday at 10:30 a. m., when arrangements will be made for induction after quarantine restrictions are lifted, the date depending on the duration of the restrictions.

Ambassador Sharp Favors Punishment

Paris, Oct. 12.—United States Ambassador Sharp, speaking at a Columbus day luncheon here tonight, said: "After seeing the devastated towns I am unable to see peace until we enter Germany and punish those responsible."

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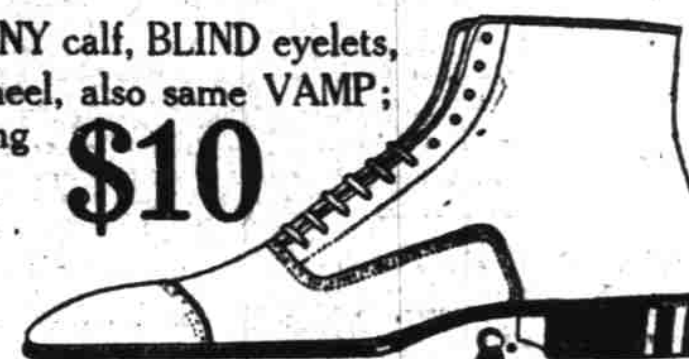
