

# C. N. WONACOTT TO LEAVE TO ASSUME IMPORTANT POST

## Associate Director of Oregon W. S. S. Committee Named to Presbyterian Church Office.

# LEAVES ABOUT NOVEMBER 1

## Becomes Associate General Secretary of General Executive Committee of Denomination.

Charles N. Wonacott, associate director of the Oregon War Savings committee, has accepted appointment as the general secretary of the general executive committee of the Presbyterian church. He will assume his new duties in New York November 1. In the work he will be associated with Rev. William Hiram Foulkes, formerly pastor of the First Presbyterian church of Portland. Dr. Foulkes is general secretary of the Presbyterian general executive committee.

H. C. Melby, who will succeed Mr. Wonacott, has been business secretary here since March, 1911. He came here from Minneapolis. Since Mr. Wonacott has been absent in the War Stamp activities, Mr. Melby has handled most of the details of that position in addition to his own. Several times Mr. Stone has been away from the city and Mr. Melby acted in his stead and carried his own work.

Mr. Wonacott's new office is of national character. Not long ago a federation was effected of the several boards administering the affairs of the Presbyterian denomination in the United States and to be made associate general secretary of the executive committee, which resulted from this federation, is regarded as an appointment of the first rank.

While his duties with the Presbyterian committee will be exciting, Mr. Wonacott intends to give as much assistance as possible to the War Savings effort, because he believes it to be one of the

most permanently valuable thrift stimulating and democratizing influences which has been exerted in the United States.

Mr. Wonacott's connection with the War Savings committee began on January 1 of this year, when State Director C. S. Jackson of the War Savings committee selected him as associate in the campaign to induce the people of the state to subscribe Oregon's nearly \$18,000,000 quota in the thrift securities.

The first five or six months of the campaign were devoted largely to educational work, emphasizing the democratic nature of War Savings Stamps, their value in promoting thrift and in teaching thrift to the growing generation. There followed an intensive effort supported by hundreds of workers throughout the state, and on June 28 Oregon was able to report that her entire quota of War Savings Stamps had been pledged.

At the present time the cash receipts approximate \$12,500,000, with the collection of the remainder proceeding sat-

# WELL KNOWN GRAIN MAN PASSES AWAY AFTER SHORT ILLNESS

## C. L. Wright, Resident of City for 30 Years, Associated With Kerr-Gifford Co.

After an illness of six weeks, C. L. Wright, a well known grain and shipping man of Portland, died Saturday morning at St. Vincent's hospital. Mr. Wright came to Portland 30 years ago and engaged in his business in the machinery business with his brother, the late Z. T. Wright. In 1888 he entered the employ of the Pacific Coast Elevator company and later joined the Kerr-Gifford company with which he was associated for 29 years until his health compelled him to retire.

When Pacific coast grain was diverted to the East two years ago, Mr. Wright was sent to Baltimore, where he was dispatching grain cargoes for Kerr-Gifford & Co. until last June, when he returned to Portland and resumed his old position on Albin dock.

Mr. Wright is survived by three brothers, E. W. Wright of Portland, Fred B. Wright of Astoria, and Captain Walter H. Wright of Nelson, E. C. and his wife, Mrs. James Scobee of Salt Lake, Mrs. Arthur P. Johnson of Seattle, Mrs. George Robertson, Mrs. Jennie Bushnell and Miss Edith Wright of this city. Funeral services will be held at Finley's chapel at 1:30 p. m. Monday.

Mr. Wonacott was born in Missouri, but his parents brought him, when 6 months old, across the plains in a covered wagon to Douglas county, Or. After he had finished his public school work in Southern Oregon he came to Portland in 1899 for a business college course. He became later a ticket clerk for the O-W-R. & N. at Wallace, Idaho. In 1906 he became an office secretary in Southern Oregon he came to Portland from step to step to the associate general secretaryship. He is an elder of the Rose City Park Community Presbyterian church. He expects to leave Portland about October 25.

Thomas C. Taylor, who died suddenly in Bend Thursday, was an eminent Mason, an active and honored public citizen and a man known for his faithfulness to trust and responsibility. He was twice elected state senator from Umatilla county in the 90's and before that had been mayor of Pendleton.

Mr. Taylor was a native of Massachusetts and started life as a farm hand in Eastern Washington. From 1888 until about six years ago he was one of the leading citizens of Pendleton and Umatilla county. He removed to Portland six years ago. Mr. Taylor was grand commander of the Knights Templar in 1907.

It was while attending the grand commandery in session at Bend that he was stricken with apoplexy. Mr. Taylor is survived by his wife, and had no immediate relatives in Oregon. The funeral services will be held at the J. P. Finley establishment, Fifth and Montgomery streets, Sunday at 2 p. m. Under the regulations now in force the funeral will be strictly private, and only the pallbearers and a very few others will attend. The body will be cremated.

# OREGON IS LAX ON PROVIDING MARKERS AT HISTORIC POINTS

## George H. Himbs Says More Attention Should Be Paid to Placing Markers.

Markers for more of the places of historic interest in the state should be set up, thinks George H. Himbs, curator of the Oregon Historical society. Strangers frequently inquire about points of interest, and so far markers have been extremely meagre, according to the historian, although many of the historical locations have been determined.

Oregon is much more lax than Washington in this respect, said Mr. Himbs, who old of numerous markers set up north of the Columbia river. Mr. Himbs referred to the two markers recently established near Goldendale, one at a cross roads where Andrew J. Bolon, Indian agent, was captured by the Indians, and one in the mountains on the identical spot where he was killed and his body burned, in 1824. Mr. Himbs, who attended the ceremonies, brought back with him a copy of a letter written by Joel Palmer, superintendent of Indian affairs at the Dalles, dated October 3, 1855, telling of the incident.

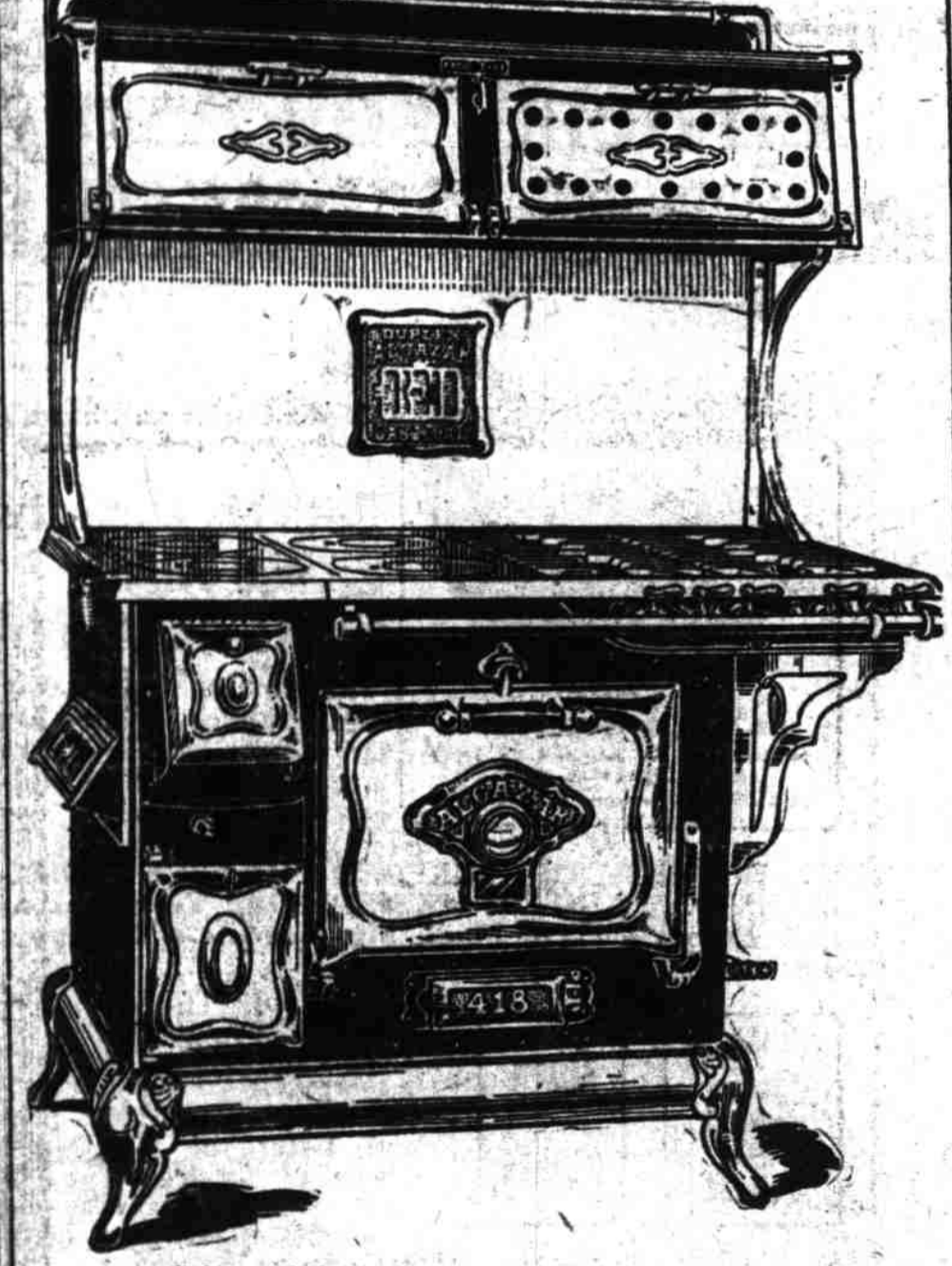
