

GERMANS PUT UP HARD RESISTANCE

Allied Forces Driving Wedge
Into Belgium Heavily
Shelled.

With the British army in Flanders, Oct. 14.—(U. P.)—Allied forces driving into Belgium have thrust their wedge across the road from Bruges to Courtrai, severing another artery of communication to the U-boat base.

French cavalry has swept over Lichtervelde and Thorout, advancing toward Bruges and the sea. Toward the southern end of the fighting front, British troops have taken a series of attacks in the neighborhood of Haubourdin, three miles from Lille.

Germans Are Liberal With Shells
The Germans are using prodigally the great stores of shells in the Belgian coast bases. It is becoming evident they will be unable to save these munitions, so the enemy is using them up as fast as possible. Their batteries gave out a series of heavy responses than any other time in recent weeks.

"What's (bang) the peace (bang) news now (bang)?" asked a British officer on the northern front today as the great battle raged, and the shells plied all around. So the conversations were carried on. Every two or three words being punctuated by a jarring crash. It was a real, two-sided contest.

Although the Germans are forced to spend lavishly their shells to keep them from falling into the hands of the allies, they have time to remove a considerable quantity of war material before the long-dreaded Belgian offensive was launched.

Germans Aware of Attack
By transporting much of this to the rear, the high command rendered the enemy army fairly mobile. Yet, vast stores still line the coast, showing clearly the Germans had no intention of surrendering this territory.

The Germans knew the allied attack was coming and tried to forestall it by the use of the tactics with which Foch defeated the last German offensive July 15. The British, French and Belgians were to start at 5 a. m. Three hours earlier the Germans put down a heavy barrage of their own, seeking to break up our troop concentrations.

Peace discussions have taken none of the fighting spirit out of the allies. All the soldiers are keen for keeping "hot" after the Rhine.

"I saw a stream of 'walking wounded' going to the rear and asked one grinning British private where he was hurt. "I'm not wounded," he said. "I'm on leave."

I asked what he was doing there and he explained that he was being sent to-day but he got special permission to fight, fearing that this might be the last battle of the war and feeling hungry for another go at the enemy. That's the spirit of the men.

On the other hand, many German prisoners frankly announced that they had had enough—were "fed up," as the British might put it. This spirit is not general throughout the enemy army, however. The fighting of the Bavarians in this battle has surpassed any German battling seen in France or Flanders since the tide turned.

The Sixth Bavarian division, for example, pushed its way through the British barrage and established machine gun posts beyond it. Like sportsmen, the officers and men of General Plummer's British army saw and appreciated the action and praised it.

dynasty. It may grow. Officials hope that it will. But they say that the United States has too much to do from the standpoint of successfully prosecuting the war to slacken efforts while waiting for possibilities.

Socialist Politicians Used
Incidentally, entente diplomats who are in possession of many facts concerning the German situation, that they do not desire to make public at present, pointed out today that the so-called Socialist leaders who are being used by the Kaiser and the war command to camouflage the German situation, are in reality simply professional politicians who have played the game of the "all-highest" ever since he plunged the world into war.

"Political reform in Germany will be a reality only when the announcement is made that Dr. Karl Liebknecht has been released from prison, for that and his former associates are to be actual factors in shaping Germany's political future," explained one of these diplomats today.

Socialist Leaders Uphold Policy
"The Germans are talking about the anti-war leaders that they have summoned to power. Not a single name so far mentioned is that of a man who has at any time raised his voice in protest against Germany's brutal policies on land or sea. They sent Liebknecht to jail when he suggested peace on broad terms. And they still have him there, so far as anyone now knows. The Socialist leaders of the reichstag have approved a policy of frightfulness and their elevation to cabinet posts, or to positions as advisers of the Kaiser, primarily is designed to fool the neutrals and Americans. Faces may be changed; but men—not yet."

This official declared that the refusal by the president to fall into a peace trap that would have allowed the German high command to have saved its armies in the field in France and Belgium was a crushing blow to the German hopes. It will still further shatter a seriously weakened morale at home. Eventually, it will have an important effect in aiding a real movement for peace among the Germans themselves. But officials generally do not look for such a movement to develop until the whole force of the president's decision has had an opportunity to sink into the hearts of the German people.

Answer Generally Indorsed
Administration officials today commented on the general indorsement of President Wilson's decision by the people of the country. The reply apparently has satisfied the majority of Americans. There remains, of course, a very considerable element which favors no consideration of any proposition from Germany but one of complete and unconditional surrender. This movement, officials said today, seemingly was centered in Chicago. However, officials in no way criticized the dissemination of such a sentiment at present. It was only the natural outgrowth of the bitter resentment against Germany which now is felt everywhere in the United States, they said. And when the time comes to make a real peace, the views of the neutrals, and the entente allies will prevail, they said, and these views are too well known to need additional explanation.

President Wilson had only one engagement today. That was with the war cabinet which approves various necessary measures for speeding up the war. Much of the president's day was devoted to consideration of the latest data dealing with the Austro-Hungarian situation. The president probably will not reply to the Austrian peace note until he has before him details of the manner in which his decision in the German appeal was received in Berlin and throughout Germany. But officials who knew his views will await with very great interest publication of that note because they believe that it may open the way for the separation of Germany and the dual empire.
