

MORE NAMES ARE GIVEN OF VICTIMS LOST WITH VESSEL

War Department Lists Two Lieutenants and 99 Privates Who Went Down With Ticonderoga.

SHIP TORPEDOED SEPT. 30

Names Are Also Published of 14 Additional Survivors; 113 Named in Previous Death List.

Washington, Oct. 22.—(I. N. S.)—A list containing the names of two lieutenants and 99 privates who lost their lives when the Ticonderoga was torpedoed in mid-ocean on September 30, while eastbound, was made public by the war department today, together with the names of 14 additional survivors. The department previously had announced the names of 11 naval officers and 102 enlisted men who perished, three officers and five men who were saved, and two officers who were taken prisoner by the submarine.

FLU EPIDEMIC IS STILL SPREADING

Disease Under Control in Army Camps, but Still Gaining in Civilian Communities.

Loyal Legion Adds Big Sum to Loan, Says Gen. Disque

Brigadier General Eric P. Disque expects a total of \$8,500,000 in extra subscriptions to the fourth Liberty loan from members of the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen. He reported Sunday evening to Secretary of the Treasury McAdoo that replies from one-sixth of the organization showed that \$1,500,000 had been subscribed. His message follows:

"The spruce production division and the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen have given the fourth Liberty loan an additional boost amounting to \$1,500,000 already reported. Reports to date are in from only one-sixth of the total will reach \$8,500,000. This is in response to your message of October 18.

"Practically all had already over-subscribed their quotas before this last appeal and the splendid return is only another evidence of the real patriotism of the lumber industry of the Pacific northwest, one of the greatest industries that has met every governmental requirement without labor disturbance and without profiteering on the part of employer or employee. There is only one thought here and that is to win the war."

Receives Call to Artillery School

Erkine Wood of the firm of Wood, Montague, Hunt & Cookingham has received orders to leave for Camp Zachary Taylor to enter the officers' training school for the artillery corps.

Washington, Oct. 22.—Telegraphic reports from various sections of the country indicate that the influenza epidemic has not yet reached the great in civilian communities.

Up to date 25,000 cases have been reported in California. New cases were reported from various sections of Alabama and Arkansas. Conditions in Delaware and Connecticut are reported as being serious, while the epidemic is said to be declining in Georgia and Idaho. It is estimated that the number of cases in Pennsylvania will reach 350,000.

In Utah the disease is reported as still spreading. Cases were reported as increasing in the states of Washington and Wisconsin.

Reports to the surgeon general's office from the army camps of the country indicate a steady falling off in the number of new cases and deaths. Up to date there have been a total of 290,447 cases of influenza and 48,055 of pneumonia among troops training in the country.

made by City Health Physician Dr. George Parrish. In anticipation of more patients the hospital has been enlarged. The National Hospital association, Newark building, is making a similar appeal.

Remarkable improvement in a woman patient at the Auditorium who had received 50,000 anti-toxin units is reported by Dr. Parrish. The woman's condition had been serious and the anti-toxin was resorted to by Dr. Parrish.

Principal C. E. Cleveland of the Benson Polytechnic school, who was taken ill with influenza last Sunday, is much better today according to instructor O. T. Larson. About 30 students at Benson school are sick, although the general situation is greatly improved. High praise is given the nurses on duty at the Benson.

According to the city health bureau about 35 deaths have been traced to Spanish influenza in Portland since the deadly first got hold here October 7. The death rate is considered small in comparison with the population and the record of some other cities.

Improvement Noted at Chehalis

Chehalis, Wash., Oct. 22.—The more dangerous type of the influenza in Chehalis is receding according to the statement of City Health Officer Dr. U. W. Kennelott. There are still about 60 cases in Chehalis. Dr. G. H. Dow, county health officer, states that there are apparently less dangerous cases at Bunker, but the virulence has moved eastward to Littell, where 15 men in the logging camps were taken seriously with it Sunday. Superintendent Horn of the State Training school was stricken with the epidemic Sunday. There are 70 cases now in the institution. Harry Bovee, whose home is near, died at the school Sunday night. He was 16 years of age.

Robert Stewart Dies

Medford, Oct. 22.—Robert Stewart, of this city, died 21, who died at Eugene Friday night of Spanish influenza, has two brothers now serving in France, Gilbert Stewart, who is a member of the Fourth engineers; and Miles, who is with the 25th engineers. Robert was a talented musician. Besides two brothers, he is survived by his parents and a sister, the latter now taking the nurses' training course at Lane hospital in San Francisco.

Two Die at Grants Pass

Grants Pass, Oct. 22.—Within two deaths to its credit in this vicinity Sunday, Spanish influenza is spreading to some extent and increasing its number of victims. Seventeen new cases were reported by the local physician in this city Monday, a few of them severe, but the majority of the cases are light and might be termed bad colds or la grippe. The schools are still closed and there is a ban on public gatherings.

Hood River Closed

Hood River, Oct. 22.—Hood River schools are closed because of the spread of Spanish influenza in this city. More than 60 cases have been reported by local doctors. To date there has been but one fatality, that of Mrs. Richard Hanna, of the Mount Hood district, on Friday, but a great number of people are seriously ill with the disease.

Attack at Philomath Light

Philomath, Oct. 22.—Arthur Bottom, oldest son of Eugene Bottom of this place died Monday from pneumonia following an attack of influenza. This is the second death occurring from influenza in this locality. Other cases have been so light the schools opened again Monday and business was resumed as usual.

518 New Cases at Seattle

Seattle, Oct. 22.—(I. N. S.)—Five hundred and eighteen new cases of influenza and 11 deaths from the disease were reported to the city health office here in the last 24 hours. Many of the new cases developed Sunday, but were not reported until today. The number of new cases is showing a decrease.

Pacific University Closed

Forest Grove, Oct. 22.—In compliance with request of the city health officials, Pacific university has been closed until the Spanish influenza scare shall have passed. The closing of the school was ordered as a preventive measure.

SAYS TALK ON PEACE DANGEROUS

to the latest German peace note by the Daily Mail.

"The note comes out at the same time as the news of the sinking of the steamship Dunkeld in the Irish sea by a German submarine. At the same time comes news of the sailing of food sent by the American commission into Central. The allies have no proof yet of any change on the part of Germany."

"The German note means that Ger-

may must gain time or the state and the German military will collapse," said Lord Northcliffe.

"Peace should be signed in Berlin," declared Lord Charles Beresford. "For a country that has been butchered, for other countries that have been devastated, and for the millions of women that have been wronged, Germany shall meet her merited doom."

The Chronicle calls the note impudent and declares that it is unacceptable.

"It is vague and intended to prolong useless discussion," says the Telegraph.

"The German note means that the German armies shall be enabled to march home with munitions ready to fight," said the Daily Post.

"It is another pally and contemptible assumption of injured virtue and calamity. It is a device to save notorious criminals. To talk with Germany is useless until that country is disarmed and thoroughly defeated."

The Daily News says that the allies must come in line with President Wilson's points.

Hun Press Approves

Copenhagen, Oct. 22.—(U. P.)—The German press generally considers Dr. Sol's reply to President Wilson as a satisfactory basis for further negotiations.

"Should Wilson demand impossibilities, we must reckon on continuation of the war," the Tageblatt declares.

France Dislikes Hun Note

Paris, Oct. 22.—(U. P.)—"The German reply gives no satisfaction to France," a high government official stated to the United Press today. "President Wilson stated that the allied command should dictate the conditions of an armistice. Germany asks it on bases advantageous to Germany. She agitates the question of honor after the most numerous lies."

"I am sure President Wilson cannot be pleased that Germany attempted to make the world believe he was hasty when he denounced her as a murderer. She would like to induce neutrals to verify things which already have been verified, thus to gain time and prolong the conversation."

"Berlin vainly waited for improvement in the military situation. Then

Von Hindenburg brought bad news to Berlin, which consequently set forth in its reply a more ardent desire for an armistice.

"It is possible that President Wilson will make no reply. In case he does, France is utterly confident of his decision."

The Paris Midi considers the German reply avasive.

"The present German government is not responsible," the newspaper declared today. "Scheldemann is no better than Bethmann-Hollweg. He is a 'scrap of paper' man. But President Wilson will not be duped."
