The statements forcefully set forth in unmistakable language the determination of the United States to put forth every endeavor toward the commissioning of one of the greatest merchant fleets the world has ever known. Mr. Hruley said :

"The United States government is building a great fleet of merchant ships for permanency, a fleet to serve the world in years to come, to carry Ameriworld in years to come, to carry Ameri-can trade and to represent truly the ideals and greatness of the American nation. The project to build the fleet was conceived in the emergency of war, but it has never been intended, nor is it intended now, that this great move-ment shall cease when the war is ended.
