CIVIL WAR VETERAN, EDW. D. ROOD, PASSES AT HOME IN PORTLAND

Former Stockman of Eastern Oregon Was One of Leading Citizens of Heppner.

Edwin D. Rood died this morning at his home, 615 East Main street. He was in his seventy-sixth year and was a native of Norway.

Mr. Rood and his twin brother, Andrew, enlisted in Company H, Third Wisconsin volunteer infantry, at the outbreak of the Civil war and served together to its end.

Another brother, John L. Rood of Missouri, also served in the Civil war. The three met for the first time in many years during the G. A. R. national encampment last summer.
