

THEATRES READY TO OPEN; PLAYERS AND FILMS HERE

Silver Screens to Shimmer and Legitimate Stage to Become Animated When Ban Lifts.

MAY OPEN AGAIN SUNDAY

Oscar Figman With "You're in Love," and "Soldier Girl" Companies Await Bookings.

Silver screens that for the last month have reflected only occasional ghost-like shadows from dark motion picture theatres in Portland, will soon shimmer again as silent mummies enact gripping dramas of human emotion, and as high salaried comedians hurl festive custard pies with marvelous accuracy, and beat each other up with joyous abandon.

Just when the "mooles" will open to be sure, is not definitely settled. Next Sunday was set as the day at a conference of theatre managers and city and health officials last week, and then along came the declaration of peace and the mayor's proclamation for a formal celebration, on Saturday. The managers had almost decided it would be a good idea to take advantage of the lifting of the quarantine for that event, and put on their shows for the entertainment of the joy-makers who would throng the streets on that day. Now the Saturday celebration has been postponed to November 28, so there you are again. At any rate the opening day is somewhere near, barring the unforeseen, and smiles are chasing the cares and frowns from the faces of local m. p. magnates.

Legitimate Stage Is Ready So with the vaudeville and stock and "road" managers, also. Local stock companies having been held intact during the quarantine, the players are prepared to go on with the show at a moment's notice. Vaudeville performers reaching Portland during the closed season have been held here, too, so that it will be comparatively easy matter to arrange satisfactory programs on short notice, though the theatrical situation in other cities along the circuits must also be taken into consideration in the matter of advance bookings and transportation.

Fits Has Been Costly Though the quarantine has meant the loss of large sums of money to all theatre managers, they are not disposed to open their houses until the "fit" situation is without a doubt well under control.

Under present conditions rent is the one big item of expense. The minute managers put shows on all sorts of expenses, in front of the house as well as on the stage and screen, mount with rapidity. Managers argue that if they open before patrons are assured that it is safe to go to the theatre, there will be practically no business, anyway. Better no business at all, they say, with little expense, than little business with big expense.

Local managers generally have taken advantage of the quarantine to put their houses in order, so that when they do open they will be sparkling clean and sanitary.
