

CONSCRIPTION TO BE ENDED IN CANADA AT ONCE, OFFICIAL WORD

Depot Battalions to Be Demobilized; Censorship, Except for Bolsheviks, Off.

Vancouver, B. C., Nov. 12.—(I. N. S.)—The military service act, providing for conscription in Canada, is to be suspended immediately, says an official announcement from Ottawa, received here today.

All depot battalions are to be demobilized immediately. No more troops are to be sent overseas.

The news censorship, as applied to Canada, is to be lifted at once, with the exception of the ban on Russian Bolsheviks, who are said to be strong and persistently distributing inflammatory printed matter. The recent ban on this element will remain in force.

"Watch the Bolsheviks!" will be the slogan of the Ottawa authorities.

The Canadian food board will retain office, as it is suggested the coming of peace does not eliminate the need for conservation and increased production. Many of the food edicts affecting restaurants and hotels likely will be modified, also the bacon and sugar restrictions.

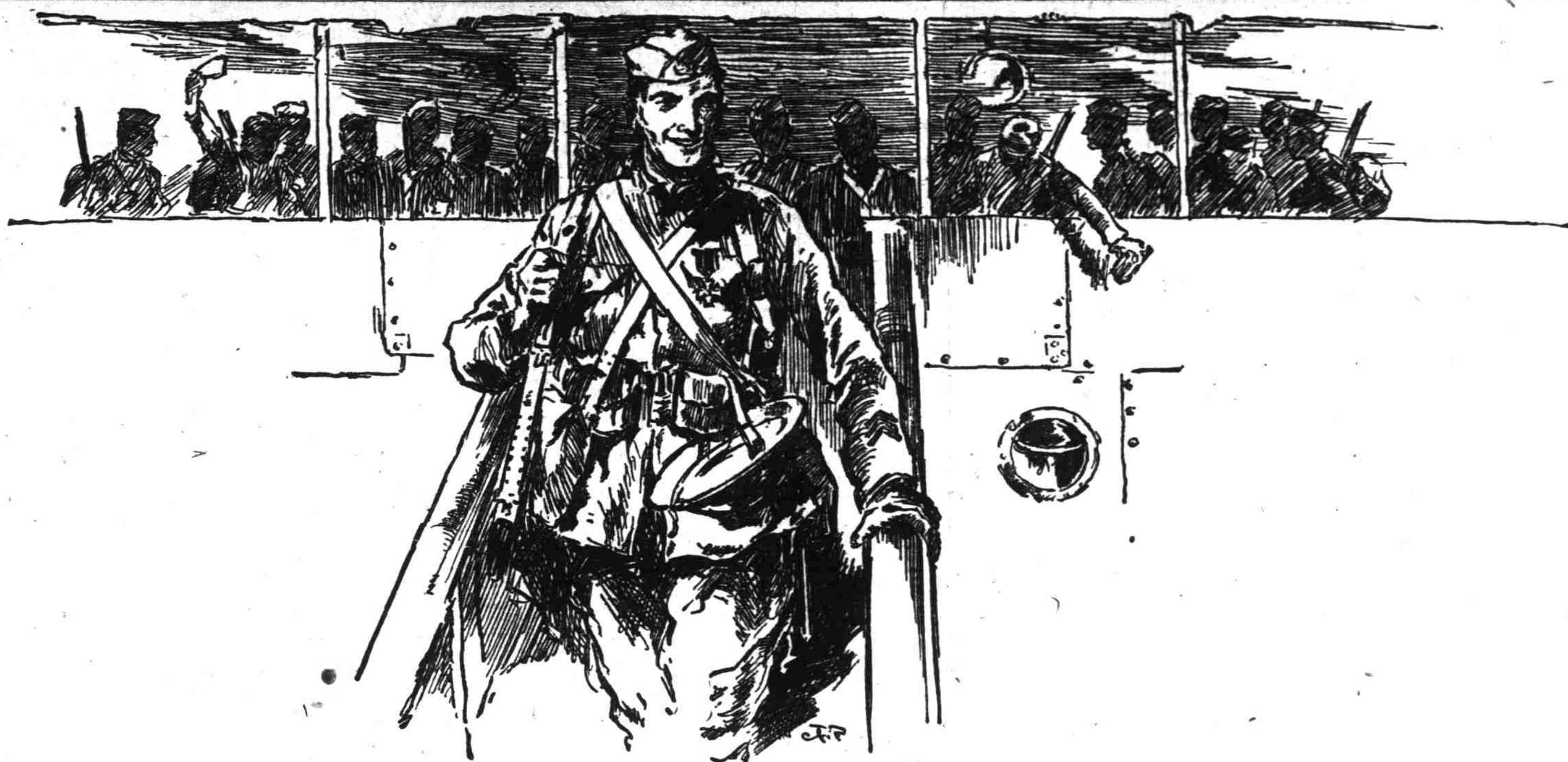
The military service council will disband, but the war trade board will continue to act for a time, as the need for international control of railway supplies is declared to be as great as ever. American officials will be consulted before any definite action along this line is taken.

The imperial munitions board and the war trade board, it is said, are likely to be merged, forming a great dominion central body for the regulation of essentials.

The airplane spruce industry, one of the largest in British Columbia at present, will be discontinued soon, it is said.

Pittsburg Has Fire

Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 12.—(I. N. S.)—Fire which broke out in the three-story building occupied by the Eagle Lubricating company today destroyed that plant and damaged buildings occupied by the Atlas Glass company and the J. W. & G. Barker company, tobacco dealers, before it was controlled. Damage of \$50,000 was done to the Eagle plant.

And we are going to look after them just as carefully all the way back as we looked after them all the way over.

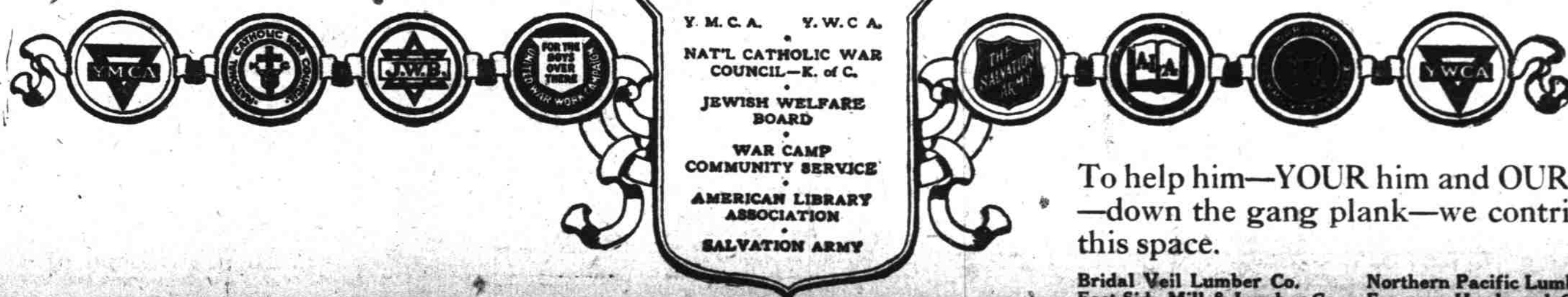
