Buckwheat Flour Prices Fixed—Buckwheat flour should not be sold at more than a pre-war margin and in no event at a higher margin of profit than 12 to 15 per cent, according to information received by W. B. Ayer, federal food administrator, from the distribution division at Washington. This decision has been made, pending a determination of the proper margin that should be allowed wholesale distributors.

Complaint Against Dancing Parties—Residents of the neighborhood of Fremont and Montana streets appeared before the city council Wednesday with an appeal that effort be made to stop the dancing parties given in a nearby hall every other night. The parties extend well after midnight, they said, and cause disorder. Further investigation of the place has been ordered.
