

Parcels May Be Mailed to Nov. 30 To Allied Armies

> Christmas parcels addressed members of the allied armies, medi-cal corps or Red Cross organizations will be received for mailing up to and including November 30, according to advices received from Washington by Postmaster F. S. Myers

yesterday. The original order governing the sending of Christmas packages lim-ited the date of mailing to November 20 and this rule applies to members of military organizations of the United States. Packages sent to the allied armies do not require an ex-

port license and are governed by parcel post regulations, the maximum weight being 11 pounds. Hundreds of Christmas parcels have been mailed already to men in the Canadian, English, French and other allied armies, according to Mr. Myers, and many inquiries have been received



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
