

BIG TASK BEFORE NEW CONGRESS TAX LEGISLATION

Unusual Demand for Drastic Retrenchment, but Many Differ as to Method and Extent.

THE TAX BILL MAY GO OVER

Republicans May Delay Passage of \$6,000,000,000 Revenue Measure Until After March 4.

Washington, Nov. 30.—Congress reconvenes Monday for the short session.

The outstanding legislative task of the session is taxes and appropriations. Although discussion and ratification of the peace treaty by the senate is expected temporarily to set aside the money issue during the session.

There is practically universal demand for immediate and drastic retrenchment, but wide differences exist as to the extent and methods by which economy is to be attained.

The tax question is to be brought to the fore when the senate committee reports the \$6,000,000,000 tax bill, probably on Tuesday. Economy measures will be started when Chairman Sherman and other members of the house appropriations committee begin framing a bill to return to the public treasury every dollar of the \$26,000,000,000 war appropriations remaining unspent.

The tax bill may not be enacted this session, because of Republican opposition to writing into it the tax rates for 1920. Senate Republicans may delay it until after March 4 to force an extra session, which they would control.

In that event it may be necessary to pass resolutions continuing present taxes in force for the time being.

Secretary of War Baker and Chairman Harbord of the war industries board will be the first department heads examined by the committee.

They will be asked to go over their general plans for setting up contracts, tell how many have been cancelled and asked to outline their plans for cancelling more. If there is any idea that they are not moving fast enough, "speed up" legislation will be pushed into the house. When it is framed it will be a bill of precedent in the American congress. It will be called a deficiency bill, instead of appropriating, it will take back into the treasury more money than any peace time congress ever dreamed of taking out.

The house naval affairs committee will resume its hearings on the new naval bill Monday.

Will Report to General Bliss

Washington, Nov. 30.—In connection with the peace conference in Paris General March announced today the following officers of the army have been ordered to report to General Bliss:

Major General Francis T. Kiernan, Brigadier General M. Churchill, general staff; Colonel Ralph Vandeman, Colonel R. H. Jordan, general staff; Colonel L. P. Ayers, general staff; Major Hunter S. Marston, A. C. D.; Major Birch Helms, infantry; Major G. W. Furlong, U. S. A.; Major F. M. Pling, U. S. A.; Captain J. G. Auchincloss, U. S. A.; Captain T. N. Childs, U. S. A.

"The guards, messengers, etc., for the American section in Paris, with our conferees, will be under the charge of Brigadier General William W. Harris, formerly the president's aide at the White House," said General March. "and we have made arrangements in advance for all that."

It was also announced that by order of President Wilson the distinguished service cross will be conferred by General March on General Tasker H. Bliss, Lieutenant-General Hunter, Liggett and Robert L. Bullard and Majors J. T. Dickman, J. W. Andrew and J. G. Harbord.

No marines are among the men designated to return, General March said in reply to a question.

Dr. Chamberlain's Son Dies Suddenly

Charles T. Chamberlain Jr., 19-month-old son of Dr. and Mrs. Charles T. Chamberlain and grandson of United States Senator George E. Chamberlain, died last evening at 7 o'clock after an illness of less than two days. The child was apparently in the best of health until Friday. Funeral services will be held at the residence, 760 Stanton street, at 3 o'clock this afternoon. Final services will be at the Portland crematorium.

Demand Trial for Nolan

San Francisco, Nov. 30.—It has been decided by attorneys for the defense to demand an immediate trial for Edward D. Nolan, the only Preparedness parade defendant who has not yet been brought before a jury. This action will be taken next Saturday morning when the case is scheduled to come up before Superior Judge Franklin A. Griffin. Announcement to this effect was made this afternoon by the International Workers' Defense league.

A resolution passed by the San Francisco Labor Council calls upon Mayor Ralph to suspend District Attorney C. M. Fickert, provided an investigation warrants such action and to have him tried before the supervisors on charges of graft and corruption made against him in the report of J. B. Densmore, director general of employment in the United States department of labor.

Mayor Ralph today refused to say what action he would take in view of the fact that an official copy of the resolution has not reached him.

Foreman McCarthy of the grand jury is making every effort to have Densmore appear before the grand jury, but he has not yet heard from the telegram he sent Governor Stephens asking the chief executive to use his official power to have the investigator testify in the graft charges against District Attorney Fickert and other officials. Densmore, it is understood, disputes the authority of the governor to order him before the grand jury. Densmore is in Seattle.

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From Seattle came the claim voiced by labor leaders that not a wheel will turn in the city when the Mooney strike reaches its height.

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San Francisco labor leaders at a meeting Sunday afternoon will determine a course of action. The labor council last night denounced Governor Stephens, who commuted Mooney's death sentence to life imprisonment, for his "infamous attempt to straddle the Mooney question."

The labor men claim Stephens' action crystallized the Mooney sentiment rather than dissuading it. They declare nothing will satisfy labor except a new trial for the man accused of having placed the bomb that killed ten persons during the 1915 preparedness parade.

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PROTEST STRIKES FOR MOONEY TAKE FORM IN NEW YORK

Central Federated Union, Composed of 300,000 Workers, Pledges Support to Movement.

PARADE IS SET FOR DEC. 7

International Workers' Defense League Official in California Sends Message to East.

New York, Nov. 30.—(U. P.)—Organized labor in Greater New York is planning for a general strike on December 7, in behalf of Thomas J. Mooney.

W. D. Patterson, field agent for the Mooney Defense league in this city, tonight issued a statement that his officers were doing everything possible to bring about a general strike. He said that plans for the protest demonstration were progressing satisfactorily.

The Central Federated union, composed of more than 300,000 workers, has pledged its support to the movement. Patterson said. Other trades unions are voting on the strike proposition.

The New York office of the International Workers' Defense league has received the following from E. D. Nolan, secretary-treasurer of the league's headquarters in San Francisco:

"The Pacific coast is standing pat on strike for December 9 and will not stand for commutation business. This is an organized attempt of California Alliance of Open Shop forces to offset Secretary of Labor Wilson's expose through the report submitted by J. B. Densmore, director of employment."

"Let organized labor stand with the department of labor of the United States and secure justice for trade unionists." A monster Mooney demonstration has been announced to be held at Cooper Union on December 5. Labor leaders declare that if police protection is furnished they will hold a Mooney parade on December 7.

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
