Vocational Guidance Department
Performing Service for Large
Number of Men.

Vocational guidance as applied by the Y. M. C. A. employment and advisory department is proving to be a most helpful means of performing a big service to large numbers of men, according to L. G. Nichols, secretary in charge.

Recently, it was decided by the local Y. M. C. A. officials to make a strong feature of the employment department, emphasizing the advisory feature. This was inaugurated by Barclay Acheson, who had charge until he went to New York to accept another position. It is being continued by Mr. Nichols and will be coordinated with the educational and industrial departments, of which he also has charge.
