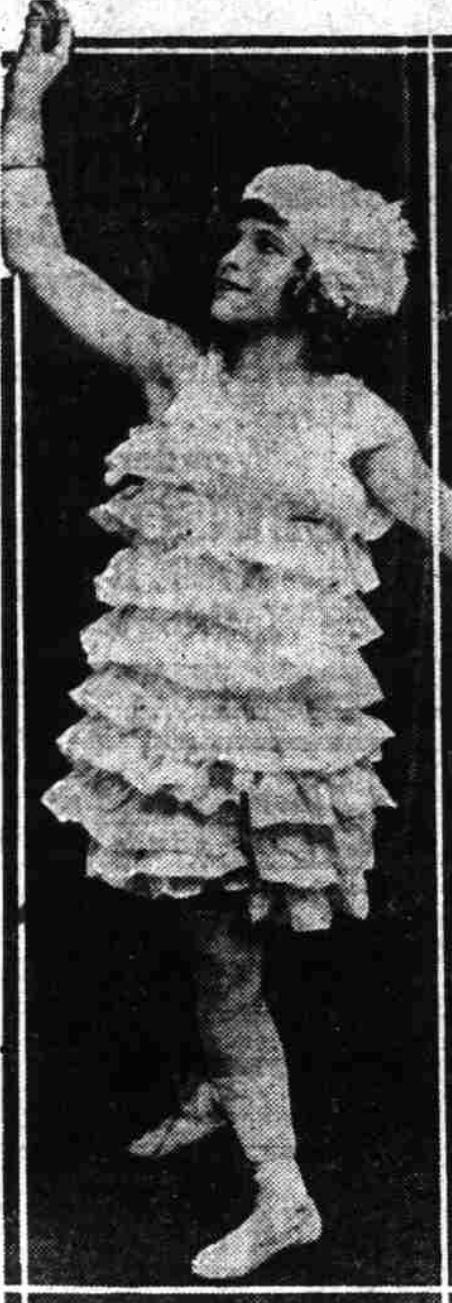

THE Portland division of the American Committee for Devastated France is meeting with excellent success in filling the little red pasteboard socks with dimes to help the poor children of France. Each little sock holds five dimes. They have been distributed among the schools and Hawthorne claims first honors, having turned in \$390 in the little socks. Altogether 1000 of the socks have been turned in and the committee is now in receipt of another 1000 socks from headquarters in New York city. These may be obtained at the headquarters, 504 Platt building. The little sock bears a blank for the name and address of the sender and no doubt many delightful correspondences will result from the sending of this very practical gift to the needy children of far away France.

St. Nicholas Eve. Masque Arouses Wonder of Yanks

Treves, Prussia, Dec. 5.—(Delayed)—The children in Rhensish Prussia occupied by the American army of liberation celebrated St. Nicholas eve tonight the same as in other years. Girls and boys dressed in fancy costumes filled the streets going to the homes where festivities were held. This custom, which is not familiar to the American soldiers, caused them to wonder. One marvel was a pope in white and gold trimmed robes with mitered hat, carrying a staff on his arm. One girl was dressed like a black witch carrying a broom. There was also a flaxen-haired girl with white draperies, gilded slippers with silver paper wings on her shoulders. A few blocks farther down was another 16 year old girl in a German soldier's uniform and high boots puffing at a cigarette.

From the houses came sounds of singing German folk songs. In such surroundings American guards carrying side arms patrolled the streets placidly while demobilized German soldiers, some in civilian clothes and others in uniform, scowled at every American.

In contrast with the German regulations in occupied towns, American officers were cautioned strictly to observe three rules—not to use churches for billeting, not to requisition food supplies and not to interfere with the local government unless trouble made it necessary.
