

WILSON EXPECTED TO TALK TO TROOPS

Christmas Day Will Be Spent at American Headquarters on Western Front.

Paris, Dec. 18.—(I. N. S.)—President Wilson is expected to make his first statement concerning the peace policies of America in his address to the soldiers of the American expeditionary forces at General Pershing's army headquarters at Chaumont, France, on Christmas day.

It is confidently believed here that this address to the fighting men, to whom the president paid such high tribute in his last address before Congress on the eve of his departure for France, will disclose to them the substance of America's aims at the peace conference.

Meets European Premiers
Thus far President Wilson, in his public addresses, has confined his remarks largely to words of appreciation over his reception and admiration for the French people. He has, however, shown a keen conception of the suffering experienced by the people of France during the four years' conflict.

The various French points of view have been given to the president by Premier Clemenceau and President Poincaré. On Thursday the president will confer with Premier Orlando, of Italy, and sound Italian opinion on the momentous questions of the peace conference.

Later in the week, probably Saturday, the president will obtain the British viewpoint from Lloyd George, Foreign Secretary A. J. Balfour and A. Bonar Law, chancellor of the exchequer. From Premier Venizelos of Greece, the president has learned that statesman's views on the Balkan problems.

Have Kept Him Advised
Persons close to the president state that he has secured highly valuable information from his personal representative, Colonel E. M. House, who has communicated his "showed observations" regarding important questions.

It is understood that the president is consulting Colonel House in regard to the speech to be made to the boys in khaki.

The occasion promises to be a dramatic one—a president of the United States thousands of miles from home giving the aims and ideals of America to the men who have supported them on the battle fields of Europe.

Leave Business to See Wilson
The president's mail is filled to overflowing with letters from the French people of all classes. The same note rings in most of these communications, a petition that he visit the battle fields and see the devastation wrought by the war.

The president is still the idol of the French people. It is almost impossible to get any business done in Paris while the public believes there is a possibility of getting a glimpse of the president. Every building housing American officials is fenced with crowds of French people. The sole topic of conversation from street cleaners to high government officials, is the visit of the American executive and what it means to France.

dent Taft was not mentioned by Knox. It was apparent that the differences between them over the League of Nations had led to an open break. Taft is accused by Republican leaders in the senate of conducting an open propaganda to swing Republican senators against the Knox resolution.

The senate foreign relations committee will decide the fate of the resolution on Saturday. The resolution was considered in secret session by the committee for an hour and a half today, but was not allowed to come to a vote because of the apparently even division of sentiment.

The object of my resolution is not to condemn in advance any league of nations of a kind that might in time commend itself to the consideration of the American people," Knox said. "The object of my resolution is simply to postpone the larger and very disputable question of some comprehensive league of nations for that separate and very

deliberate consideration that its nature demands."

Says This Is Not the Time
"If a league of nations may not be a good thing, certainly the agitated days following a great war should not be seized upon to saddle the country with a policy it has not examined and which is not necessarily part of the making of peace," he continued.

"I for one am entirely ignorant of what the president means by league of nations. Conceptions of a league of nations range from a sort of a world republic to a mere entente for certain purposes of the United States and our chief allies—something that need not necessarily cause alarm."

Knox said there were two dangers—one extreme radicalism and the other extreme conservatism—in the consideration of the league of nations idea.

"The path for America's true progress lies through the middle ground of a wise and sound liberalism," he continued. "That middle ground has been vacated often by the political leadership of the day. I appeal to Republicans generally to occupy and make their own middle ground of constructive, wisely progressive, modernized policy that is called for by these great days. And I know that many of my Democratic colleagues feel the same appeal."

Fears Hand Could Be Tied
After calling attention to the constitutional provision that war may be declared only by Congress and the fact that a treaty providing for a league of nations might bind the United States in advance to go to war under "given circumstances," Knox continued:

"How, then, could a president of the United States, even in conjunction with the senate as a part of the treaty-making power, bind in advance the congress of the United States to vacate its pre-decided course under the constitution, of future questions of declaring or not declaring war; nay, more, to surrender to foreign nations their constitutional right to settle some dispute of little interest to them, and to the annulment of so important a check upon war-making dangerously diminish the people's rightful control over that momentous step—the declaration of war?"

By a decision of a league of nations the United States might be called upon to send American troops to a foreign land to settle some dispute of little interest to America, Knox said. He did not believe the American people "would approve such an exigency."

Pleads for Nationalism
"I think the American people—North, South, East and West—Believe in American nationalism," he continued. "I think they believe in nationalism, as an instrument for good. I do not for one moment believe they would be willing to see this country ordered about by a heterogeneous world league of all nations. I do not think that, when they come to study the subject, they will be willing to go farther than a policy of nationalism, a little mitigated and accommodated to a judicious and limited accord upon certain common mutual concerns, especially if that accord be first of all an accord of English speaking peoples and, as it now is in fact, with our principal great allies for the firm enforcement of our war aims."

Sixteen Die When Tourist Car Burns; Inquiry Is Started
Winnipeg, Man., Dec. 18.—(U. P.)—Canadian Pacific officials began today a thorough investigation of the tourist car fire at Bonheur, Ont., in which 16 persons were killed and a score injured. The fire, evidently caused by an overturned spirit lamp in a berth, spread almost instantaneously through the car. Panic caused the death of many, most of the bodies being piled in the doorway. Trainmen discovered the fire only when the train stopped at Bonheur for orders. They were unable to prevent the car burning to the trucks.

No American was among the nine identified dead.

TO MAKE FUTURE WAR IMPOSSIBLE IS TASK NOW BEFORE NATIONS

Dr. Andrew A. Hall Makes Deductions During Life in Battle Zone.

To make all war impossible in the future is the world's big task, declared Dr. Andrew A. Hall, late of the British army, in a dinner address to a company of 120 men at the University club Tuesday evening. "All else does not count," he said, "but the civilization will blot out war or war will blot out civilization," continued Dr. Hall, who called attention to the utter defeat of a weaker nation as the inevitable consequence of the industrial mobilization for war of a stronger nation.

The warmest of welcomes awaits President Wilson in England, declared Dr. Hall, who spent the last three months of the war there, firstly, because he typifies the American people, and secondly, because of the popular approval of his program of lasting peace.

Dr. Hall was the first of the 107 members of the University club who entered service to get overseas and is the first to return from overseas service. Enlisting in a Canadian hospital unit in the spring of 1917 he was sent overseas in the celebrated Arras campaign of 1917. He was wounded and transferred to a British regiment composed of men from the West End of London with whom he served in the campaigns of 1918 until August, when he was invalided to England.

This close acquaintance with the British Tommy has given Dr. Hall a fund of anecdotes about him which he drew upon in effective fashion to emphasize his admiration for the British soldier who, though cordially hating war and the tasks it has imposed, ever "grinned" and never "swanked," continued into the end.

what seems best," declared President Wilson this afternoon.

President Wilson is deeply impressed by the apparent propaganda published in the United States and England and by Republican sentiment in the United States which is lining up to defeat his desires.

During the afternoon the president inspected all the American offices in the Hotel Crillon, later conferring with his four peace conference colleagues. (The four American envoys in addition to President Wilson are Secretary of State Lansing, Henry White, Colonel E. M. House and General Tasker H. Bliss.)

The papal envoy who came from Rome to see the president about the Vatican, presented a message to President Wilson from Pope Benedict XV this afternoon.

An extreme mystery was made of the text of this message. It was allowed to be known, however, that the pope lauded the American executive and explained that he did not desire to interfere with politics in America. The pontiff recognized President Wilson as the champion of democracy.

When the papal envoy left the Murat residence he was in the happiest frame of mind, but refused to say whether the president would visit the Vatican when he reaches Rome in January.

Confident His Stand Will Be Approved

Paris, Dec. 18.—(I. N. S.)—President Wilson is not concerned about the apparent increasing hostility in the United States congress to his plans for a league of nations and for the freedom of the seas. He believes that when all of the facts are known there will not be any attempt by the senate to hold up any treaties that may be entered into.

A President Wilson has frankly told all officials that he has met here his exact attitude and he is now awaiting developments. In this connection, it is understood that he shortly will make an official announcement giving in detail exactly what his plans constitute.

The president intends to get all possible support from Premier Orlando of Italy. The Italian statesman will arrive tomorrow with the king and queen. The president expects to receive the Italian monarch soon after he arrives. The president will return King Victor Emmanuel's visit at once and when these formalities are out of the way President Wilson intends to arrange a conference with Premier Orlando and get down to business.

Italian sentiment has been very friendly towards the American executive.

President Wilson held important conference with Colonel E. M. House, his personal adviser and Secretary of State Lansing today. They both brought reports on developments in the British and French governments which affect the situation.

The American executive is extremely disappointed at the failure to press the important conferences which he had hoped to have this week. He had expected to clear them all up by Sunday.

Plans for a game of golf today on the links at Versailles had to be abandoned on account of the weather. Following his conference with Colonel House and Secretary Lansing the president planned to stay in seclusion at the Murat residence and rest.

Last night's reception at the Sharp residence was extremely picturesque. The president chatted informally with many French officials and seemed to enjoy himself greatly.

A syndicate representing provincial newspapers of all parties sent Mrs. Wilson an immense bouquet.

President Wilson Good Listener
Paris, Dec. 18.—To the diplomatic and journalistic world President Wilson continues to be much of an enigma. Indeed, upon his record of the four days he has spent in France he might go down in history as one of the world's greatest listeners. From the moment of his arrival he has listened and he listens still. Except for two general propositions, not a word of political significance has escaped his lips publicly and official Paris is still totally in doubt as to the position he will take when he draws his chair to the peace table.

From close observations it is clear that whenever he draws near what may be called dangerous water, his attitude becomes one of sounding rather than of asserting. He has listened to President Poincaré and to Premier Clemenceau, as well as to ex-Premier Briand, who represents a far different political group, and he has listened to many other eminent political leaders. He has, indeed, been saturating himself with French opinion. He believes this

to be an imperative an indispensable part of the great task that brought him over here.

But what he thinks, he keeps to himself.

Trained students who watched him during these four historical days find little difficulty, however, in divining one predominant thought that seems to move the president—the thought that the reception accorded him here is convincing proof France is in full accord with him on the main pillars of a lasting peace.

American Control Feared

Paris, Dec. 18.—(U. P.)—America's most potent weapons in the peace negotiations are its shipbuilding facilities and its control of raw materials. It has become increasingly evident that these would be highly important in the conferences, from which President Wilson hopes to obtain acquiescence in American ideals.

Great Britain, it is learned, would like 2,000,000 tons of American built merchant ships and France would like 1,000,000. Both countries are eager to effect an arrangement for distribution of raw materials and assurances against overcharges.

Want Share of Raw Materials
All nations would appreciate the nationalization of America's merchant marine and a share in our raw materials, thus ending America's virtual domination of the world's markets.

America's plans for building entente merchantment and pooling raw materials will be withheld until the attitude of all countries toward the league of nations is definitely ascertained.

It should be constantly kept in mind that the president regards the league of nations as the most essential feature of the peace treaty.

Predicts Peace by June
Paris, Dec. 18.—(I. N. S.)—The preliminary peace conference will be held at the foreign office during the first 10 days of January and will be presided over by Premier Clemenceau, according to an article by Marcel Hutin, in the Echo De Paris today.

M. Hutin predicts that the peace treaty will be signed at Versailles during the early part of June.

Illinois Has New Tax Rate Based on 75 Per Cent Valuation

Springfield, Ill., Dec. 18.—(I. N. S.)—A new state tax rate of 75 per cent on assessed valuation of lands in Illinois for the year 1919 was announced today by the state tax commission, composed of Governor Lowden, State Treasurer Lenamall and State Auditor Andrew Russell. This is a reduction of 15 per cent from the present rate of 90 per cent.

The school tax was set at 18 per cent and general revenue at 47 per cent and the University of Illinois at 10 per cent.

Charles H. Wright, director of the state department of finance, calculates the new rate will result in a saving of \$4,000,000 annually to the state and will also permit of greater efficiency in the collection of tax.
