WEATHER CONDITIONS

Shallow barometric depressions are shown in Western Canada, off the Oregon coast and in the extreme southwest. Over the remainder of the country the pressure is high, the highest readings being on the north Atlantic coast. Precipitation has occurred on the north Pacific coast and in the Plains and West Gulf states. Temperature changes have been unevenly distributed. The most important rises in temperature have been in Northern Montana and Western New York, and the most rapid change to colder has been in Western Nebraska. The temperature is below normal over an area reaching from Eastern Oregon eastward to Nebraska and southward to the Mexican boundary, and is generally above normal in other sections. The greatest excess in temperature is in the upper Mississippi valley.




