

LODGE DENIES DESIRE TO BE PRESIDENT IS BEHIND HIS ATTACKS

Warns World May Be Consumed
While Peace Delayed in Reply
To Charges of Lewis.

Washington, Jan. 3. — (I. N. S.)—“Make peace with Germany now, lest the world be consumed while we delay!” This warning to President Wilson and the peace conference soon to gather at Versailles was shouted in the senate this afternoon by Senator Henry Cabot Lodge.

Replying to the charges of Senator James Hamilton Lewis that his opposition and that of Senator Knox to some of the president's peace points was inspired by political ambitions, Senator Lodge said:

“Incredible as it may seem, it is nothing of that sort we are trying to do. Personal ambitions or the fate of presidents or presidential candidates is infinitely small compared with what is before the senate as a component part of the treaty-making power of the United States.

“It is not the fate of parties with which President Wilson's critics are concerned, but they are concerned with questions involving the future peace of the world.

“A mistake at this time may lead to greater evils than those we seek to avoid. The days are going by and nothing is being done to make peace with Germany. No one is telling us what is happening. The situation is perilous. Every day makes it more difficult to make such a peace as we ought to make with Germany. We are being swept toward I know not what.

“The first duty of the peace conference is to bring peace to the world in 1919, not to try to insure peace for the world in the year 2000.”

Lodge renewed his plea that all peace proposals except those conditions to be imposed upon Germany to insure no new breach of the peace from that quarter, to be over for discussion until after the peace is made.

Alleged German Is Arrested When One Sentence Expires

Silvio Bartolo da Bon, alias William Doffin, former cook in the Third Oregon, who was sentenced to serve 10 months in the Multnomah county jail by Federal Judge Wolverton last April upon being convicted of a charge of perjury before United States Immigration Inspector R. P. Bingham, has been turned over to the military authorities at Vancouver barracks, Wash., as per orders received from the attorney general at Washington, D. C. Doffin's sentence was completed Thursday night.

Doffin, it is said, displayed unusual interest in Prussian affairs after the United States entered the war, and at the time he appeared before United States Immigration Inspector Bonham he claimed to be a German. This, his counsel stated at the time of the trial, was done for the sole purpose of evading service in the Italian army.

Search of his room revealed numerous pictures of the kaiser, German officers, a German flag and a map of Fort Lawton, according to government officials. Doffin made the statement to Robert R. Rankin, who was then assistant United States attorney, that he was an Italian, and it was on this statement that the complaint was issued.

Doffin was arrested at Pendleton as he was en route east with the Oregon troops. At the time of the arrest it was alleged that Doffin was a German spy.

Just what charge will be placed against Doffin by the military authorities is unknown to United States Attorney Haney.

OLDS ESTATE IN PROBATE

Widow and Chriss A. Bell Are Administrators.

Letters of administration on the estate of Jay Cass Olds, who died in this city last week, were issued by County Judge Tazewell this morning to Bessie H. Olds, the widow, and to Chriss A. Bell. The value of the estate was not stated. The heirs at law mentioned are the widow and a daughter, Mrs. Edith Olds Gray. The bond of the administrator was fixed at \$100,000, which Mrs. Olds and her co-administrator furnished.

Mr. Olds for many years had been associated with the firm of Olds, Wortman & King, conducting in their store an independent business dealing in porcelain and tableware. He moved with them to their present location from the old store on the corner of Fifth and Washington streets.

Lieut. Clendennon Is Ordered Home From France; Was Injured

Lieutenant Darrell Neil Clendennon, soon to be invalided home as a result of injuries received while flying in France, November 15, according to information received by Portland friends. Lieutenant Clendennon first enlisted in 1915 with the British flyers in London, giving up a mining project in Alaska. He saw active service in France until November 12, when he was severely injured and invalided home to Portland. For two years he resumed his mining interests, but in May, 1918, he again enlisted, this time with the United States aviation corps. He served in France until the accident occurred which has caused him to be returned to the United States.

Lieutenant Clendennon will go immediately to Atlanta, Ga., where his stepfather resides. It is feared he may lose his sight.

Lieutenant Clendennon's brother, Sergeant Clyde E. Clendennon, was killed in action July 30, 1918.
