

PRESIDENT IS MADE MEMBER OF NOTED ACADEMY OF LENCEI

Denounces Shameful Methods to Which Scientists of Germany Turned Their Talents in War.

SAVANTS LISTEN TO ADDRESS

Wilson Puts Aside Any Claim to Man of Science, but Delights to Get Into Scholastic Air.

Rome, Jan. 4.—(U. P.)—Denunciation of the "disgrace" and "shame" to which science has been put by the Germans and regret that "science should, in a nation which has made science its boast, have been put to such dishonorable uses" were voiced by President Wilson today in accepting membership to the famous Academy of the Lincei, Italy's great organization of scientists.

The president, declaring that he could not rightfully claim to be a man of science, explained that his life studies have been in the field of politics and government. But he added that "while perhaps there is no science of government, there ought to be."

Distinguished Scientists Present
At the ceremony today, President and Mrs. Wilson were seated beside the king and queen of Italy. Those present included American Ambassador Page, other members of the diplomatic corps and many distinguished Italian officials and scientists.

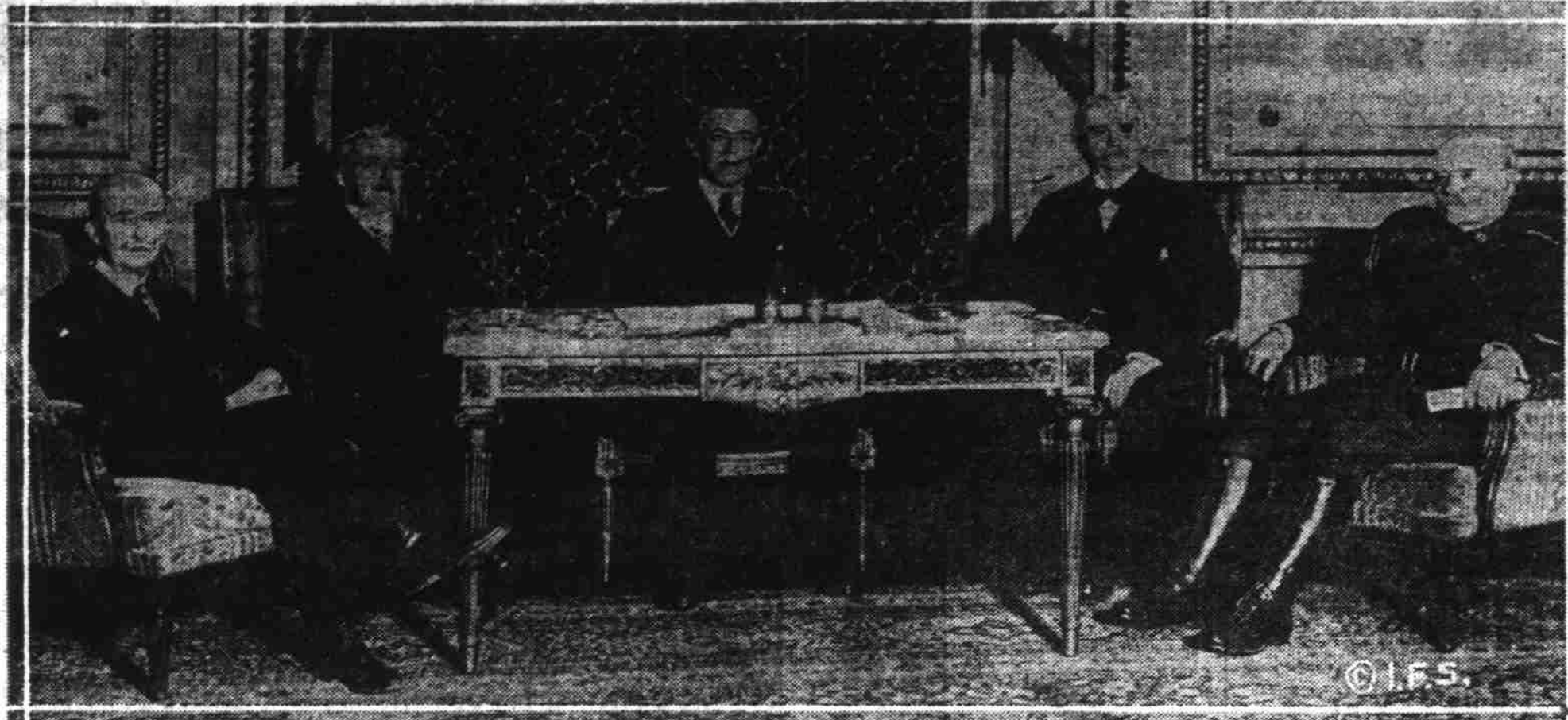
Senator d'Onofrio, president of the academy, hailed President Wilson as "the worthy representative of the culture of the new world which now re-vitalizes the ancient culture of the old world."

In reply President Wilson said: "Your majesty, Mr. President, and gentlemen of the Academy: I have listened, sir, with profoundest appreciation to the beautiful address which you have been kind enough to deliver, and I want to say how deeply I appreciate the honor you have conferred upon me in permitting me to become a member of this great academy, because there is a sense in which the continuity of human thought is in the care of bodies like this."

There is a serenity, a long view on the part of science, which seems to be of no age, but to carry human thought along from generation to generation, freed from the elements of passion. Therefore, it is, I dare say, with all men of science, a matter of profound regret and shame, that science should, in a nation which had made science its boast, have been put to such dishonorable uses in the recent war.

"Every just mind must condemn those who so debased the studies of men of science as to use them against humanity, and therefore, it is part of your task and of ours, to reclaim science from this disgrace, to show that she is devoted to the advancement and interest of humanity and not to its embarrassments and destruction."

"I wish very much, sir, that I could believe that I was in some sense a worthy representative of the men of science of the United States. I cannot claim to be in any proper sense a man of science. My studies have been in the field of politics all my life, and while politics may with courtesy be called a science, it is a science which is often practiced without rule, and it is very hard to set up standards so that one can be sure than one is steering the right course."

Good to Get Back Again
"At the same time, while perhaps there is no science of government, there ought to be. I dare say in government itself, there is the spirit of science, that is to say, the spirit of disinterestedness, the spirit of seeking after the truth so far as the truth is ready to be applied to human circumstances. Because, after all, the problem of politics is to satisfy men in the arrangement of their lives, is to realize for them, so far as possible, the objects which they have entertained generation after generation and have seen so often postponed. Therefore, I have often thought that the universities and the academies of science have their part in simplifying the problems of politics, and, therefore, assisting to advance human life along the lines of political structure and political action."

"It is very delightful to draw apart for a little while into this quiet place and feel again that familiar touch of thought and of knowledge which it has been my privilege to know familiarly through so great a part of my life. If I have come out of a more adventurous and disordered stage I hope that I have not lost the recollection and may in some sense be assisted by councils such as yours."

Brother of Local Woman Wounded In October Fight

Sergeant Henry Crane, brother of Mrs. Arthur C. Wilson, Multnomah station, was wounded severely while in action with the United States marine corps, October 10, according to official dispatches. A letter from Sergeant Crane, under date of October 15, written by his nurse at a hospital somewhere near Paris, told his sister that he had been slightly wounded, but not to worry. Mrs. Wilson is inclined to believe her brother was wounded more seriously than he pretended and was minimizing his injuries.

Sergeant Crane is a native of The Dalles, where he attended school. He later spent two years at Oregon Agricultural college, after which he started on an extensive traveling tour, in which he roamed all over Europe and visited other countries as well. Upon the advice of his sister, who claimed she never knew where to find him, he enlisted with the marines for four years. Upon the expiration of his term he reenlisted and went to France in September, 1917. He participated in nearly all of the big engagements without a scratch until he was wounded in October.

COAL PRICES RAISED FROM 10 TO 75 CENTS EFFECTIVE JANUARY 1

Higher Freight Rates Are Given as One Cause, Higher Cost of Labor Another.

Coal prices have taken an upward trend, varying from 10 to 75 cents a ton, according to an announcement from the office of Fuel Administrator Fred J. Holmes Friday. The new prices, effective January 1, are the first changes since last July. Reasons for increases are given as higher freight rates, increased labor costs and need of more profits.

Rock Springs lump alone has decreased in price from \$11.50 to \$11.20 a ton. Among the increases are: Black Diamond briquets, \$11.20 to \$11.50; "m" press lump, \$8.15 to \$8.40; Grand Ridge lump, \$8.70 to \$9.10; King lump, \$11.75 to \$12; Mendota lump, \$8.15 to \$8.40; Eovlin mine run, \$8.75 to \$9.15; Tono mine run, \$6.45 to \$7.20; Wingate steam, \$9.85 to \$10.15.

New prices on other grades follow: Aberdeen lump, \$11.50; Black Hawk lump, \$11.50; Castle Gate lump, \$11.50; Hi-Hat lump, \$11.50; Royal lump, \$11.50; Spring Canyon lump and Standard lump, \$11.75; Kennermer lump and Rock Springs lump, \$11.70; Kennermer nut, \$11.20; Rock Springs mine run, \$11.05; Hyde lump, \$10.95; Hyde and Navy mixed steam, \$10.20; South Prairie steam, \$10.15; Newcastle lump, \$9.85; Hyde steam, \$9.75; Queen, \$9.55; Rock Springs slack, \$9.20; Olympic nut, Tono lump, Monarch lump, and Monarch lump, \$8.40; Monarch mine run, \$8.20; Olympic lump nut, \$7.70; Olympic mine run, \$7.20; Olympic "3" mine run, \$6.85.

Prices scheduled are for curb delivery. An increased charge may be made for deliveries on Portland Heights or other steep grades. Additional charge of \$2 may also be made for screening, sacking and carrying in. For screening, 50 cents is charged, for sacking \$1, while charges for carrying in rest with the dealer and the consumer.

Two More Yanks Out of Hun Prisons

Denver, Colo., Jan. 4.—(U. P.)—The Colorado Roosevelt Republican club is incorporated here today with many of the state's G. O. P. leaders enrolled behind the boom to nominate the colonel for president in 1920.

Generals Assigned To Camp Commands

Washington, Jan. 4.—(U. P.)—Brigadier General William J. Nicholson has been ordered to Camp Upton to command the 152d depot brigade; Brigadier General John A. Johnson, with many Dixie to command the 153d depot brigade, and Brigadier General Devore to Camp Logan, Texas, to command the Thirtieth infantry brigade.

31 U. S. Destroyers Are Coming Home

Washington, Jan. 4.—(U. P.)—The navy department announced today that 31 destroyers and seven submarines are on their way to United States ports. The destroyers should arrive at their home ports within the next 10 days or two weeks, but the submarines are not expected to reach this country for about three weeks.

Men Are to "See" Europe
Washington, Jan. 4.—(U. S. S.)—Permission "to see something of Europe" will be granted to a number of officers and enlisted men, before they are ordered home, Secretary Baker stated this afternoon in a communication addressed by him to Representative George M. Young of North Dakota.

British Airmen Are Cold at 30,500 Feet; Mercury 38 Below

Ipswich, England, Jan. 4.—(U. P.)—Captain Lang, the British airman, who established a new world altitude record yesterday, told the United Press today that his chief sensation was that of just plain cold.

That he had a right to be cold can be judged from the fact that at 30,500 feet—the record—the mercury stood at 38 degrees below zero, Fahrenheit.

"I removed my goggles when I was six miles up, because a thick coating of frost had rendered them useless," said Lang. "My left eye was frozen and immediately. It was 70 degrees below freezing up there at that altitude."

"For the first 6000 feet the machine was tossed and buffeted about by a 25 mile wind, but after that the going was smooth. The sun was bright and we could make out ships plainly, several miles out to sea."

At 28,000 feet our oxygen ran short. Blowers went under and was unconscious until we landed, but I was lucky enough to stick it out."

Private Blatter Was Wounded in Argonne

Private Conrad Blatter, son of Mrs. Elizabeth Blatter, 300 Hamilton avenue, was wounded October 15 at Argonne forest, and at the time of his last letter to his mother, had been for seven weeks in the hospital at Nantes. Private Blatter left Portland with a selective service contingent last June for Camp Lewis.

He later was transferred to Camp Meade, and a few weeks after entering the service was sent to France. The Argonne forest engagement was the second in which he participated. Private Blatter is a steam fitter by trade.

DRIVE TO RAISE FUNDS FOR ARMENIAN RELIEF COMING IN FEBRUARY

State to Be Asked to Subscribe \$184,000 to Save Great Numbers From Death.

Plans for a new Armenian relief campaign to be held probably about the middle of February have been announced by J. J. Handsaker, who has just returned from four months spent as divisional secretary in charge of Armenian relief organization in Illinois, Kentucky, Kansas, Missouri, Arkansas, Oklahoma and Texas. Mr. Handsaker has been made field director for 11 western states, largely in recognition of his work as secretary of the Armenian relief committee for Oregon, which is the largest contributor per capita to Armenian relief in the United States.

"President Wilson by proclamation has urged that contributions to Armenian relief be more generous than ever before," said Mr. Handsaker.

Suffering Greater Than Ever
"The need and the suffering in Armenia, Persia, Palestine and Syria are greater than ever before. A year ago 950,000 refugees were accessible. The end of the war brings 4,000,000 within our reach. Not more than a fourth of the existing Armenian population can survive until the next harvest without aid. A conservative estimate is 20,000 deaths monthly from starvation in Turkey alone. In Persia there is an epidemic of typhus, typhoid and diphtheria and the death rate is 10 times normal. In Syria one fourth of the population is dying from starvation and disease. In Palestine, the American relief expedition, headed by John H. Finley, has cabled for three additional units of relief workers."

State Quota to Be \$54,000
"The government has allotted to the national Armenian relief committee a transport, and on it will sail, about the middle of January 300 relief workers among whom will be Rabbi Stephen S."

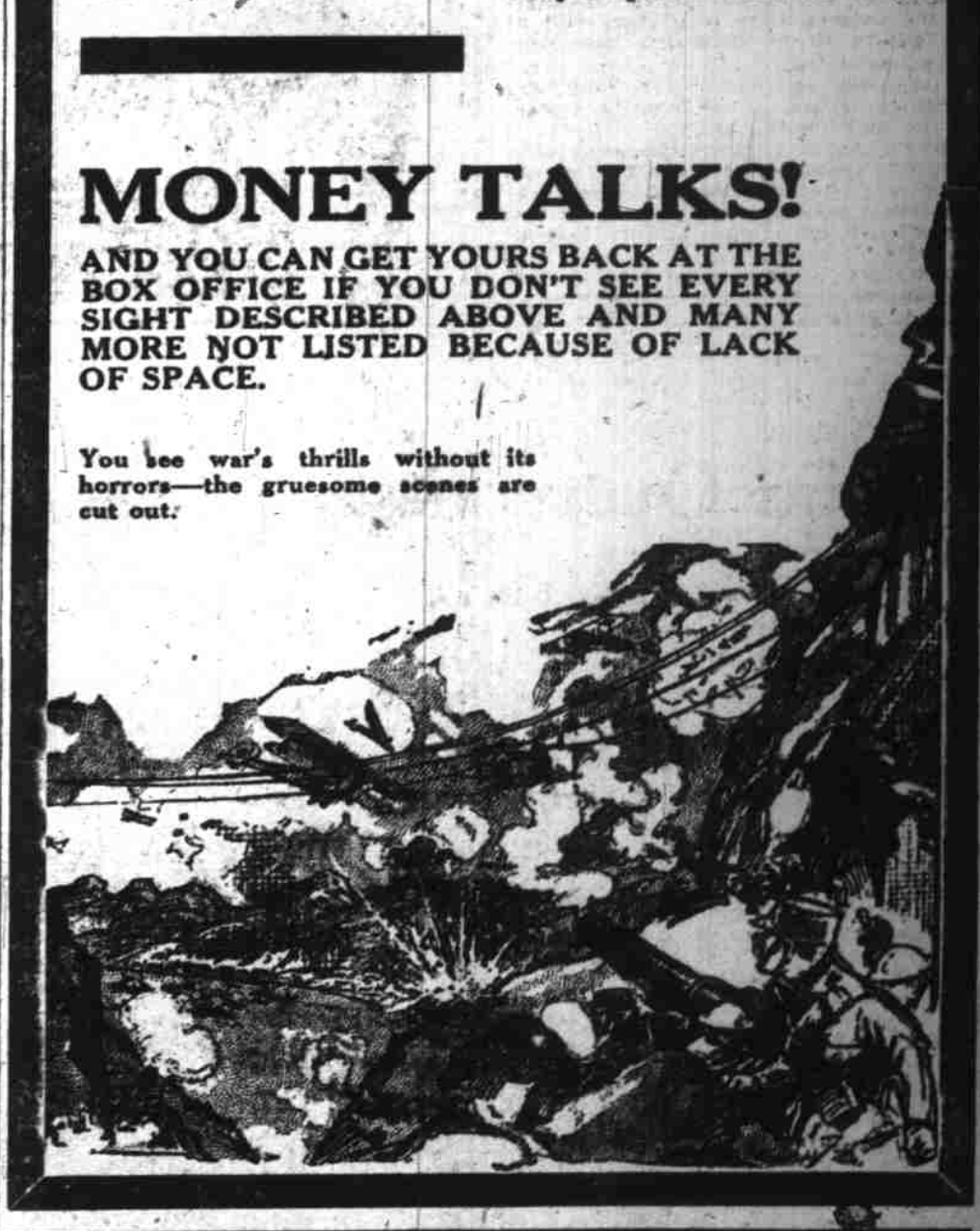
