

## PEOPLE ARE REAL PEACE-MAKERS, IS PRESIDENT'S VIEW

Wilson Tells Residents of Turin  
It Is Duty of Those at Home  
to Remain There to 'Carry On.'

### TRUST HELD LIFE OF TRADE

Country, He Says, Is Owned and  
Dominated by Capital Invested  
In It; Welcome Appreciated.

Turin, Jan. 8.—(I. N. S.)—President Wilson, addressing an audience of citizens and officials at a luncheon Monday, declared that it is not the members of the governments who are going to confer on peace at Paris who are the real makers of war or peace, but the people themselves. Mr. Wilson's address follows:

Your Excellency and Fellow-Citizens: You show your welcome in many delightful ways, and in no more delightful way than in which you have shown it today. The words which the mayor has uttered have touched me very much, and I have been both touched and stimulated by the words which have been so kindly uttered in behalf of the government of this great kingdom. It is very delightful to me to feel my association with the government and with this city, and I know how much and with what vitality Italian effort comes out of this great center of industry and commerce.

**Price of Victory Recalled**  
As I have passed through your streets I had this sensation, a sensation which I have often held at home in my own dear country, a sensation of friendship, of close sympathetic contact. I could have believed myself in an American city.

I felt more than that. I felt what I have also felt at home, that the real blood of the republic flowed in the streets, in the veins of these plain people, who, more than some of the rest of us, have borne the stress and burden of war.

Think of the price at which you and at which I have purchased the victory which we have won. Think of the price of blood and treasure, not only, but the price of tears and the price of hunger on the part of little children; the hopes delayed or dimmed; the prospects that bore heavy upon the homes. Those of us who plan battles, those of us who conceive political affairs, do not bear the burden of it. We direct and others execute. We plan and others perform and the conquest of spirit is greater than the conquest of arms. These are the things that we never let go. They say nothing. They live merely from day to day, determined that the glory of Italy or that the glory of the United States shall not depart from her.

**Work of Cavour Is Praised**  
I have been thinking as I passed through your streets and stood here that this was the place of the labors of the great Cavour and I thought how impossible many of the things which have happened in Italy and how impossible the great achievements of Italy in the past three years would have been without the work of Cavour. Ever since I was a boy, one of my treasured portraits has been that of Cavour, because I have read of him, of the way in which that man's mind took in the nation's and the national scope—strong, determined, patriotic, never allowing obstacles to dismay. How he stood at the side of the king and planned the great things which the king was enabled to accomplish.

Perhaps you gentlemen think of the members of your government and the members of other governments who are going to confer in the city of Paris as the real makers of war and peace, but we are not. You are the makers of war and peace. The pulse of the modern world beats on the farms and in the mines and in the factories. The plans of the modern world are made in the counting house. Men who do the business of the world now shape the destinies of the world and peace or war are now in a large measure in the hands of those who connect the commerce of the world. That is one reason why, unless we establish friendship, unless we establish sympathies, we clog all the processes of modern life.

**Trust Life of Business**  
I have several times said to you that you cannot trade with a man who does not trust you and you will not trade with a man whom you do not trust. Trust is the very vital life and breath of business and suspicion and distrust and rivalries stand in the way of trade and industry.

A country is owned and dominated by the capital that is invested in it. In that proportion as foreign capital comes along and takes its hold, therefore, the processes of capital are in an actual sense the processes of conquest. I have only the suggestion before I go to Paris to conclude peace. You stay here to continue it. We can start the peace. It is your duty to continue it. We can only make the large conclusions. You constantly transact the details which constitute the processes of the life of a nation and so it is very delightful to me to stand in this company and feel that we are not foreigners to each other. We think the same thoughts; we entertain the same purposes; we have the same ideals and this war has done this inestimable service—it has brought nations into close vital contact so that they are no longer enemies that are in each other; so that they know the purposes by which each is animated. We know in America, great deal about Italy because we have so many Italians.

**Proud of Italians in U. S.**  
Fellow citizens, when Baron Sonnino was arguing the other day for an extension of the sovereignty of Italy over Italian populations I said:

"I am sorry we cannot let you have New York, for I understand that is the greatest Italian city in the world."

I am told that there are more Italians in New York city than any city in Italy and I am proud to be president of a nation which contains so large an element of the Italian race because as a student of literature I know the genius that has originated in this great nation; the genius of thought and of poetry and of philosophy and of music and I am happy to be part of a

nation which is enriched and made better by the introduction of such elements of genius and of inspiration.

May I not thank again the representatives of this great city and the representatives of the government for the welcome they have given me and say again, for I cannot say it too often, "Viva L'Italia."

## Passenger Abandons Money and Clothing In Leap From Train

Pendleton, Jan. 8.—Leaving all his clothing, also a draft for \$500 and \$500 in money, a man identified by papers left in his berth as H. L. Ellis, jumped from a window of the lower berth on No. 6, somewhere between Spokane and Riet.

No one saw the man leave the car and the first knowledge of Ellis' disappearance came Tuesday at Riet when the porter discovered the empty berth and the open window.

Investigation proved that the passenger bought a ticket at Kellogg, Idaho, for Weiser, Idaho. He was in his berth at 9 o'clock Monday night, when train left Spokane. Efforts to locate the man so far have failed. In the meantime inquiries are being made about him at Kellogg.
