

GIRL TELLS STORY OF MURDER NIGHT IN TRIAL OF LIARD

Miss Augusta Carlson Gives Details of Movements at Time of Killing of Deputy Sheriff.

PRISONER CLOSELY WATCHED

Counsel for Accused Asks Time, Saying State Has Introduced Surprises; Request Denied.

John Cyril Liard, on trial charged with the murder of Deputy Sheriff Frank Twombly, tall and slender, but athletic looking, sat with nervous tensed this morning in Circuit Judge Gantenbein's court while Augusta Carlson, the young woman who rode with him on the fateful night, told the story of his alleged crime. He sat forward in his chair as though ready to spring upon the intervening tables to choke the witness into silence. Two deputy sheriffs guarded him closely, watching every move. One of them, Jack La Mont, Twombly's companion the night he was killed, stood directly behind the prisoner ready to seize him in case of an outbreak. When the court adjourned for the noon recess, Judge Gantenbein ordered every one in the courtroom to remain seated while the officers removed the prisoner, for fear that Liard would attempt an escape and the officers might be obliged to shoot.

Woman Details Movements

Miss Carlson, 24 years old, told on the stand how she became acquainted with Liard at the Hillcrest hotel. He knocked on her door one night and presented her with a box of candy, she said. Later they agreed to wed, she testified, and moved to the Denham apartments at Belmont and East Thirty-fourth street. He bought a wedding ring, she said, but she became suspicious as to his real character and succeeded in having the ceremony postponed.

Saw Twombly Shot

They crossed the Interstate bridge, she said, and drove to the railroad depot at Vancouver. He stopped the car a short distance away and told her to wait, she testified. He returned in five minutes and drove back across the river, where he stopped the car again a short distance beyond the Oregon end, told her to keep the engine running and said he would be back in a few minutes, she testified. Shortly after she heard his voice, loud in command, Liard came running to the car, she declared, asserting that during his absence he had put on a Charlie Chaplin mustache. She said he carried a sack and jumped into the car and they drove away at a high rate of speed.

On Union Avenue, she said, a short distance south of the viaduct, the saw Deputy Sheriff Twombly, on a motorcycle, ride up alongside on the left and raise his hand in a signal to stop, she testified. He held the car with his left hand, and with his right shot Twombly three or four times. She saw the deputy's head drop at the second shot. The automobile was then running very slowly, the witness said.

At the third or fourth shot Twombly

nerved and crashed into the curb, she said. "My God," said Liard; "what have I done?" she testified. Twombly died at this second shot, the witness thought.

Took Trip to Seattle

They then drove away at a furious speed, the witness continued, traveling

so fast that, going around a corner, they were riding on two wheels. Liard, she said, had arranged a number of guns on the seat between them, explaining that if anyone attempted to stop them, he would shoot his way through the crowd. Some distance over paved streets, she did not know where, she said, turned into a very muddy street, where they left the car, walked a couple of blocks and down a steep, muddy bank. He threw away his cap, overcoat and guns from the top of the bank, she said. At the bottom, she testified, he left her alone for a few minutes to hide something, she thought. Then, she said, they returned to the car and drove home to the Denham apartments. "Augusta, you shall forget everything that happened tonight," she testified he said.

Next morning he continued to read to her the newspaper account of the affair. She cried, she said, when she learned of the Twombly baby.

"You foolish girl," she said he told her, "to cry about a thing like that. What do you care about that woman's baby?"

Used Rubber Gloves

The witness told how Liard planned to throw suspicion on Richardson, a suspect who had been arrested. He said he would scratch the name on a gun and throw it where it would be found.

"What gun?" District Attorney Evans asked.

"The gun he killed Twombly with," the witness answered. At this point, the prisoner gathered himself as if for a spring at the witness, but thought better of it and sank back into his chair, covering his face with his hand. He roused himself again when his former sweetheart told how he always had rubber gloves when writing letters. He explained that he did not want to leave his finger prints on his correspondence.

At the conclusion of her direct examination, Attorney Freley of counsel

for the judge asked for a continuance until Saturday, saying that he had met with many surprises in the case as presented by the state and needed time to prepare. Judge Gantenbein refused the continuance and adjourned until 2 o'clock this afternoon.

At 12, when the court adjourned, two

lines of people stood outside the courtroom for the judge's decision. Many had come prepared with lunches, determined to stay there and get in.

Married Happiness Brief

The married happiness of Grace Fahy was of exceedingly brief duration, according to her suit filed in the circuit court Wednesday in which she seeks a divorce from L. E. Fahy, whom she married in September, 1914. Immediately after their marriage, she alleges, he refused to pay the room rent, purchase any groceries or furnish her money to buy clothes. She asks that her maiden name of Kocher be restored to her.

Suit for \$8000 Is Filed

The J. K. Lumber company, Frederick, Krilb and William N. Jones are defendants in a suit begun before Circuit Judge Tucker this morning by the receiver of the Washington Northern Railroad company for \$8000 for alleged damages to and for the rental value of two logging locomotives rented to the defendants during the logging season of 1918. The receiver alleges that the defendants failed in their agreement to return the engines in good order on a specified date.

Smith Is Arraigned

Milton W. Smith, indicted January 4 on a charge of larceny by bailment of \$500, the property of Bertha Jones, was arraigned before Presiding Judge Stapleton this morning and was given until January 18 to plead.

A resolution directed against alleged misrepresentation by reporters and ordering the convention closed to any and all hereafter making mistakes, was used for the expression of criticism against the daily press and then laid on the table.

A resolution demanding amnesty for political prisoners and the resolution demanding the withdrawal of troops from Russia were ordered printed in pamphlet form for general distribution.

A resolution asking the legislature to appropriate \$25,000 for the education and employment of the adult blind was offered by E. E. Smith and referred to the reconstruction committee.

A similar resolution asking for a reconstruction hospital for industrial cripples from the surplus funds of the state compensation fund, if decided that they can be used for that purpose, was also so referred.

Frisking Rule Carries

A resolution abrogating the "frisking" rule was unanimously carried. This rule provided that any delegate having less than five union labels upon that many different articles of personal apparel upon his person should be excluded from participation in the proceedings of the State Federation of Labor.

O. E. Hibbs, vice president of the State Federation of Labor, was given a standing vote of thanks for his services as presiding officer. He left this morning to represent the Central Labor council

of Portland at the Mooney conference in Chicago.

The out-of-town delegates are to be the guests of the building trades this evening at a theatre party and to a dinner following.

The convention is expected to adjourn this afternoon.

MACHINE GUNS USED ON STRIKERS

Riots in Buenos Aires Result in Six Persons Dead and Many Wounded.

Buenos Aires, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—Soldiers and strikers with rifles and machine guns patrolled the streets today following a night of strike rioting in which many were killed and injured.

In fighting at the Vazna iron works

soldiers turned machine guns on the strikers, who replied to this fire with machine guns taken from the arsenal when they raided it. Six were killed and many were wounded.

The Catholic girls' school was set

afire by the strikers but none was hurt. Socialist deputies demanded to know why the government permitted the disorders. This precipitated a fight in congress.

President Trigoyen urged congress to declare military law.

Newspapers were not sold on the streets today, only enough copies being printed for delivery to subscribers.

Half the police went on strike. Others joined them. As a result there were no police on the streets.

Mobs estimated at 150,000 have terrorized the city. Many buildings and one church have been burned.

When the arsenal was raided the guards were overpowered. Large quantities of arms and ammunition were distributed to small groups of rioters throughout the city.

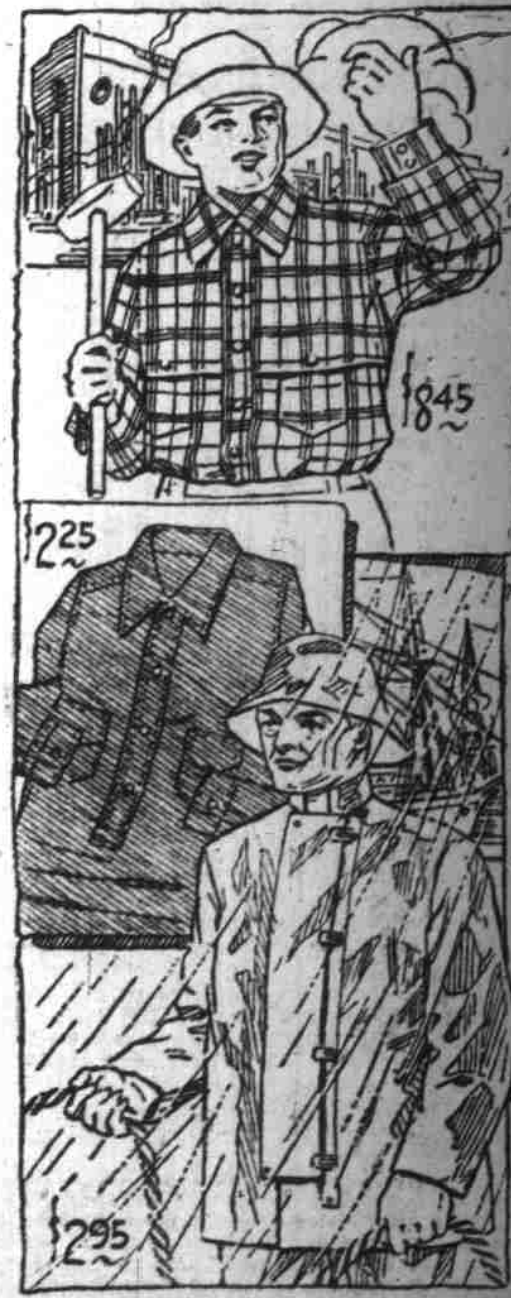
