

STATE BANKS OF PORTLAND HOLD THEIR ELECTIONS

Edward Cookingham Becomes President of Ladd & Tilton; W. M. Ladd Board Chairman.

OTHER CHANGES NOTED

Dean Vincent Is Made Manager Of Portland Trust; Carl Kelly Vice President Lumbermen.

Portland state banks and financial institutions at their annual meetings have announced a number of changes in their executive forces of more than usual interest.

First and most important, William M. Ladd, for a quarter of a century executive head of Ladd & Tilton, surrenders the executive management to Edward Cookingham and becomes chairman of the board of directors. Isaac D. Hunt returns to the vice presidency of the bank, which post he relinquished at the time of the death of the late E. Wilcox to direct the affairs of the Wilcox estate, which has acquired additional interests in the bank.

Raymond B. Wilcox and Cameron Squires become members of the board and the latter an assistant cashier. Walter M. Cook becomes cashier, succeeding W. H. Dunckley, who retains his connection with the bank.

The Ladd & Tilton bank, organized in 1859, is the second oldest financial house on the Pacific Coast. In 1908 it was incorporated as a state bank, after having existed half a century as a private institution. It more recently became a member of the federal reserve system.

William M. Ladd has been associated with the bank since 1878, becoming managing partner of the business upon the death of his father, William S. Ladd, in 1893, and president since its incorporation.

Vincent Chosen Manager

The Portland Trust company, at its annual meeting yesterday, elected S. D. Vincent vice president and manager. Two additional members were added to the board, A. D. Charlton of the Northern Pacific was also elected to the board of directors. The new board consists of the following: President, H. L. Pitcock; vice president, Henry Olmstead; vice president and manager, S. D. Vincent; directors, Judge John Twoby, Dr. A. S. Nichols, A. D. Charlton and O. L. Price. C. D. de Graff is the secretary and E. F. Pitcock is assistant secretary.

Annual meetings of the majority of banks operating in Oregon under state laws were held Thursday in conformity with the statutes.

At the meeting of the directors of the Lumbermen's Trust company John A. Keating was reelected president; Carl S. Kelly, heretofore treasurer, was elected vice president; C. F. Wright of Ballou & Wright, was elected vice president without active duties; and Carlos C. Chase was elected assistant secretary. The full board of

KARL LIEBKNECHT WOUNDED BY BOMB

Radical Socialist Has Narrow Escape From Being Lynched.

Copenhagen, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—Karl Liebknecht, leader of the Spartacans, was wounded by a hand grenade in the fighting in Berlin on Wednesday. It is reported that his injuries are not fatal.

A mob dragged Liebknecht from a taxi cab in Unter den Linden, according to a dispatch to Berlin from Tiden, but he was rescued by Spartacans before he had suffered serious injury.

Addressing a crowd water, Liebknecht said:

"Government supporters have just attempted to lynch me but we routed them. We have found our revolutionary committee, therefore we will arm and remain in the streets."

A report that Liebknecht had been killed was denied.

have been disbanded, it was announced in an official dispatch from Berlin today.

Paris, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—Chancellor Ebert is master of the situation in Berlin, a Zurich dispatch to L'Information declares today.

The Red Flag, Spartacan organ, is no longer being published. Students occupy the plant. Great numbers of volunteers are enrolling in the government forces. Cavalry and Prussian guards are massed at all gates of the capital. Gustav Noske, the military governor, is working energetically to bring about complete restoration of order. It is understood that it was he who reconciled Ebert and Von Hindenburg.

The landwehr is the "second line army." Its age limit is officially set at 39. The landsturm is a "home defense" organization. Its age limit is fixed at 45 but thousands of older men were in its ranks. Many landwehr divisions saw service at the front. The landsturm was largely used for garrison and guard duty in the interior and occupied territories.

Rebels Fight in Other Cities

Copenhagen, Jan. 10.—While the Spartacan revolt in Berlin appears to have been quelled by arrival of loyal troops rushed to the city by Chancellor Ebert, dispatches received today showed the rebels still on the aggressive in other German cities. Reports were conflicting. Many women have joined the volunteer army fighting the Spartacans.

Several hundred persons were killed or injured in the fighting outside of the Wolff bureau and the Anhalt station on Wednesday.

The coal mining industry in the Ruhr district of Westphalia has collapsed entirely as a result of the Spartacan disorders there.

Demonstrations have taken place in Munich.

The position of the loyalists is becoming stronger, according to information from Berlin.

Traffic Interdicted Recaptured

The Westphalian Volks Zeitung, a loyal Socialist paper at Dortmund, which had been seized by the Spartacans, has been regained by loyal forces.

All of the newspapers at Dusseldorf were taken over by the radicals on Tuesday night and were forced to appear on Wednesday as "Red Flag" publications.

A report was spread in Berlin on Thursday that the Spartacans were planning to destroy the municipal water supply with the result that citizens began storing away reserve supplies and it was not long until the Charlottenburg reservoir was drained.

Government troops have recaptured all of the traffic centers and trains are now arriving and departing.

There was violent fighting in Berlin Wednesday night, especially about Brandenburg.

Many Russian Bolsheviks in City

The clerical organ, Germania of Berlin, states that thousands of Russian Bolsheviks are staying in the German capital disguised in the uniforms of German soldiers.

The soldiers' council at Leipzig has adopted a resolution demanding the immediate removal of Chancellor Ebert. Fresh details of the fighting about the Wolff bureau in Berlin were received from Leipzig today. Many were killed in the battle which raged around the building for hours. When the Spartacans refused to evacuate the place the government troops were reinforced and renewed their assault with hand grenades.

Airplanes Used Against Reds

Copenhagen, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—Sixty-five persons were killed in Berlin when government troops, supported by airplanes that dropped bombs, attacked the Spartacans at the Silesian railway station.

This information was received from the German capital by the newspaper Berlinische Tidende today.

Afterward an attack was made upon the Lohrer station, where the Spartacans had fired upon a train.

A violent battle raged in the central and southwestern parts of the city, but the situation has continued to improve for the government.

According to late press advices, the government now has sufficient loyal troops in the city that it need no longer fear any surprise.

Chief of Police Disappears

Zurich, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—Robert Emil Elchhorn, Bolshevik chief of police of Berlin, who refused to accept dismissal by the Ebert government, has fled from the city, said a dispatch from the German capital today.

Foreigners in Berlin Safe

Amsterdam, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—All foreigners in Berlin are safe, said a wireless dispatch from that city today. Many have taken refuge in the neutral legations. Government troops are protecting them.

WOMEN LEADERS IN G. O. P. COUNCILS

Republican National Committee Meets to Plan for Next Presidential Campaign.

Chicago, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—For the first time in the history of the Republican party its national committee met today to plan a presidential campaign in cooperation with women party leaders.

Preliminary to the executive meeting of the committee today members of the Republican women's national executive committee conferred with national committee leaders. It was believed that the women would go before the national committee when it convened shortly before noon for further discussion of campaign plans.

Chairman Hayes hoped to conclude the routine work of the meeting at one session today. That accomplished, the remainder of the day was given over to an open meeting which was expected to take the form of a Roosevelt Memorial.

with an increasing death rate of 17. During the interim from October 13 to December 31, there were 11,636 cases, with a total of 844 deaths.

There have been 74 deaths since January 1, making a total of 918 deaths since October 13—an average of nearly 300 deaths a month.

School to Be Hospital

In the campaign inaugurated Thursday, Dr. Sommer will have complete charge, with the cooperation of the city and county. The Benson Polytechnic school immediately will be converted into a temporary hospital with 150 beds.

Volunteer doctors will be called for, in addition to the regular city and county physicians and the war department will be requested to detail 50 nurses here from Camp Lewis. Cots and bedding will be obtained from Vancouver barracks, the Red Cross and the war community service. Meals for patients will be prepared at the school kitchen.

The organization will work through the principals of each school district in locating and treating cases, and applying the quarantine. A nurse will be placed in each school to care for cases, detect new ones, and assist in placing the quarantine in time.

The principal will report to headquarters all new cases and medical assistance will immediately be sent to those afflicted.

Officials to Take Up Work

The entire force of the city health office will be placed on influenza work. Inspectors of food, and those handling it, will be temporarily put into the other work, adding two clerks, two doctors and about 12 inspectors to the total.

To assist in the work, Chas. A. Nelson, county purchasing agent; A. G. Johnson, assistant city commissioner, and Charles Kruse have been taken from county and city work during the emergency.

Speaking of the campaign, Dr. Sommer said Thursday: "The county, city and school board are in this matter to eradicate the disease. We will immediately equip the Benson school, perfect the organization, secure nurses and additional doctors, and do everything that is to be done immediately to stop the influenza. Our nurses and others will be equipped with police power, a rigid quarantine will be enforced, and results should be secured at an early date."

Allen Estate in Probate

Letters of administration on the estate of Meta Allen, who died in this city October 29, were issued by County Judge Tazewell Wednesday to Lucetta Allen, sister of the deceased. The estate was stated in the petition to consist of a half interest in personal property valued at \$3000 and a like interest in real estate in this county on which the annual income is \$720. The bond of the administratrix was fixed at \$6500.

1919 War Stamps on Sale Now at Usual Agencies

The post office has announced that the 1919 war stamps are now on sale at all post offices.

AMERICA IS TO EXPORT 2,000,000 TONS MEAT AND DAIRY PRODUCTS

Washington, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—According to estimates compiled by the department of agriculture, America in 1919 will export 2,000,000 tons of beef, pork and dairy products to the American expeditionary forces, neutrals and allies. It was learned today. This is an increase of 1,600,000 tons over the previous year.

These estimates are contained in the department's livestock production program for 1919, figured from October, 1918, and American producers of these products are urged to avoid as much as possible a depletion of their breeding stocks until the herds and flocks of Europe have been restored. Farmers also are asked to cooperate with the government in carrying out the needs required for shipment overseas.

The figures given out do not include those for home consumption.

Ebert Turns Down Hindenburg

London, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—Esen newspapers report that Field Marshal von Hindenburg has arrived at Cassel from Berlin, the government having turned down his offer to direct operations against the Spartacans.

Cassel is 90 miles northeast of Frankfurt on the Main.

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Governors McKelvie, Nebraska; Burnquist, Minnesota; and Beckman, Rhode Island, were to address the meeting. Vacancies on the national committee were to be filled by the seating of A. J. Sweet, Maine; H. F. Kean, Virginia; and Patrick Sullivan, Wyoming.

O. A. C. Enrollment Passes 3000 Mark

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Jan. 10.—The enrollment of regular students at the college has for the first time in the history of the institution passed the 3000 mark. The total registration for the school year is 3006 with more to come; this does not include short course students. This registration represents 2196 new students the first term, 678 old students the first term, and 122 new students this term. Registration for the winter term is now approximately 1300, and 200 or 300 more are expected to report within the next few days.

Lemberg Is Attacked By the Ukrainians

Zurich, Jan. 10.—(U. P.)—The Ukrainians are bombarding Lemberg with heavy guns left behind by the Germans, according to information received here today.
