

SEES MOUNTAINS MOVED BY HEAVY GUNS IN FRANCE

Percy Henniger Goes Through
Five Big American Drives and
Is Wounded on November 8.
SECOND DIVISION INVINCIBLE
Portland Boy Finds Music in
Machine Gun Bullets After
Going Through Barrage.

"I never expected to see the mountains moved into the valleys, but I have seen some fairly big hills turned inside out," writes Percy Henniger, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. P. Henniger, 289 Congress street, who has been with the U. S. marines during the recent American drives. He writes from base hospital 33, Ixerod, Var, France.

"We were pretty busy up at the front, for when we weren't dodging 'sea bags' (eight inchers) and 'whizz bangs' and going over the top, we were lying in a shell hole or a dugout, usually wet to the skin, nice and sticky, and when it began to dry up you would carry half the hillside around with you on your shoes.

"Seeing the mountains move isn't like hearing it, either. I can still hear that barrage of November 1, when our artillery greeted Fritz. It is no surprise that the Boches cried 'Kamerad' and came over as prisoners by the hundreds. I'd hate to go through a barrage like that. Even their few scattered shells were bad enough.

"I could listen to machine gun bullets whistle all day and be sure to sleep by them at night after being under that shellfire. I don't believe holidays will be very successful when the A. E. F. gets back unless they use heavier artillery than a common revolver, for an A. E. F. veteran wouldn't even flinch at a revolver stuck in his face.

"The doctor says I will be ready for duty in less than two months, so very likely I will be sent to my regiment before long. In that case I'll have a fine trip into Germany, as my regiment is with the army of occupation, where I would be now had it not been for this wound received on November 8. I am in the Second division, the only division that was in all five of the big American drives, beginning with 'Chateau-Thierry' and including the final big push that ended the war. And it is one division that has no retreat on its record. It consists of the Fifth and Sixth regiments of marines and two regiments of infantry and some of the best artillery we have over here.

"If they send me back to the regiment from here, I'll have to get that idea of Christmas dinner out of my head, and that will just about break my heart, for I've missed one Christmas already. Still no mail. I've got that last letter of August 28 just about worn out, for every time I think I should get one I take out that dear old one and read it again."

Writing from Neuvers, France, where he is now stationed for an indefinite period of time, Captain Philip Jackson writes his parents, Mr. and Mrs. G. S. Jackson, that a member of his company who visited Lieutenant William Burgard in a convalescent hospital near there reports that "Bill is looking fine and well and is getting along nicely," and he adds that the men are all anxiously awaiting orders to return to the United States. Captain Jackson is with the service of supply and motor transport division.

William "Bill" Farrow, a former Portland boy, writes from base hospital 34 at Nantes, France, where he is waiting to be sent home to Portland, that he is getting along well and hopes to be back shortly. With his letter comes one from James Jordan, who has been with the U. S. marines during the recent American drives. Since the St. Mihiel drive he has been confined in the hospital at Nantes and now is in class D, waiting to be sent home. With 200 others he started for the states some weeks ago, but was sent back to the

hospital because of lack of accommodations at that time. Enclosed is a clipping from a French newspaper telling of the exploits of the gallant Thirty-second division. It says in part: "During the war the Thirty-second division has fought on five fronts—Alsace, the Vesle, Soissons, Argonne and the Meuse—and has fought 20 of Germany's best divisions, among them the famous Prussian Guards. It has never yielded a yard of ground to the enemy's counter attacks."

Corporal Lawrence Dineen writes from France that he expects to serve in the "Y" hut regularly at St. Nazaire. He further adds: "The other night, among the first men I met were Dale Stannard, U. of O. '14, and Vick Stork of Portland. Dale was with a naval crew manning one of the 14-inch naval guns on the western front. Dale was on his way to Brest, where he expected the contingent he was with might be sent back to the United States on one of the "battled wagons" which was in the armada which conveyed President Wilson into Brest Friday. Dale has had an interesting life. On the "South Dakota" he voyaged in South American waters, and then he got into the "big scrap," a privilege granted to but few naval men over here. He says that he has had much valuable training in medical work.

Victor Stork of Portland is a radio operator on board the "Crater Hall." He

was nine months in Bremerton, then at the Harvard radio school and then on the "Crater Hall." Vick is in fine health, but, like all of us, is looking towards home now. Ted Brunner of Portland, who is in a M. T. C. unit near St. Nazaire, was visiting Vick when I went aboard the "Crater Hall," and the two soldiers were the guests of Vick at mess on the ship Friday noon."

L. P. Larson Becomes Mayor of South Bend

WOULD HAVE STATE COLLEGE TO TRAIN YOUNG INSTRUCTORS

More Normal Schools Opposed;
Repeal of Portion of School
Law Is Sought.

Repeal of that portion of the statute of 1911 which permits the issuance of teachers' certificates to high school graduates but prohibits their issuance to graduates of colleges and universities upon the same basis, is being urged and will probably be presented to the coming legislature in the form of a bill. Mrs. Herbert Armstrong of North Bend, who has taken a prominent part in the campaign against the creation of more normal schools in the state, is one of the prominent sponsors for the movement to repeal the existing law. Mrs. Armstrong, in a circular which she has sent to members of the legislature and others interested in school leg-

islation throughout the state, urges the repeal of the law and the enactment of an amendment which will provide for the training of teachers in the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural college.

Mrs. Armstrong contends that public school teachers could be trained at much less expense and much more thoroughly at the two state institutions than by the establishment of added normal colleges. She points out that both institutions already have class rooms, laboratories and general equipment that could be used without additional expense.

County Development Congress Organized By Pacific Citizens

South Bend, Wash., Jan. 10.—The Pacific County Development congress, composed of representative men from all parts of the county, was organized here Tuesday night at the Commercial club, with the following officers:

The purpose of the congress is to unify the people of the county in their efforts to work for the betterment of conditions. The meeting adopted the resolutions of the Washington State Good Roads association, with the exception of a few sections; pledged to assist Wahkiakum county to secure a highway; favored the adoption of the route of the National Park highway, as accepted and approved by the voters of Pacific county when they made this route a condition of the contract in the sum of \$80,000 of bonds of Pacific county; favored a legislative appropriation at this session for the early completion of road No. 19, one of the links in the National highway, and advocated the clearing of the timber 50 feet on each side of the National highway in all tail timber sections.
