WEATHER CONDITIONS
An important low pressure area is apparently approaching the north Pacific coast, and a slight depression is apparently central north of the Lake region. The remainder of the country is covered by a great area of high pressure, the highest readings being in southeastern Idaho. Precipitation has occurred on the British Columbia coast, in the southern Plains states, and in the upper Ohio valley. The weather is generally colder in the Rocky mountain and Plains states and upper Mississippi valley, and is milder in middle western Canada and on the north Atlantic coast. The temperature is below normal over the southwest and in the south Atlantic and Gulf states, and above normal in other sections. The greatest temperature contrast is in the northern Plains region.

The Oregon Mental Hygiene society is an active part in conjunction with the National Mental Hygiene committee of which Clifford W. Beers is chairman, in improving the condition of the insane.

MORE ARRESTS BUT LESS CRIME SHOWN BY POLICE REPORT

Activity of War Emergency Squad And Absence of Idleness Accounts for Record.

Although less crime existed in Portland during the past year the yearly report of Record Clerk W. A. Barker shows that there were more arrests than in any previous year since the state went dry. The great increase in arrests is due to the large number of traffic cases and the activity of the government in rounding up slackers and alien enemies. The record also shows an increase in the number of drunken men arrested, but this is probably due to the organization of the war emergency squad, which made this class of work a specialty.

There were 17,284 arrests made during the year as compared with 11,119 for 1917, 12,064 for 1918 and 20,559 for 1915. The arrests were made by a total force of about 360 officers. About one in every 19 arrested during the year was a woman.

2429 Juveniles Arrested

The police arrested 2429 juveniles, of whom 2178 were boys. Most of these were detained on charges of theft of automobiles, but some, however, were connected with cases of juvenile delinquency.

Five were arrested on charges of murder and three on charges of manslaughter, one of the latter being the driver of an automobile which was seized to have been drunk when his machine struck a young woman.

In making the arrests the police patrol wagon was called out 6205 times and the emergency squad was called out 4920 times. The total amount of fines collected from those arrested is \$68,088.90. The police also recovered 958 automobiles.

Officer Barker's report shows that 75 were arrested on the charge of operating an automobile in an intoxicated condition, and that every one who was found guilty by Judge Rossmann was sentenced to the city jail and a heavy fine imposed.

Too Busy for Crime

Less serious crime is one of the noticeable features of the report as but 35 were brought in for burglary. Owing to the activity of the emergency squad many of the men who previously spent their time loafing, and thereby got into mischief, were working this year and had no time to bother other people's property or molest their lives.

Although the number of vagrants averages about three a day for the year, but few of those were in destitute circumstances. Nearly all had a neat bank roll in their pocket when searched in the jail. Most of them told the judges they were merely taking a little vacation, when asked why they declined to work. Judge Rossmann found it extremely difficult to prosecute many of the vagrants, as they showed themselves to be quite prosperous financially.

The heaviest business case caught through traffic department, which amounted about 300 arrests a month. Besides regular police calls a motorcycle officer was sent to the scene of nearly every serious accident within the city and to almost every fire. The police called the ambulance 153 times to remove injured persons to the hospital and also turned in 266 fire alarms.

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Keep Up Your Service Flag Demobilization Day Named

"Don't take down your service flag yet, and don't keep them up until they become weather beaten, tattered or unneeded," is the plea of the war community service. "These flags which have been emblematic of all our fears and hopes, of the dangers imminent to 19 months of war, mean too much to be laid aside without proper ceremony. The service flag has been the one central emblem that has represented the sons, the brothers, the fathers, and the sweethearts of those left behind. It has appeared everywhere throughout the United States as a great sign of reverence, an emblem of great pride and hope. Both the great and the small have displayed it alike.

"Washington's birthday is a day suggested by the national organization of war camp community service as an appropriate time for the tribute to and demobilization of the service flag." February 22 is a national holiday, and on Friday, February 21, patriotic ceremonies will be held in all the schools of the country. At this time factories, banks, industrial institutions and fraternal orders might well also have the demobilization of the service flag, is the opinion of the war camp community service.

"In the demobilization of the service flag it is urged that service bars be

pinned across, and later sewed, across the stars which represent the boys who have come home. For the flags with stars which have turned to gold a specially designed permanent service flag, to be known as 'gold glory,' should be substituted, and these kept on exhibition as long as man keeps in memory this most just of wars."

The committee on plans for the demobilization of the service flag has sent out the following proposed program, as a fitting ceremony for the occasion to more than 600 communities throughout the country:

1. Ten minutes of community singing, war songs and home songs.

2. Ten minute address by civilian.

3. Ten minute response by a service man.

4. Sole.

5. Ten more minutes of community singing.

6. Fifteen minutes of silent tribute to the men who have fallen. Prior to the period of silence the gold stars exhibited should be pointed out, and as each star is crossed by a store, the name of the soldier represented by that bar should be read.

7. Demobilization of the stars for those men who have been mustered out.

8. Prayer.

9. Singing of "Home, Sweet Home" and "The Star Spangled Banner."
