Pittsburg Business Man Slated to Succeed McCormick, Head of Democratic Party.

Washington, Jan. 15. - (I. N. S.)-Joseph M. Guffey, millionaire Pittsburg usiness man, Democratic state chairman of Pennsylvania and director of nales of the alien property custodian's office, is slated to succeed Vance C McCormick as Democratic national chairman, it was learned from Democratic leaders who were assembling in Washington today for an informal con-

While Mr. Guffey has not formally announced himself as a candidate for the chairmanship, he is reported to have the backing of both Mr. McCormick and of Allen Property Custodian A. Mitchell Palmer, with both of whom he has been closely associated in Demoeratic politics in Pennsylvania, Mr. Guffey was the choice of Mr. McCormick and Mr. Palmer for the Democratic nomination for governor of Pennsylvania at last year's primaries in that state, but was defeated by Judge Eugene C. Bonniwell of Philadelphia With the approval of Mr. McCormick and Mr. Palmer, both of whom are avowed "dry" advocates, Guffey opsed Judge Bonniwell on a platform in which he was pledged to national pronibition and the ratification of the na-

tional prohibition amendment. His selection as Democratic national chairman at this time would, Democratic leaders state, possess more than usual significance in view of the ratification of the prohibition amendment by an increasing uccession of states. Mr. McCormick has long championed

national prohibition and it is said that factors in Mr. Guffey's selection as Mr. McCormick's successor is that he would be in sympathy with Mr. McCormick's "dry" views.
