TODAY'S FORECASTS

Portland and vicinity: Tonight and Saturday rain; moderate to strong southerly winds. Oregon and Washington: Tonight and Saturday rain; moderate to strong southerly winds on the coast.

WEATHER CONDITIONS

Low pressure prevails in Alaska and Canada and over the northern states, the principal depressions being central in Manitoba and off the British Columbia coast. A shallow low pressure area is central in the lower Mississippi valley. The pressure is moderately high over the south-west, and on the Atlantic coast. Precipitation has occurred on the middle and north Pacific slope, in middle-western Canada, in Tennessee, and in the Gulf states. The following heavy precipitation is reported: Kureka, Cal., 3.18; Portland, Or., 1.66; Tatosho Island, Wash., 1.28; New Orleans, La., 1.08; Vancouver, B. C., 1.08. Freezing temperature extends southward over the plains states to Texas, and in Alberta the temperature fell almost to zero. Mild weather prevails in the Pacific states and on the Atlantic coast. South-east storm warnings are continued at all Washington and Oregon stations.

DR. EDWARD H. PERCE

Accounting it the most vital topic of the day, Dr. Edward H. Perce, pastor of Westminster Presbyterian Church, will discuss the danger of the epidemic of the "flu" at 10:30 Sunday morning.

Dr. Perce will detail some of the tremendous losses sustained in the present ravages of the disease, and will endeavor to point out how they may be prevented and the epidemic halted.

Defeated Candidate For Commissioner To Contest Office

Goldendale, Wash., Jan. 17.—Alleging that he was not counted into office, and claiming that he was jobbed by the manipulation of straw vote ballots, W. C. Alloway of Troutlake, in Western Klickitat county, will institute legal proceedings in an effort to oust John G. Wyers of White Salmon, chairman of the newly organized board of county commissioners for Klickitat county. Mr. Alloway, on the advice of his attorneys, has filed a written demand on County Auditor Roy E. Crooks and ex-County Commissioner A. R. Youngquist, who acted as chairman of the board that canvassed the votes after the general election in November, asking that a certificate of election be issued to him as county commissioner for the first commissioner district in Klickitat county. The demand was made on Monday, January 13, the day the new officials qualified and assumed their duties under the law.

W. C. Alloway was at one time manager of a steamboat line from The Dalles to Portland, but of late years has been a rancher in the Troutlake valley. John G. Wyers is a stockman and farmer residing near White Salmon and has been prominent in Western Klickitat county politics since the early settlement of the country.

The first commissioner district includes all the territory in Klickitat county west of the Big Klickitat river, the precincts of Granddalle and Hartland, on the east side of the river, being also included. The main opposition to Wyers comes from Bingen and Troutlake. The main towns in the district are Lyle, Bingen, White Salmon, Husum, Glimmer, Troutlake, Glenwood, Laurel, Liberty, Bond, Appleton, Klickitat, Wahkiakus and Granddalle.

Klamath Falls, Jan. 17.—Matt Willman, Charles Mecum and Andrew Willman, charged with violating the prohibition law, pleaded guilty. Mecum was fined \$50 and costs and each of the Willman brothers \$25 and costs.

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Woman's Institute Held at Chehalis Is Great Success

At the closing session plans were discussed for the convention of the state council here in April. A feature of yesterday's program was an address on "Americanization" by Mrs. W. E. Brown of Vader, who directed all war work of Lewis county women in 1918.

Centralia Banks Show Gain

Centralia, Jan. 17.—The stockholders of the three Centralia banks held their annual meeting Tuesday. Reports read at that meeting showed total deposits of the three banks on December 31st to have been \$2,000,792, the highest in the city's history. This is a gain of about \$500,000 for the year. All of the old officers were re-elected at each of the meetings.

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
