The problems in weaving, pottery, clay modeling, block printing, toy making and other light crafts are displayed, and in addition some examples of Russian, Swedish and Italian embroideries and other craftwork lent by local owners is shown. Together with some specimens of work done by disabled soldiers. The exhibit will be open the usual hours of the museum—weekdays 9 to 6 o'clock, Sundays 2 to 5; free the afternoon of Tuesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday and Sunday until January 30.

To Destroy Beans—Judge Wolverton of the United States district court yesterday signed an order authorizing the United States marshal to destroy 923

Heavy Increase in Coal Production Is Reported for Year

Thirty-four million tons of coal were produced in 1914 over that of the previous year, in the United States. The yearly production of this country is now approximately 100,000,000 tons greater than in 1912, according to the United States fuel administration.

All other great belligerent countries have suffered a severe falling off in coal output during the war. The great reserve stocks of coal built up in France are now gone, according to reports of the special fuel commission reaching Fuel Administrator Fred J. Holmes, and three years will be necessary to efface the damage caused by the war.

Dynamite and the oxy-acetylene torch completed demolition of the Lens mines, according to the report. Where the mines were within the French lines, operations were carried on only at night, amid scenes of utter desolation. About the earth was churned for miles until the underlying rock stratum was mingled with it. France must look outside of her borders for coal for some time to come, according to the report.

Italy has no coal for household heating and gas for cooking is limited to four hours a day. Switzerland is uncomfortable to a notable degree, and all Europe is facing a real and prospective shortage.
