

WASCO OFFICIALS WANT ACCOUNTING

Retiring County Court to Show
How \$250,000 Bond Issue
Has Been Spent.

The Dalles, Jan. 20.—One of the first acts of the new county court, which took office the first of the month, has been to call upon the retiring court for a complete, detailed statement regarding the expenditure of the \$250,000 bond issue voted in this county two years ago.

County Judge Adkins states that the request, made by himself and his associates of the new court, is not intended to carry any criticism of the old court, nor is there any charge of mismanagement or misuse of funds. It is understood, however, that the cost of several of the projects undertaken under the \$250,000 bond issue has materially exceeded the estimated cost and it will have to be met by the new court out of the general road fund.

The report on the expenditure of the \$250,000 bond issue is now in process of preparation by the retiring court, and it is announced that, upon its completion, it will be published.

Charged With Evading Draft
The Dalles, Jan. 20.—Deputy United States Marshal Sam of Portland Saturday arrested Verne Holden of this city. It is charged that the young man is a draft evader, having failed to register. He was taken to Portland.

'Heaven' Is Address Of American Donor

Yakima, Wash., Jan. 20.—A contribution of \$5 to the Armenian relief fund bore the name of the donor and the address, "Heaven." An investigation showed that the money was earned by an aged woman, who recently died. She had expressed a wish to aid the Armenians and made the money raising chickens, which she sold shortly before she died. Her gift was made by surviving relatives in accordance with her wish. A total of \$4000 of Yakima's gift of \$4015 is now subscribed and the money in the bank.

Escaped Inmate of Cedars Not Caught

Lena Fuller, an inmate of the Cedars who escaped about two weeks ago, was arrested by Patrolman Nelson, Saturday night, and will be returned to the institution. Ruth Julian, alias Johnson, who escaped from the home late Saturday night, is still at large. According to the report made to the police, the inmate it is thought that the husband of the woman assisted her in her escape. Prior to her arrest by the police on January 9 she had been living with her husband and two children in the city. She is described as being 24 years of age, 5 feet 4 inches in height, of dark complexion and with blue eyes.

Death Rate Soars In Pacific Cities

Washington, Jan. 20.—Unusually high death rates for the past week period are reported from several far Western and Southern cities. The mortality statistics of the census bureau, based upon an annual rate per 1000 population, give San Francisco a rate of 49.8, compared with an average rate of 15. The rate for Oakland is recorded as 38.2, as against 14.6, the average prevailing for the past five years. Los Angeles is rated at 30.1, and New Orleans 39.6. New York and other Eastern cities are only slightly above the normal.

Methodists Get All Of \$10,000 Estate

Yakima, Jan. 20.—All the property owned by the late Mrs. Helen A. Burrill, whose will was admitted to probate Saturday, goes to further the work of the Methodist church, of which Mrs. Burrill had been an active member for many years. The estate is valued at \$10,000. Half the property goes to the Spokane Deaconess home. The remainder goes to the foreign missionary board of the church. Shortly before her death Mrs. Burrill gave \$4000 to the College of Puget Sound, at Tacoma.

British Soldiers From Hun Prisons Dying by Scores

London, Jan. 20.—Many British soldiers homeward bound from German prison camps are frightfully emaciated from the bad treatment they have received and many will never see their homes, according to a dispatch received Sunday from Copenhagen.

Nineteen were buried Sunday in Danish graves.
An official item from Budapest to Amsterdam states that the Hungarian losses up to July, last, included 24,000 officers and 815,000 men of all ranks killed, and 41,000 officers and 1,900,000 men of all ranks wounded. There were 22,000 officers, but only 150,000 men of other ranks missing or prisoners as compared with the officers.

MORE RECRUITS FOR RED CROSS MOTOR CORPS ARE SOUGHT

Miss Maude Ryan Opens Offices;
Women With Cars Urged
To Offer Services.

A campaign was launched this morning by Miss Maude Ryan, as manager, to recruit up to double its present strength the Red Cross motor corps. Headquarters will be maintained by Miss Ryan in 507 Casso building.

Portland girls with cars are asked to apply immediately for membership in the motor corps, of which Miss Katherine Hoyt is commandant.
Membership in the motor corps permits the wearing of special insignia on cars of the corps, while members are permitted to wear the uniform of the corps, which has been described as the most handsome of the various Red Cross uniforms. Wearing of the uniform is in no sense essential to membership, as many members of the corps are unable to devote full time to the purposes of the corps.

"We are just as glad to welcome to membership the girl who can only give one hour a day or one half day a week as the girl who can give us eight full hours a week," says Miss Ryan.
The Portland Red Cross motor corps made for itself a national reputation for efficiency. When the call came for Red Cross drivers in France, almost the entire squad volunteered and everyone passed the severe mechanical examination.

Train Held Up by Lone Negro Bandit

Leavenworth, Kan., Jan. 20.—A Chicago, Great Western passenger train was held up and robbed by a lone negro bandit about a mile south of this city early Saturday morning. The man is said to have secured valuables from 20 passengers and made good his escape. The amount he secured is not estimated.

RED CROSS SHOP'S STOCK IS BECOMING VERY MUCH DEPLETED

War May Be Over, but Work of
Organization Must Be Kept
Up for Months to Come.

The Red Cross shop is getting settled in its new and more commodious quarters at 70-72 Third street, in the Worcester building.

The former Red Cross salvage bureau at 80 Third street has been closed and merged with the shop, although the wholesale salvage bureau is still open at 70 Second street, where anything in the junk line from a bundle of waste paper to a carload of bottles, iron scrap, broken machinery, etc., will be handled.

"The stocks are becoming depleted, declare those in charge, and the shelves are almost as bare as the proverbial cupboard of old Mother Hubbard."

"People think the war is over," said Mrs. C. T. Trommald, director of the shop, "and that the Red Cross need is over."
"The work of the Red Cross is just beginning. Now we have the care of dependents of soldiers and the care of returned soldiers until they get a job. And we shall need steadily more money for the next six months or a year, anyway."

Goldendale Fears Shortage of Water

Goldendale, Wash., Jan. 20.—Heavy rains for the past two days have flushed the snow out of the Simcoe mountains to such an extent that a shortage in the water supply for Goldendale and the Klickitat valley is predicted for the coming summer. All water courses, creeks and rivers in the wheat belt have been flowing at flood stage. In the lowlands water is standing on the frozen ground 10 to 20 inches deep. The Little Klickitat river is overflowing its banks at Goldendale, and the Golden meadow is under several feet of water.

Auto Use Put Under Ban
Goldendale, Wash., Jan. 20.—Week end fishing trips, joy rides, and the use of county owned machines for private business has been taboed by the county commissioners of Klickitat county, who have made an order that all cars owned by the county must be used by the county officials and their deputies in the discharge of their official duties only and cannot be used for pleasure or private business.

Aberdeen Postal Receipts Double
Aberdeen, Wash., Jan. 20.—The postal receipts at the Aberdeen postoffice were practically double in 1918 what they were in 1917. The total receipts were \$84,326.32 last year and \$242,822 for the year previous. The postal savings of 1918 were \$420,313, a gain of \$157,946 over the previous year. The money order business amounted to \$592,470.91.

Millionaire Makes Trip From Honolulu As Ship's Cabin Boy

San Francisco, Jan. 20.—Being denied passage on the steamer Lurline, bound from Honolulu to this port, did not prevent George Sherman, Chicago millionaire, from making an important trip to this country, although before he could go abroad he had to ship as a cabin boy. The Lurline is due to arrive here Wednesday.

Sherman is coming to the mainland to see A. Mitchell Palmer, alien property custodian, regarding government business in the Hawaiian Islands. His mission is said to be important and he could not wait for the sailing of another vessel.

Refusal to permit him to board the vessel as a passenger was due to the company owning the ship failing to renew its license permitting the carrying of passengers. When told that he could not sail on the Lurline unless he signed as a member of the crew, Sherman agreed and was made a cabin boy.

Rulings of Lower Courts Sustained

Washington, Jan. 20.—(U. P.)—Rulings of lower courts knocking out the interstate commerce commission decision of March 28, 1916, which, it is claimed, invalidated contracts between railroads and telegraph companies, were affirmed by the supreme court today.

CHILDREN TO TAKE PART IN TOURNEY OF HEALTH KNIGHTHOOD

General Purpose Is to Form
Habits of Health and Hygiene
Among Boys and Girls.

Oregon boys and girls are already planning to participate in the National Tournament of Health Knighthood based on the rules of the Modern Health Crusaders, the juvenile division of the Oregon Tuberculosis association.

The general purpose of the tournament is to form habits of health and hygiene among the children. Mrs. Sadie Orr Dunbar, executive secretary of the Oregon Tuberculosis association, has returned from Seattle, where she attended a conference for this work, called by Max Garrett, division manager of the Junior Red Cross. The tournament is being put on jointly through the Junior Red Cross and the public schools.

The Oregon association has agreed to furnish all necessary supplies and the several attractive pennants, which are awarded for excellence in performing the health chores, will be given by the Red Cross, these to be awarded to the school in each county having the highest percentage of pupils earning the title of Knight Baneret, said percentage to be

based on the average attendance during the term.

Seventy-two chores done in one week makes a perfect record. A perfect record for two weeks entitles one to the title of Page; for five weeks, Squire; for 10 weeks, Knight and for 15 weeks, Knight Baneret. The tournament will begin February 9 and close May 24. The daily chores are as follows:

Washing face, ears and neck. Cleaning finger nails.
Keeping fingers, pencils and everything unclean out of the mouth and nose.
Drinking water before meals and bed. No tea, coffee, etc.
Brushing teeth morning and evening.
Ten slow deep breaths of fresh air.
More than 30 minutes' play outdoors or with windows open.
Ten hours or more in bed, with windows open.
Sitting and standing erect, regular attention to every body need.
Keeping neat and cheerful. Helpful to others.
Full bath on each day checked.

Indian Farm Lands Give Big Returns

Yakima, Jan. 20.—Yakima Indian land farmers made \$1,000,000 by farming last season. It is estimated by L. M. Holt, supervising engineer of the Wapato project who includes in the total the income from about 10,000 acres of leased land at a rental of about \$10 per acre and the returns from the crops on 5000 acres of land actually farmed by the Indians themselves. Many Indians are skillful farmers and some of the wealthiest are big stock breeders.

COLOR HARMONY IS VERY INFLUENTIAL IN CURING SHELL SHOCK

Miss Jennie Cameron Tells of
Wonderful Accomplishments
in Restoring Blank Minds.

"Color harmony—the significance of right hues and their relation to each other—is the strongest link in connecting up the blank minds of men suffering from shell shock to the normal," said Miss Jennie Cameron, who makes her home at the Hotel Portland, and who returned Friday from San Francisco, where she spent two weeks in and about Letterman Hospital, observing the marvelous results of the application of occupational therapy in the mental rehabilitation of the men.

"Men wounded in every possible way, both mentally and physically, are being cared for at the Letterman hospital, there being between 2000 and 3000 inmates. The occupational therapy work was begun about three months ago, and it has proven such a boon to the men—there are definite cases where it is known to have saved the men from self-destruction—that 25 young women, none of them more than 30, devote their entire time to the inspiring work of actually bringing back the mental faculties into normal functioning. The workers find it so inspiring to see the men respond that

they come out of their wards after a full day of what must be very trying work actually buoyant in the joy of real service.

"The men respond most quickly to color, hence the work in color harmony is the first given; this is followed by basketry and toy-making, highly trained instructors having been brought on from the East to train workers in these branches. This was the particular line of work in which I was most interested, but other branches of the reconstruction were also wonderful. For instance, a man who had lost both of his hands and felt that he was useless until the instructors got hold of him, came down to the training school in the Flood building one morning just beaming with happiness because he had learned to tie his necktie. To be sure, it took him an hour and a half to do it, but it was the beginning of a possible useful life; and, best of all, the man's broken spirit had been mended."

Aged Man Knocked Down by Automobile

Solomon Kritchevsky, 88 years old, who resides at 296 Hemlock street, was knocked down and seriously injured by an automobile driven by C. E. Rollins, 1039 Arnold street, early Sunday morning. The aged man was taken by Mr. Rollins to the Good Samaritan hospital and it is feared that his skull is fractured. Due to his advanced age, his recovery is doubtful. According to the report made by Mr. Rollins, Kritchevsky stepped from behind a street car at East Twelfth street and Hawthorne avenue directly into the path of the automobile. Before the machine could be stopped the old man was knocked down, his head striking the pavement with considerable force.

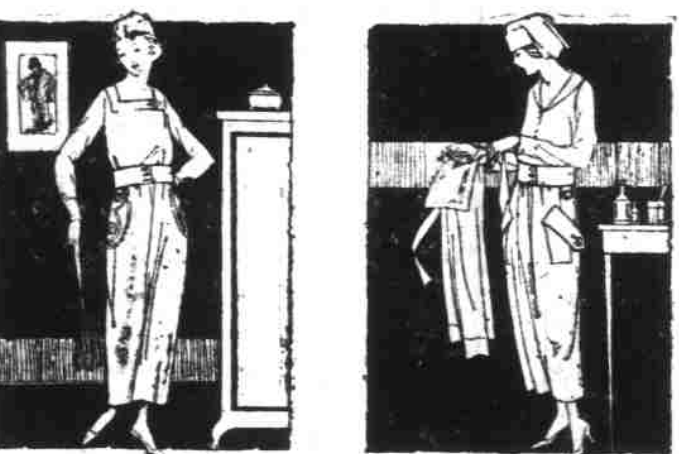
