FRED MITCHELL'S rise in the National league is a demonstration of what a practical baseball man can do if he has the brains to back it up.

For a good many years the elite circle in the major leagues has been largely dominated by business men who made the game what it is, with their acquired franchises in some other line or always had an abundance of the coin of the realm.

Recognized in Boston

But here's Fred Mitchell, who started out as a pitcher in the major leagues, and served as a moundman, catcher and coach for many years, until he suddenly bloomed forth and got the recognition he deserved as a him in Boston when he assisted George Stallings in

the memorable 1914 campaign which lifted the Braves out of the cellar and into the playoffs.

Mitchell, always retiring and quiet by nature, plunged along until he was elected to the front office of the club by Charles Weeghman. And after two years as manager he has been elevated to the position of president of the club. He is the only man in the organization both on and off the field.

Can Coach Young

Mitchell knows baseball inside and out. He is a former player, and he knows he has the knack of handling men and he knows a ballplayer when he sees one. Long years as a student of the game have made him a good coach, and he knows, no matter in what position they play, and he gets results wherever there is a game to be won.

To say the least, Mitchell deserves what he has won in baseball, and he has won "plugs" into the position of prominence, either. He earned it hard plugging from the days when he broke in on the sand lots until the present day.
