

EVANGELISM FOR LUMBER WORKERS NEW ERA APPEAL

Need of More Money With Which to Combat Bolshevism Emphasized by Rev. J. H. Boyd.

PRESBYTERIANS SEE DUTY

Social Reconstruction Solution of Problem of Unrest, Declares Dr. J. A. Marquis.

An appeal for evangelism for the 30,000 lumber workers in the logging camps of the Northwest was presented before the three visiting representatives of the Presbyterian New Era movement, Dr. John R. Davies of Philadelphia, George Mahy, member of the national board, and David McConaughy of Philadelphia, Tuesday afternoon.

Rev. John H. Boyd, pastor of the First Presbyterian church, who has assisted the Loyal Legion of Loggers and Lumbermen in establishing industrial chaplains; Rev. E. H. Pence, of the Westminster church, and Rev. T. H. Simpson, welfare representative of the Saginaw Lumber company, presented the side of the lumbermen, and showed that \$63,800, provided by the board of home missions for this work, although 100 per cent larger than that of last year, is insufficient in the fight against threatened Bolshevism.

Church Must Act
Dr. Pence, in a spirited talk, declared it is up to the Presbyterian church to save the country from the "Red" peril. Rev. Mr. Simpson told of the tendency among the loggers to regard the church as the long arm of the junkies, and said it had taken him six months to live down the stigma put upon the church by them.

At the final session in the evening, Dr. John A. Marquis, general secretary, gave a stirring address, declaring there never had been a time in history since the fall of the Roman empire that such momentous changes have occurred with such rapidity.

"The war has brought us new appreciation of values," said Dr. Marquis. "A few months ago congress went to the 5 per cent better by appropriating 15 per cent of its funds for relief work. Moses gave only 10 per cent."

Unless we have a social reconstruction, according to Dr. Marquis, we will have Bolshevism.

Separate Meetings Are Held
Separate meetings were held for the men and women at Tuesday's conference. "It is hard for us to realize what a large number of people are born, live and die without the services of a physician," said Mrs. L. M. Coy, president of the Northwest Board of Missions, in speaking of the uses to which the jubilee fund was to be put. Mrs. Coy told of the splendid work done by foreign missions and their financial needs for schools and churches.

Mrs. Guy Davis spoke of the debt that the church owed to God and to the world, in the work to be done by the missions, and told of its far reaching effects from Alaska to Porto Rico and from the din of the city's streets to the silence of the hills.

A Young People's conference was held at 6 p. m. at the Y. M. C. A. cafeteria, and the conference closed with the evening consecration service, addressed by Dr. Halsey and Dr. Foulkes.

Accounting Given Of Road Bond Fund Of Wasco County

The Dalles, Jan. 22.—F. S. Gunning, former county judge, whose term expired the first of this month, appeared before the new court Monday and rendered an accounting of all work done and money expended under the \$270,000 bond issue voted two years ago. The new court had asked Judge Gunning for such an accounting because of the fact that the general road fund will be drawn upon this year to meet deficits contracted last year.

Regarding the deficit, Judge Gunning declared that they were not due to extravagance, but to the increased cost of labor and materials, damage done by floods and extra expenses, such as fencing and right of way. His report showed that the cost of the various road projects has been as follows: General charges, \$2600; The Dalles to Mosier, \$92,697; The Dalles to Petersburg, \$32,583; The Dalles to Dufur, \$28,267; Dufur to Tygh road, \$17,954; Tygh grade to Maupin, \$22,772; and from Maupin to the Jefferson county line, \$6274.

The flood which last year washed out a section of the new Dufur road cost the county \$5000, Judge Gunning reported. Other extra expenses included fencing the road to Mosier \$4522, and rights of way for the Mosier road, \$2210. Overdrafts on the Mosier road, the Tygh Valley-Maupin grade, and the road to Dufur total \$6176.

HEROINE NURSES 16 FLU PATIENTS IN A REMOTE COMMUNITY

Woman Attends Victims at One Time; All Restored to Health by Attention.

Timber Valley, a community described as being in the "backwoods" of Washington, has its heroine.

She is Mary Holstein, who nursed back to health 16 victims of the "flu" at one time, at the risk of her own life or health.

So appreciative of this service are the people of the village that Mrs. H. Gaulke, a resident, has written The Journal expressing the gratitude of the community.

So severe were the 16 cases which she was caring for at the same time that none could look after his own needs at all.

This made the work of the nurse exceedingly trying, Mrs. Gaulke says, and kept her constantly occupied.

Mrs. Gaulke also commends Dr. Dwyer, who went over to Timber Valley from Glenwood to look after the patients. She says he had 211 patients, losing but one, who had disobeyed the doctor's orders.

"If ever anyone deserved a medal or cross, she does," concludes Mrs. Gaulke in speaking of the work of the nurse. "This community can congratulate itself on having such a doctor and such a nurse in such trying times as these."

FLU FEARERS ARE ADVISED TO HELP 'ARMY OF HEALTH'

Body, Says Writer, Contains Big Force of Germs Designed to Meet and Defeat All Disease.

"FLU" MASKS ARE SCORED

"Phagocytes" Need Sulphur, Mental Help and Fresh Air, According to Author of Letter.

To the Editor: Please print this sermon for the benefit of the flu fearers to whom, really, it is addressed, because who ever heard of an editor being afraid of anything except telling what isn't so, in his paper.

Dear Flu Fearers: Did you know that the human body is a "league of nations"? That the smallest member in that league is, say, the little finger nail and the largest—the liver. Did you know that if the little finger nail is crushed, the entire rest of the league goes to its relief with all it needs to throw off the burden and make a new nail? The heart, the lungs, the supply of transformed food to provision the blood—in fact, not a part of the entire body in this "league of nations" but rushes to the help of that little finger nail, and by and by there is the perfect, new, pink member as good as if nothing had happened.

The doctors, oh, these doctors! They make us think that all germs are bad. Not so. In the human body is a standing army of valiant germs, loyal to every member of this "league of nations."

The scientists call them phagocytes. Why then, do we fear this invader, the flu germ? Because we have not faith in our army of phagocytes, or perhaps we do not even know that they exist, or perhaps we do not—which is pretty probable—keep them well fed and equipped to fight the Hun flu. For if we do keep their army of phagocytes healthy and strong and its ranks well filled we can laugh at doctors, their scares and their terrible flu germs.

Feed the Phagocytes
How can you keep this brave army of germs in your own "league of nations" well and strong and munitioned to protect you from invaders? I once read of a scientist who detached some of these useful body police and studied them through a microscope. He tested them with several sorts of food, but found that they fed ravenously upon a diet of sulphuric acid, and thrived on it.

Now, then if you will dismiss your foolish fears of flu germs and give thanks for your own army of protection, the faithful phagocytes, and the good care of them, you will walk unscathed, for if a flu germ penetrates the defenses of the phagocytes they fall on him with all the fury of a doughboy on a "kame-rading" Hun, and finish him.

A judicious dose of sulphur in some suitable form, now and then, will please the infinitesimal police in your "league of nations." More than that, you must greet them with generous doses of oxygen every time they make the rounds of the league and visit your lungs, which is about every three minutes or so.

Avoid sending them material via the stomach that will increase their labors, either in quantity or quality, so eat the food that is good for you, and care of them, you will walk unscathed, for if a flu germ penetrates the defenses of the phagocytes they fall on him with all the fury of a doughboy on a "kame-rading" Hun, and finish him.

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Mental Help Advocated
Has the mind anything to do with it? Why, doesn't comprehension of all the above belong to the work of the mind? I don't see how you can reinforce and gain in fighting trim your own personal standing army without the exercise of intelligence, do you?

Each phagocyte—microscopic though it be—is himself a center of intelligence. He can and does respond to the thoughts you entertain. If you shiver in fear of the flu, you fill him with panic. If YOU, the sum total of ALL the mind that governs and directs your "league of nations," have no faith in your own defenses, how can you expect these little—infinitely little—centers of intelligence to know more than you tell them?

Now, the doctors will declare that all this is the wildest kind of vaporizing—at least it costs nothing; but suppose you try realizing the beneficence and the power of your own standing army of germs. Assist them rationally as herein suggested and hearten them with your confidence in them and your faith in their invincibility when they rally forth "over the top" to meet their enemies and "ours—the flu germ."

Stick to Faithful Friends
The flu mask? Oh, those doctors again! Much authority has made them mad. Sixteen layers of gauze—more or less—over the mouth and nostrils. We breathe to live, so we need it. Well, what is breathing? It is inhaling pure air and exhaling used air for which the system has no further use. If we exhale this impure air freely, it is taken care of by the oxygen waiting for it in the pure air and does not hurt us—nor anybody else. If we smother it close to the nostrils as with the flu mask, we rebreath it and so set up a process of asphyxiation whose only effect can be to weaken and poison the entire system—slowly, but surely.

Stick, then, to your faithful phags. Trust them and treat them right, and you have nothing to fear—from enemy germs, doctors nor undertakers. E. F. B.

State Cement Plant Proposed
Mr. Booth said it was a shame the way the cement situation existed at the present time, that he had been informed that cement could be produced for close to 24 cents a barrel but that it cost the commission more than \$2.

Mr. Dennis suggested a state owned and operated cement plant, saying that he did not believe in state owned industries as a general rule, but that he thought something ought to be done "to bust the trust," if it could be done in a feasible manner.

Commissioner Thompson said he would not like to undertake the construction and operation of a cement plant as part of the duties of the highway commission, but that if some other agency could make cement for the use of the commission, he would be glad to use it.

After the whole question had been discussed and all those present except LaFollette had gone on record as being in favor of a \$10,000,000 bonding bill, the

meeting adjourned, with the understanding that the committees would get their highway program bills in shape as soon as possible and give them to the two houses for consideration and action.

\$3,500,000 of Fund Spent

Both of the highway commissioners addressed the joint senate and house meeting, outlining the work of the commission during the last two years, and also the program outlined and the needs of the commission for the two years to come in its task of carrying out the road program as outlined at the last session, when the \$6,000,000 bond issue was provided.

Thompson began his statement by saying that he was before the meeting in a different capacity than when he appeared the night before, since the governor had just appointed him to serve another term on the commission. The night before he was in the position of a man who was in danger of losing his job, but now he had another term ahead of him and he felt in good position to tell what he thought about the road game.

The commission had been in active operation for about 18 months, he said, none of which it had been marking time. It has in that time spent \$2,450,000 out of the \$6,000,000 bond money.

Altogether the commission had spent \$3,500,000 from all funds.

Program for Coming Year
The program for the coming year contemplated the expenditure of \$1,815,250 in Western and \$1,545,000 in Eastern Oregon.

Thompson recommended that an amendment be made to the Beane-Barratt act, enacted at the last session of the legislature, that the Oregon law would meet the requirements of the Bankhead act, the Federal amendment of the Shackleford act.

One third of the expenditures of the commission has been spent in Eastern and two thirds in Western Oregon, Thompson said. He pointed out that the funds given two years ago were not sufficient to complete the task that the commission had been given to perform. Another fact was that a tax ought to be levied upon the vehicles which used the roads that the state built.

\$10,354,000 Is Needed
He discussed the topography of the state and said that this was the foundation of the road system mapped out by the last legislature more than politics. It would require approximately \$5,444,000 to complete the Pacific highways, \$1,840,000 for the Eastern and Central Oregon highways, while the total amount needed to complete the entire program would be approximately \$10,354,000, Mr. Booth said.

On motion of Senator Thomas, a vote of thanks was tendered to the commission for its presentation of the road situation to the joint assembly.

Amusement Tax to Stay at 10 Per Cent
Washington, Jan. 22.—(U. P.)—Theatre managers and patrons today won their fight against the 20 per cent tax on amusements in the new tax bill. Congress rescinded their adoption of the senate 20 per cent rate and went back to the house rate of 10 per cent.

Ex-Senator Oliver Dies in Pittsburgh
Pittsburgh, Pa., Jan. 22.—(I. N. S.)—Former United States Senator George T. Oliver of Pennsylvania died at his home here today. Members of the family were present when death came.

The sentiment of the state has

He understood, he said, that there was an attempt to be made to put the commission on a salary. The commission could not be hired, he said. It would work for nothing, but not on a salary.

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BERLIN IN THROES OF NEW REVOLT

Spartacans Use Rifles and Hand Grenades; Government Retains Two Regiments in Berlin.

Berlin, via London, Jan. 22.—(I. N. S.)—There was a renewal of rioting here last night. The Spartacans, armed with rifles and hand grenades, attacked the Anhalter station. The fighting spread to Koenigsplatz, Des-Sauerstrasse, Wilhelmplatz, Albertstrasse and Goetheplatz.

At Bremen the Laborites disarmed the soldiers and occupied the town hall, stock exchange, reichsbank and telegraph and telephone office.

Two regiments of government troops have been ordered to remain in Berlin to protect the government and aid the police.

It is announced that the national assembly will be held in Weimar on February 6.

Ebert's Government Leads
Berlin, Jan. 21, via London, Jan. 22.—(I. N. S.)—Returns counted up to noon today show the majority Socialists (supporters of Chancellor Ebert's government) far in the lead. Two hundred and sixty-seven constituencies were in, divided as follows: Majority Socialists, 114 seats in the national assembly; Democrats, 52; Clericals, 46; German National, 24; Independent Socialists, 19; German People's Party, 11. Four hundred and thirty-three candidates were chosen.

Minister Philip Scheidemann in an election day speech on the new armistice conditions, made a gloomy prediction on the spread of Bolshevism into France and England if drastic terms are imposed.

"They calculate to condemn Germany to powerlessness," said Scheidemann. "By the removal of great amounts of agricultural machinery we will be forced into starvation. But the entente will quickly come to their senses, for starving Germany will prove the soil over which Bolshevism will push with out halting at the frontiers of France and England."

Germany to Have a President
Berlin, Jan. 22.—Berlin and its immediate environs hereafter will be a separate republic, independent of Prussia, of which it has been hitherto the capital. The Rhineland (hitherto Rhenish Prussia) will be joined to German-Austria, and the two will form one of the

republics that will constitute the new German federation—virtually a "United States of Germany," the whole to be a federated republic.

An official statement to this effect was issued Tuesday.

Having received the assurance at the police of the confidence of nearly 50 per cent of the German voters the kber government has set itself to the task of framing the fatherland's future.

A president will be elected for a term of seven years. He will appoint chancellors (equivalent to the premiers of the Western democracies) and ministers. The reichstag will be composed of a "chamber of the people" and a chamber of state.

"Flu" Is Under Control
The Dalles, Jan. 22.—With only three new cases of influenza Monday and four Sunday, the second wave of the disease is definitely under control. With the toll taken by the second wave of the epidemic, deaths from the disease in this city during the past three months

total 65. The present quarantine order will continue in effect through Sunday, and may be extended, if necessary.

Maintenance Clauses Hit
Salem, Jan. 22.—A bill making it a crime for any official of the state, county, or municipality, to include in a contract for the construction of a highway or street, a provision for the maintenance of such road or street, was introduced in the senate today by Senators Thomas and Lachmund. A penalty is provided of a fine of not more than \$1000 or imprisonment in the county jail for not more than one year, or both.

The bill is a blow at the maintenance clauses which have been included in various contracts let by the state highway commission.

It provides that if any such contracts are hereafter made, not only will the officials making them be guilty of a crime, but the contract will be void.
