

RUSS TERRORISM LIVES ON CARRION

Horror of Bolshevik Movement
Spreads Over East and Into
Germany Like Plague.

Berlin, Jan. 14.—(Delayed.)—Bolshevism being an animal which subsists on carrion and is unable to create or produce it must in order to live take from those who work and produce. That is why in Russia the Bolsheviks, seeing that they must fall sooner or later, are taking desperate steps to save themselves by a world revolution. The treaty of Brest-Litovsk has become a boomerang which threatens the possibility of the central powers saving something from the wreckage of their disastrous adventure.

Occasionally persons escape from Russia who are able to tell the Germans what to expect if the Bolsheviks win. For example, today the red terror is worse than ever in all Russia, where about 30 executions are taking place daily in Petrograd alone. The regiment of Letts, which formed the bodyguard of Lenin and Trotzky, is not performing the executions. The men, unmurdered by murdering former ministers and old men who wished to play before dying.

Bolshevik Denies Prayer

The Bolsheviks said there was no use praying since there was no God and ordered them to shoot the men as they knelt. The Letts could not do this, and so the Bolsheviks used a revolver to shoot them.

However, they were so unnerfed that they could not shoot straight and made such a horrible mess that they refused to fire any more.

This task was then assigned to a force of about 100,000 Chinese, who find it quite agreeable to kill whites or have a chance to "pacify" uprisings in villages where there are opportunities for plunder. These Chinese are those who remain from about 100,000 imported during the war to supplement labor.

Rations have been reduced for most of the people, and especially for the bourgeoisie. There is famine in the cities. At the slightest excuse houses are searched, and if arms are found in them the occupants are killed with their own weapons. The Bolsheviks say, "You had this weapon to kill us with, and it is just that you should be killed by it."

One man's house was searched 16 times in one year and each time everything of value in it was stolen. This is the thing the Russian Bolsheviks would bring to the world.

Red Terror Invades Germany

The movement westward started first in Poland, and is now arriving in Germany. Here the Bolsheviks leading the anarchy are all from Russia and are highly schooled in the art of destruction. Radek, a Galician Jew from Moscow, with others of the same kind, have been working savagely during the past few weeks aided immensely by Liebknecht, a man whose brain was stunted at 17. Liebknecht, a violent man, and Meyer, who worked secretly. A great number of the independent German Socialists are responsible for the bloodshed of the past week, since they either knowingly or ignorantly of the consequences of their attitude carried on a propaganda tending to provoke social war. These men in their lust for political power barely tasted have placed themselves in the same class with the brigands and murderers collected from the soldiers who refused to resume work. Sailors without ships who wished to remain in Berlin and have a good time, and workers who having earned immense wages during the war feared to return to normal salaries when no more munitions were to be made.

Selfishness Behind Bolshevik

When it is considered how unbelievably selfish these men are, it is surprising that more criminals and fools were not found to be tools of the Russian Bolsheviks. The plan of campaign now seems to be sabotage against the railroads, just as a few months ago a coal mine sabotage campaign was begun. The Poles in Silesia are working only four hours a day. Bolshevism is spreading rapidly in East Prussia. Riga was an easy prey for the Bolsheviks who entered without a struggle, finding in the immense quantity of artillery, arms and munitions left by the German soldiers, who abandoned their equipment better to carry foodstuffs than to fight.

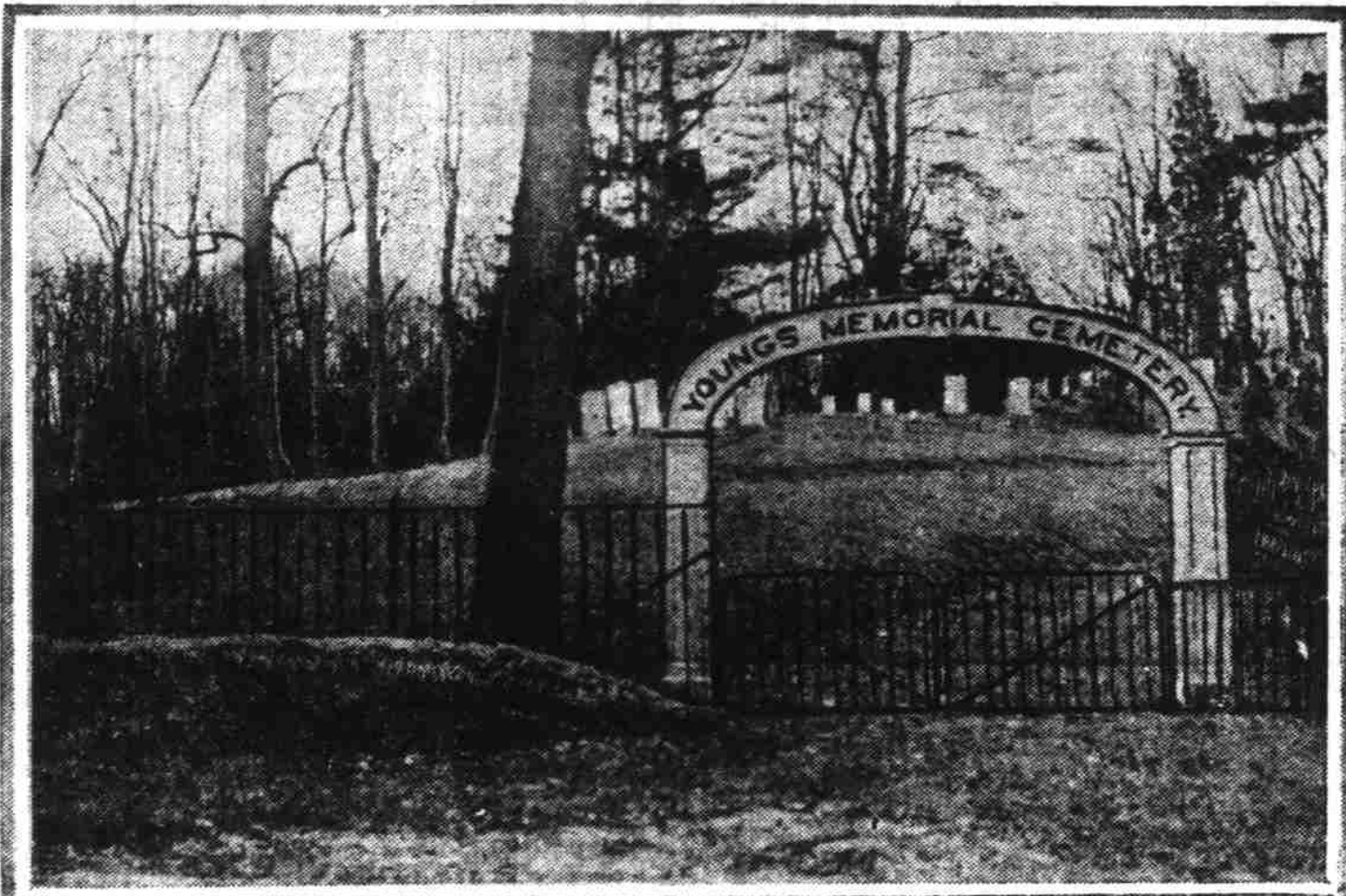

Sweden's Minister Attacks Those Who Protect Terrorists

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Stockholm, Sweden, Jan. 22.—Foreign Minister Holmner made an energetic defense the other day in the riksdag of the government's refusal to discourage unofficial Swedish preparations to fight the Bolsheviks in the Baltic states. The movement, he said, was one entirely of private initiative.

"Swedish Bolsheviks," the minister continued, "have been trying to whitewash the Bolshevik terror in the Baltic states to prevent a brisk enrollment here for service in Courland, Lithuania and Estonia. That Sweden feel sympathy for those who want to defend themselves against these Bolshevik troops cannot, I believe, seem strange to many in this chamber. It is well known that as the Germans retired from Lithuania the Bolsheviks broke in and that horrible massacres occurred. Civilian dwellers in the Baltic states are panic stricken, and our government gets daily and hourly appeals to send ships to bring them safely to Sweden."

Former Oregon Man Wins War Honors

Dallas, Jan. 22.—Brigadier General Harold B. Fiske, chief of the training section, general staff, American expeditionary forces, who was one of the general officers recently awarded the distinguished service cross, on recommendation of General Pershing, is an Oregon man. He is a son of Mrs. C. S. Fiske of this city and a brother of Postmaster V. P. Fiske and Mrs. Grace M. Bassett, also of this city. General Fiske is a graduate of the old Bishop Scott academy of Portland, and in 1897 was appointed as a cadet to West Point from Portland. He was a member of the first contingent of soldiers sent to France, at that time being a major and adjutant on the staff of Major General Bullard. Shortly after arriving in France he was promoted to lieutenant colonel and assigned to General Pershing's staff. Subsequently he was successively appointed colonel and brigadier general.

Eugene Delegation To Ask Federal Aid For Forest Roads

Eugene, Jan. 22.—At a special meeting of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce held just before the big freedom banquet Monday the local business men stepped solidly behind E. J. Adams and his proposal to send a special delegation to congress to plead the cause of forest roads through United States reserves in Oregon.

"We need an increase in the appropriation for forest roads," said Mr. Adams. "And the only way we can get it is to go after it. Memorials, petitions, letters and telegrams simply provide fillers for waste baskets."

Mr. Adams showed that over 60 per cent of the area of Oregon is untaxable and that 22 per cent of the state is national forest reserve. These reserves, he explained, if owned by private parties and placed on the tax rolls would pay over \$1,400,000 per annum in taxes for state and county purposes.

Serbia Destroyed, Claim Jugo-Slavs

The Daily News Peace Conference Bureau, Paris, France, Jan. 22.—It is expected that the Jugo-Slavia peace commission, headed by M. Paschitch, will soon file a protest with the five major powers against the action giving two seats at the conference to Serbia and one to Montenegro. The argument will be that these nations no longer exist, and that the allies must recognize Jugo-Slavia as a nation which succeeded them with the consent of the people, and is entitled to three seats at the conference. Jugo-Slavia has not yet been recognized.

Estimates California Crop at \$45,000,000

Riverside, Cal., Jan. 22.—(L. N. S.)—California will ship east 34,450 cars of oranges and 7300 cars of lemons this season, according to estimates compiled here today. The Southern California crop was estimated at 33,000 cars of oranges and 7000 cars of lemons. In return citrus growers of the state will receive between \$40,000,000 and \$45,000,000. Frost damage for the state was estimated to be between 10 and 15 per cent of the crop.

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REGENTS SELECT SOLDIER-TEACHER

University Regents, at First
Meeting of Year, Elect Lieut.
Milne to University Faculty.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Jan. 22.—The board of regents of the University of Oregon, meeting at the university Tuesday for the first time this year, elected two new members to the faculty. They are Dr. W. E. Milne, a recently discharged first lieutenant in the ordnance corps, who succeeds Professor R. M. Winger, as instructor of mathematics, and Professor Sam Bass Warner of San Francisco, professor of law, who succeeds Professor R. S. Hamilton as an instructor in the law school.

The board authorized the expenditure of a sum not exceeding \$2500 to provide for the conversion of the university drill shed into a men's gymnasium annex. The two buildings are adjoining, and under the plan submitted the drill shed can be remodeled so that the gymnasium space of the university will be more than doubled. Work on the addition will start soon.

Officers of the board were re-elected as follows: R. S. Bean, president; A. C. Dixon, vice president; and L. H. Johnson, secretary.

The annual reports of the president of the university, the registrar and the secretary of the executive committee, were read.

The board will meet again soon after the present state legislature adjourns.

Pneumonia Claims Former O. A. C. Man

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Jan. 22.—Word has been received in Corvallis of the death of Jacob Cornelius Van Hine, commonly known as "Jake," who for several years was assistant in the college greenhouse, and who took some work as a special student in commerce. He died from pneumonia at South Beach, Newport. He was a member of the spruce division. He was popular at the college, having made many friends in his work.

California Contests New Telephone Rate

San Francisco, Jan. 22.—Declaring that the government telephone rate in this state is a violation of the public utilities act inasmuch as the rates are higher than those sanctioned by the California railroad commission, the commission ordered the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company to refrain from putting the government rates into effect. The commission refuses to recognize the right of Postmaster General Burleson to fix higher long distance telephone rates than those already in effect in California.

Pendleton Boy Is Killed by Car on Slippery Pavement

Pendleton, Jan. 22.—Frederick Neagle, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Neagle, prominent Pendleton residents, was killed Tuesday morning by the overturning of his automobile near the city limits on the road to the Eastern Oregon State hospital, pinning him beneath the car and breaking his neck.

With him in the car was Mrs. Julia Killian, who was also caught under the car and sustained severe though not serious injuries. The car was turned with its wheels in the air when found by a taxi driver shortly after the accident, who, with the help of his passengers, lifted it from Neagle and Mrs. Killian and brought them to town.

It is believed that the accident was caused by swerving too quickly on the pavement, which was slippery with ice. Neagle was 18 years old. He was born in Pendleton, and had attended the local schools. He is survived by his parents and a sister, Miss Nellie Neagle, who is attending school in Portland.
