

FOR THE KING OF PORTUGAL WHAT OUR COUNTRY'S CALL

Don Manuel Braganza Is Willing to Resume Throne if People Want It, He Tells World.

MAKES HOME IN ENGLAND

"Am in the Hands of My People," He Says in Commenting on Events of the Day.

(This interview was obtained Tuesday. Since then the former king of Portugal is reported to have returned to Lisbon, but official confirmation is lacking.)

By Robert Welles Ritchie London, Jan. 23.—"I am in the hands of my people. If they wish me to resume the throne, I am waiting their call."

This simple statement was made to the Times by Don Manuel Braganza in an interview Tuesday.

The man who stands in the shadow of a shaky throne of ancient Portugal did not intend to grant an interview; he had successfully evaded them in his apartments in the Claridge's hotel.

Prominent Business Man of The Dalles Is Dead of Influenza

The Dalles, Jan. 23.—Max A. Vogt, president of the First National bank and a prominent banker of the state, died at 6 o'clock this morning from influenza, from which he had been suffering for the past week.
