

INCREASED AREA FOR CRATER LAKE PARK ADVOCATED

Director of National Parks in Report Urges Including Diamond Lake and Other Features

WOULD ADD FISHING PLACE

Would Make Oregon Park Equal to Any Other Big National Resort in Few Years.

Increase in the area of Crater Lake National park is urged by Stephen T. Mather, director of national parks, in his report, which has just appeared. Diamond lake, Mount Thielsen and other scenic features of really national importance will be included, according to Mr. Mather, if the measure before congress is adopted. He adds:

"When the park has been enlarged as proposed by this measure, an opportunity will be afforded for developing to a very much greater extent the camping facilities of this region. Diamond lake will lend itself to development as a fishing resort of great importance and other recreational features will be added that will, in a few years, make this park as great a resort as most of the very big national parks. This is its manifest destiny. Furthermore, the development of the park will be more satisfactory from the point of view of the development of first-class transportation, hotel and camp accommodations, because the traveling public can be induced to spend more time in the park than ordinarily is the case at the present time. More roads will be built, opening up unusually interesting territory, and providing circle trips that will delight the traveler. A road connecting Crater and Diamond lakes would be a natural development, and the park will also afford better opportunities to protect the wild life of the park."

"Like the proposed extension of the Yellowstone National park, the addition of the Diamond Lake region to Crater Lake would give to the national park system something that was intended by nature, always to be a part of the nation and to be developed as a recreational area for all."

"I feel that this extension proposition is what should be received. The earlier the pending bill is enacted into law, the sooner, of course, we can begin plans for the development of the enlarged park after the close of the war."

"Mr. Mather expresses hope in the introduction to his extended report that the national parks will keep the nation during the coming season. This he recommends for the "purposely" of recuperation to thousands who have given themselves ceaselessly and unflinchingly to the cause of peace by earnest labor for the success of the war."

Greeters Organize Plan to Entertain National Delegates

Plans for the national convention of the Greeters of America, an association of hotel clerks, were formulated at a meeting of the Oregon Greeters at the Portland Hotel Thursday night.

The convention will be held in Portland June 24, 25, 26 and 27, and will be attended by 400 delegates from over the entire country. Prominent men in the hotel world will be among the speakers.

Two days will be devoted to business sessions and the other two to entertainment, according to the plans. An all-day trip on the Columbia highway, with a salmon bake at Eagle creek, will be one of the attractive features of the program.

A national convention magazine will be published by the Oregon Greeters to raise money for entertaining the visitors.

Worst Locust Pest On Record, Forecast

Washington, Jan. 24.—The year 1919 is likely to be one of the worst locust years on record, the department of agriculture warned today, but although the locusts, the "7-year" variety that are due to appear in large numbers, entomologists of the department see nothing alarming in the prospect. The periodical cicada, the "17-year" variety of the insect, will appear in 21 states in the East and South, the department says. A. F. OF L. TARGET OF RADICAL FACTION OF MOONEY CONFERENCE

Vice President Hibbs, Who Has Returned From Chicago Meeting, Gives Views.

O. E. Hibbs, vice president of the State Federation of Labor, who presided over its sessions most of the time at the last convention, has returned from the Mooney defense conference at Chicago. He reported to the Central labor council Thursday night that the defense of Mooney was the "fifty-seventh object" of a large number of the delegates, and that the first object of the "direct actionists" was to break up the American Federation of Labor.

These ultra-radicals were mostly of the I. W. W. kind, he explained, and came from the Northwest.

A committee to work in Washington, D. C., with the president and other officials to secure a fair trial for Mooney was the most sensible thing, and calling a general strike on July 4 the most radical thing they did. The matter that interested those in charge of the Mooney defense was a call for each member of the A. F. of L. throughout the country to put into the defense fund 50 cents. This would give the neat sum of over \$1,500,000, if complied with to any large extent. "They forgot all about Mooney most of the time," said Mr. Hibbs, in referring to the radical orators on the conference floor.

NUMBER OF SCHOOL DEBATING TEAMS OF STATE NOW REDUCED

Influenza Epidemic and Excess Amount of Work Cause Eleven High Schools to Withdraw.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Jan. 24.—Eleven high schools in the state have withdrawn from the State High School Debate league, leaving a total of 24 schools now in the league.

The influenza epidemic or an excess of work are the reasons given by R. W. Prescott, secretary of the league, for the withdrawals.

The schools which have withdrawn are Albany, Beaverton, Corvallis, Forest Grove, Roseburg, Salem, Tangent, Grants Pass, Moro, Prineville and Franklin high school, Portland.

The schools left in the league are: Ashland, Bandon, Bend, Coquille, Corbett, Enterprise, Estacada, Eugene, Glendale, Hermiston, Hubbard, Ione, Marshfield, McMinnville, Medford, Lostine, Milton-Freewater, Molalla, North Bend, Ontario, Oregon City, Pendleton, Prosser and Silverton.

The state has been divided into districts, the schools in each district holding preliminary debates during this month and the first part of February. The results of these debates will be turned in to Mr. Prescott by February 15, and he will arrange for a series of debates between the winners of each section, so that by a process of elimination two teams can meet at the University of Oregon in May to debate for the state interscholastic championship.

PACIFIC HIGHWAY MAY BE CHANGED

People of Aurora Believe Route May Be Laid on East Side of Tracks Running to Canby.

Aurora, Jan. 24.—People here are speculating as to why no provision is

being made for the paving of the Pacific Highway from Aurora to Canby, in Clackamas county. Some who claim to have inside information declare the present route will not be paved, but that the route will be changed to parallel closely the Southern Pacific from here to Canby on the east side of the track all the way, thus avoiding two big hills and steep grades as well as two dangerous railroad grade crossings. Thus there would be but two crossings from Salem to Portland. The proposed route is nearly a mile shorter, but the advantage of keeping the highway on one side of the railroad all the way is held to be the best reason for the change of route. One disadvantage is the necessity of a new bridge if the route is changed. But many declare that the

old bridge across the Molalla river will never be accepted by the highway commission as a part of the Pacific highway.
