Among the new objects of the national council are (1) the furthering of the work of recognized agencies of the church that deal with problems arising out of the war; to coordinate, harmonize and unify their activities and to create new agencies to meet circumstances which require mmon action; (2) to coordinate the activities of the church for the solution problems which affect the religious life and consciousness of the ople, and (3) to foster true Christian loyalty to the state and to labor for the maintenance of a right relation between church and state as distinct, divine insti-

Among the first duties of the council will be to lend aid in the war torn areas of Europe. A commission has already visited France, Finland, the Baltic Balkan states and has reported on the needs of these countries. Meeting Most Important
