

NO FLAG, EXCEPT OLD GLORY, SAYS A PROPOSED LAW

New Ordinance Passed to Third Reading Is Blow at Flags Inimical to Interest of U. S.

GUARD AGAINST OIL TANKS

Measure to Be Drawn Requiring Companies on Linnton Road to Put in Safeguards.

By unanimous vote the ordinance making it unlawful to display or to cause to be displayed any flag antagonistic to the principles of the United States government or laws, was passed to third reading at this morning's council meeting and will come up for final discussion in two weeks.

The ordinance would make it unlawful to display or to cause to be displayed or to have in one's possession in the city of Portland, the red or black flag, or any flag antagonistic to the principles of the government of the United States.

And at all street meetings it shall be necessary to fly in a conspicuous place an American flag measuring at least 52 inches by 66 inches.

Accredited museums and theatres might use the flags for educational or historical purposes.

A penalty of a fine of \$500 or six months' imprisonment, or both, is provided for in case of violation of the ordinance.

City Auditor Funk delivered to the council the open bids for the purchase of \$100,000 water bonds of the city of Portland.

The council granted the bonds to William Adams, city treasurer, account water bond sinking fund, the amount paid being part and the accrued interest for \$100,000.

The council adopted a recommendation authorizing the city attorney to prepare an ordinance making it compulsory for the oil companies having tanks along the Linnton road to prepare a system of underground tunnels and drainage for their tanks as a precaution against fire.

The council before adjourning adopted a resolution in memory of Henry L. Pittock.

CITY OFFERS ARE LOW

Few Purchases to Be Made in Next 60 Days.

With the offers of the city treasury low, a policy of retrenchment has been started by the city commissioners. Commissioner Perkins, after studying the situation, has asked the commissioners to refrain from making purchases for the next 60 days.

By that time Perkins says the tax collection for this year will begin to come in and the city treasury will have sufficient funds.

Authority has been given Commissioner Perkins to borrow not to exceed \$50,000 to tide the city over until the tax collections are made in March.

Perkins expects, however, that he will not have to borrow nearly that sum.

Meat Inspector Moves
Owing to the increased business of the health department the bureau of meat inspection has been moved to new quarters in the milk inspection bureau on the third floor of the city hall.

Hereafter when calls are sent in over the telephone the caller should ask for the bureau of meat inspection or Dr. Chase, as no direct connection can be had between the health office telephones.

Motorcycle Police Ask Increase
Members of the police motorcycle division have filed a petition with the mayor and city commissioners, asking that they be given an increase of salary the same as has been extended to motorcycle officers who are attached to the traffic squad.

Men of the squad are to receive their work is just as hard and as dangerous as that of other officers of the force.

A pro rata increase according to length of service, similar to the men of the traffic bureau, is what the motorcycle men ask for.

The petition is signed by Captain Moore of the day relief, Captain Inskeep of the first night relief, Captain Jenkins of the second night relief, and Motorcycle Officers H. W. Norene, W. J. Scott, S. P. Judge, R. C. Linton, H. L. Coulter, W. S. Tully, C. H. Russell, R. L. Schaad and Officer Gouldstone.

Planning Commission to Meet
The organization of the new city planning commission, appointed by Mayor Baker, will take place at the initial meeting of that body tonight at 5:45 p. m. at the Benson hotel.

Officers of the commission will be elected and definite plans for the work of the commission considered. Following the meeting an inaugural dinner will be held in the Tyroler room of the Benson when members of the city council and of the city housing survey committee will confer with the newly organized commission.

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COURT RESENTS IDEA OF COLLUSION IN A DIVORCE PROCEEDING

Conduct of Wife and Husband Causes Judge to Refer the Case to District Attorney.

Evidences of collusion between the parties to a divorce suit, became manifest during the progress of the trial of the suit of Vina Stange against Samuel Stange in Presiding Judge Stapleton's court Tuesday afternoon.

The wife was offering testimony, preparatory to taking a decree by default, telling of various acts of cruelty committed by her husband, when Judge Stapleton interrupted the proceedings by asking where the husband was.

"In the rear of the court room," Mrs. Stange replied. Finishing her testimony she took her seat among the spectators and near the man whom she had sued for divorce.

Judge Stapleton, noting this incident, directed that Stange be called to the witness stand.

Stange demurred, saying he had no intention of appearing as a witness in the case. He was required, nevertheless, to come forward and testify.

Under questioning he was obliged to give evidence contradicting that offered by his wife, who had accused him among other things of knocking her down. He admitted that the real cause of the trouble between them was another man with whom his wife was infatuated. He admitted also his willingness that the "other man" should have her and that he had agreed to the divorce and had promised to pay the attorney's fee.

"There will be no collusion in this court," said Judge Stapleton severely. "The matter is referred to the district attorney for appropriate action."
