WEATHER CONDITIONS
Low pressure prevails on the California coast, and from North Dakota and Manitoba sweeps to the north Atlantic coast. The remainder of the country is covered by a great high pressure area, the highest readings being in British Columbia. Precipitation has been confined to small areas in the extreme northwest and extreme northeast. The weather is much milder in Saskatchewan, Manitoba and the Dakotas, and is much colder in British Columbia and in the lower lake region and upper Ohio valley. The temperature is below normal over small areas on the middle Pacific coast and in the upper Ohio valley, and is above normal in other sections. More weather is reported from northern British Columbia.

Solons Practice on Congress
The United States senators and congressmen used Congress as a body on which to practice oratory, is the assertion of Mr. and Mrs. J. B. Rhodes, of the O. W. R. & N., at Spokane, who arrived at the hotel this morning after two weeks at Washington. "Dusty" Rhodes is chairman of the general committee of adjustment of the order of railway conductors of the O. W. R. & N., and was called east to attend a wage hearing presented by the orders of locomotive engineers, firemen, trainmen and conductors before adjustment board No. 1.

The Rhodes visited congress on a number of times, and related how, on one instance, a noted senator gave a rosy Fourth of July oration to which no one listened. He gave the same speech that night at the commencement exercises of a certain women's seminary, and they decided he used the national lawmakers to practice his speech upon before trying it upon the young women.

Mr. and Mrs. Rhodes saw large numbers of wounded and maimed soldiers being taken to the Walter Reed hospital. At one time, they saw 600 wounded soldiers landed one time.

Pathologist to Confer
Dr. E. P. Meinecke, pathologist from San Francisco, arrived at the forest service Tuesday in connection with a

conference which he held with Professor Bars of Oregon Agricultural college and Dr. Weir, former pathologist at the Missoula, Mont., office, regarding methods to be adopted for the exclusion of white pine blister rust from the states west of the Rockies.

Dr. Meinecke has been in charge of the campaign against the threatened invasion of western yellow and white pine by the blister rust, which has infected forests in the Eastern United States, and spent the most of last summer looking for any traces of the rust in Oregon and Washington.

Still Young at 81 Years
N. W. Flaisig, for 61 years a traveling salesman and still in the game, and for 49 years on the pay roll of the same company, has arrived in Portland. Mr. Flaisig is now 81 years old and takes orders for needles and buttons with as much vim as he did 50 years ago.
