

PIONEER SOCIETY FOSTERS HISTORY AT ANNUAL FEAST

Friendship's Bonds Clasped With
"Hoops of Steel" by Men Who
Made Commercial Progress.

183 MEMBERS HEAR PROGRAM

Ex-Gov. Geer Makes Address;
Victory Banquet Held Most
Successful Ever Given.

The friends thou hast, and their adoption tried,
Grapple them to thy soul with hoops of steel;
But do not dull thy palm with entertainment
Of each new-hatched, unfledged comrade.

That Portland's pioneer settlers agree that it is well to "grapple to their souls with hoops of steel" the first friends of early days, was evidenced Wednesday evening, when the Lang Syne society held the largest and most successful banquet in its history in the grill of the Hotel Portland. The guests numbered 183 men who were engaged in business in Portland in 1890 or before. The first meeting of the society was held in 1914, with 10 men present; and before the end of that year 100 members were enrolled. Now the organization numbers 400. Frank Dayton, the organizer of the society and its present secretary-treasurer, headed the committee on arrangements for this year's Victory banquet, and to his efforts its great success was largely attributed. Ex-Governor T. T. Geer, although a native of Oregon, not a Portland pioneer, was the guest of honor and the principal speaker. He recalled in a most interesting manner the evolution of Portland during the last half century, noting the city's growth from a primeval forest to its present metropolitan proportions. He gave a complete list of the governors of Oregon, the year of their birth, when they took office and how long they served, and closed by giving the society the motto: "Do what you can with what you have where you are."

Work Spells Success
James Felling, proclaimed the oldest merchant in Portland, by reason of having arrived on Christmas day, 1853, spoke briefly of the early days. Charles H. Dodd, who also arrived in 1853, gave an enthusiastic address, recalling early incidents and anecdotes in the lives of many pioneers who have passed away. He emphasized work as the keynote of success in the upbuilding of Portland. Others who spoke briefly were Judge M. C. George, George H. Himes, B. B.

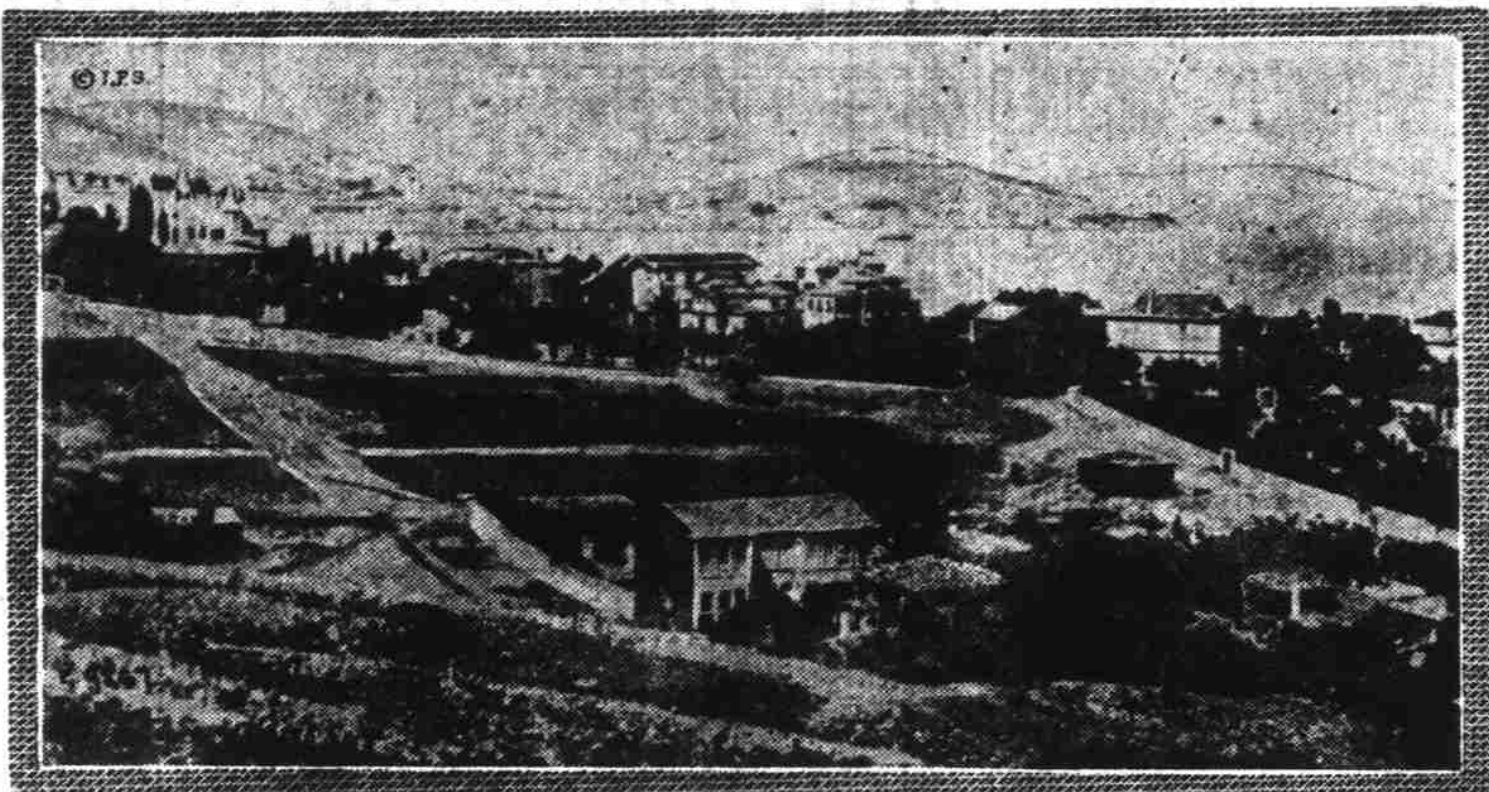

PRINCES ISLAND SAID TO BE PARADISE



New York, Jan. 30.—(U. P.)—The Princes Islands, where it has been proposed the allies meet the Russian factions, for the purpose of discussing the appointment of a peace delegate, is ideally situated for a series of quiet, unexcited chats. Four of the nine islands comprising the group are inhabited, but the total population is only a little more than 10,000.

The islands are about 13 miles south-east of Constantinople, with which they are connected by a ferry that makes trips every two hours, the trip consuming about an hour and a half. The inhabitants are never in a hurry. Prinkipo, the chief island in the group, is ten miles in circumference and contains a town of the same name. Most of the inhabitants are Greeks. Travelers declare that the most beautiful women in the world live the simple life in these islands.

The inhabitants have home rule. No taxes are paid except when the people tax themselves, which is seldom, as the wealthy foreign residents provide all the improvements needed. Few of the residents ever lock their doors, whether they are at home or not and the only work there is for the heavily armed and gaily decorated policemen is keeping the boats from eating the trees.

PADEREWSKI REGIME STRENGTHENED BY U. S. RECOGNITION, IS VIEW

Overwhelming Majority for Polish
Leader in Congress to Be
Held Feb. 9 Forecast.

Washington, Jan. 30.—(I. N. S.)—Recognition of the Paderewski government in Poland by President Wilson, through the letter of Secretary of State Lansing, will result in an overwhelming vote to support the Paderewski government in the elections now under way, according to Polish officials now in Washington.

"It establishes the solidarity of the coalition ministry and aids in the pacification and strengthening of the country," was the view expressed.

"I cannot escape the feeling," said John F. Smulski of Chicago, commissioner for the Polish people in America, "that the president was seeking also to express his appreciation of the loyal support which the Poles in America have given the cause of the United States. They have never wavered from the beginning."

Under an allotment agreement, the congress kingdom (Russian Poland) will have 150 delegates; Galicia, 155; Prussian Poland, 110, and Silesia, 10 delegates to the extra-ordinary session of the Polish parliament, to be held in Warsaw February 9.

In Eastern Galicia, where the Ukrainians, according to Washington Polish officials, are endeavoring to "starve the Polish people out," elections were not held, but proxies were selected in Western Galicia.

A constitutional convention, which General Pilsudski wanted held at this time, will be held later. Paderewski having convinced General Pilsudski that a constitutional debate would require too much time when there are emergencies as to the immediate conditions of Poland to be met. Women, granted full suffrage, participated heartily in the elections, according to information reaching here.
