

FIVE CARS REPORTED STOLEN ON THURSDAY; THREE ARE LOCATED

Two Books of War Stamps, Considerable Money and Other Cases of Larceny Reported.

Five automobiles were reported stolen Thursday to the police. The owners are: D. M. Kirby, 5004 East Thirty-third avenue; C. H. Miller, Trevia hotel; Couchman & Sullivan, Tenth and Taylor streets; Dr. J. D. Fenton, 1008 East Flanders street, and H. J. Anderson, 125 East Sixth street. Three of the machines have been located.

Several other larceny reports were also received. Oscar Holm, 446 Third street, complained of the theft of two \$100 books of War Savings Stamps and \$51 in currency. He said his trunk was unlocked by the thief to secure the money.

F. M. Lawhead and Otto Lawhead, residing at 48 North Ninth street, reported their rooms entered by burglars, who stole a purse containing \$100. W. E. Moon at the same address reported the loss of \$21 in currency and three \$100 Liberty bonds.

A showcase in front of Reeves Shoe store, 550 Washington street, was broken open by a thief, who stole six pairs of shoes.

E. B. Wood, special agent for the railroad companies, reported to the police the larceny of a box containing 2367 pencils and valued at \$103. The box was shipped by the Blaisdell Pencil company of Philadelphia to the Pacific Stationery & Printing Co. The larceny occurred at the freight shed.

Five hens were stolen from the chicken coop of Mrs. McCue of 8 East Buell avenue north, Wednesday, according to the report of the officer on the beat.

Saturday is one of the big days, with good turns during the day, and at night a big anniversary powwow in Central library. Good turns will take the form of distributing flowers, fruit, shoes, clothing or food to the needy, making needed repairs to troop headquarters, making signs and grounds pick and clean and building bulletin boards and other equipment.

At the powwow all the Scouts will attend in uniform.

Beggars Keep Books Like Business House

Modern business methods in begging were discovered by Police Inspectors Gordon and Wright, Thursday, when they arrested Emil Vorwerk, B. Henahan and Burt Frazer, crippled beggars, on a charge of vagrancy. The men kept in their pockets a system of books, in which were the names of persons to whom they applied for alms, the amounts and dates of the donations. The men were picked up in north end pool halls. James Dunn, Frank Brown, Thomas O'Connell and Walter Brigand, whom the police allege are drug addicts, were arrested in a rooming house at Third and Montgomery streets Thursday afternoon by Gordon and Wright, and are held while the police investigate a number of petty thefts which have been committed in the south end.

County Tax Income \$8,624,196 in 1918

The tax collecting for Multnomah county in 1918 totaled \$8,624,196.61, according to figures furnished by T. M. Hurlburt, sheriff and ex-officio tax collector. The sum paid in by delinquent taxpayers in penalties and interest aside from the amount of their taxes totaled \$35,329.80. The cost of advertising the delinquent tax list was \$43.96. The difference of \$51,569.80 was paid into the general fund. The total cost of tax collection for the year, including salaries, was \$43,000.

EMPLOYEES IN CITY SHOPS MUST WAIT ON JANUARY CHECKS

Delays in Receiving Reports Responsible for Inability to Pay Employees' Salaries on Time.

The January salary of 21 employees of the municipal shops is unpaid to date, and employees may be required to wait from a week to 10 days longer for their checks. The reports from the shops have not been received by City Auditor Funk for the months of December or January, and, although the city paid the December salary without the reports, Funk refuses to issue warrants for January and possibly overdraw accounts.

The delay in sending in the reports, it is suggested, is due to a poor system of accounting at the shops. It is stated that frequent changes have thrown the accounting machinery out of gear, at least so much so that reports have not been received since November.
